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APPENDIX NO. 1

NARRATIVE

1 January 1945, the Combat Team continued on defensive missions, placed minefields and obstacle wire. No hostile activity. Regiment alerted to move to new area on 2 January 1945. Casualties: One (1) killed.

2 January 1945, the 334th Infantry, 84th Division began movement into the regimental area during the morning. Combat Team 331 with attached units began movement to assembly area vicinity Villiers St. Gertrude at 1100. Following units attached:

- Company B - 774th Tank Battalion
- Company C - 629th Tank Destroyer Battalion (SP) with
Reconnaissance Platoon
- Company B - 87th Cml Battalion (less one platoon)
- Company C - 308th Engineers Battalion
- Company C - 308th Medical Battalion
- 3403 - Quartermaster Truck Company

Combat Team and attachments (less Company B - 774th Tank Battalion) closed in area P 445960, P 500980, P 470990 at 1900. Command post at P 485976 opened at 1600. Cold weather, icy roads and movement of armor across the column hampered movements. No casualties.

3 January 1945, Combat Team remained in assembly area. Reconnaissance made of roads to southeast. Company B, 774th Tank Battalion closed at 1700.

4 January 1945, Combat Team 331 and attachments in bivouac area. Preparations made for commitment in support of 3rd Armored Division. Sixty-five (65) reinforcements were received and assigned to battalions.

5, January 1945, Combat Team 331 and attachments in bivouac area. Third battalion alerted to move on order to occupy and hold high ground at P 576853 after seizure by GCR, 3rd Armored Division. Contact by Liaison Officer made with command post, GCR. One hundred and five (105) reinforcements were received at 1600.

6, 7 January 1945, Combat Team 331 and attached units remained in assembly areas. No other activities.

8 January 1945, at 0800, the regiment began movement to vicinity Lieurieux (P 618891) in order, 3rd battalion, 2nd battalion and 1st battalion. The regiment moved with the assistance of 3403 Quartermaster Company. Regimental command post closed at Lieurieux at 1200, 3rd battalion closed in the vicinity of Lieurieux at 1600 and the 2nd battalion closed in the vicinity of Vesleumont at 2130. The 1st battalion prepared to move at first light.

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9 January 1945, the 1st battalion closed in Lieurneux at 1330. The regiment received orders to attack south from the vicinity of Otte to seize Langlir and establish a bridgehead south of Langlir river. Formation, battalions abreast, 2nd battalion on the right, 3rd battalion on the left. Time of attack 1130. 3rd battalion jumped off on time but 2nd battalion did not leave line of departure until 1330 due to traffic and weather conditions. By 1600, Company G had advanced to 643842, Companies K and L to 651841. Considerable resistance was met by tanks, high velocity artillery and air-bursts from anti-aircraft fire. Harrassing fire fell throughout the area during the night. Thirty-six (36) prisoners. Casualties: KIA - two (2); WIA - thirteen (13).

10 January 1945, 1st battalion remained in reserve in assembly area vicinity of P 618890. 2nd and 3rd battalions jumped off at 0700 from positions occupied the night before. Attack was met by small arms, mortar, tank and artillery fire and stubbornly resisted. In the 2nd battalion area the enemy counterattacked at 1210, but the attack was beaten off and the 2nd battalion advanced to the line P 639846 -- 645845. The 3rd battalion attack was halted by enemy strong-point located at P 645845. Attack was resumed with tanks at 1500. Tanks attacked frontally to south against strong-point while Company L made envelopment from northeast. Attack was not successful, two of our tanks being knocked out and one enemy tank destroyed. At end of period, 3rd battalion held the line P 647844 -- 650843 to 653844. Regimental command post moved to P 647865 at 0700. No prisoners. Casualties: KIA - five (5); WIA - eighty-two (82).

11 January 1945, 1st battalion remained in position prepared to move to assembly area north of Bihain to support regiment's attack against Langlir. At 0210, the 2nd battalion moved from Otte to Bihain. Company E at 0415, moved to woods southeast of Bihain to block to west. At 0900, the Germans counterattacked with five tanks. Three were knocked out and the remaining two withdrew. 2nd battalion maintained their position to end of period. 1st battalion attacked at 1015 moving south and to the east of 2nd battalion in the direction of Langlir. 3rd battalion, with assistance of 155 artillery fire, neutralized enemy strong-point at P 645845 by 1330. Enemy withdrawing was pursued by artillery fire. Patrols were sent out to determine enemy locations. Attack was resumed at 2200 from a line P 644844 -- 647845 to 653844 and by 2400 had reached the edge of Petite Langlir along a line P 652836 -- 653839. Fourteen prisoners. Casualties: KIA - four (4); WIA - thirty-eight (38).

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12 January 1945, 1st and 3rd battalions continued their attack initiated at 112200. By 2400, 3rd battalion had occupied Petite Langlir and continued mopping up in the town during the morning. The 1st battalion had seized Langlir by 1300 and occupied a defensive position around the town and prepared to move to objective at 640806. The 2nd battalion continued its blocking mission and extended its line in column of companies to the south to a point 636814. At 1400, the 1st battalion in position at Langlir was relieved by 2nd battalion, 329th Infantry with instructions to attack along road south to P 647803. This move isolated any Germans remaining in the vicinity of P 645815. The 3rd battalion at 1400, advanced from Petite Langlir toward objective at P 660810 and reached a line 654815 -- 656817. Enemy resistance through the day consisted of artillery fire and tank fire from dug-in strong-points supported by infantry. There was no defined hostile main line of resistance. Prisoners: One hundred fifteen (115). Casualties: KIA - eleven (11) (Including 1st Lt. Arthur K. Ungren); WIA - thirty-seven (37).

13 January 1945, the 1st battalion continued its attack to the south from Langlir against heavy resistance from infantry and tanks. Progress was slow due to moving through woods at night. Company B reached the objective at 0700 and the battalion dug-in. At 2130, the battalion was relieved by the 3rd Armored Division and moved into assembly area, vicinity of Langlir. The 2nd battalion continued its attack night of 12th and 13th and by 0410, had reached its objective, edge of woods at 640806. Attack was slowed by dug-in tanks and infantry. Day-light revealed that six tanks and some infantry had been bypassed during the night and split Company E. Our tanks moved forward to meet the enemy and knocked out one tank and lost one Sherman. Remaining Nazi tanks and infantry withdrew. The battalion maintained its positions in defense until dark when it was relieved and moved to assembly position with Company F and Headquarters in Bihain and the rest of the battalion in Ottre. Battalion closed in vicinity of 660810, being subject to artillery fire most of the time. At 1700, the battalion began a side-slip to the northeast to relieve elements of the 329th Infantry and by 2400, had occupied a line P 664813 -- 668818 -- 665824. Fifty-seven (57) prisoners. Casualties: KIA - three (3); WIA - fifty (50); MIA - twenty-eight (28).

14 January 1945, 1st and 3rd battalions jumped off at 1000 from positions east of Langlir to clean woods to east and southeast and advanced to edge of woods east of Courtil. 1st battalion in column of companies, Company B leading, knocked out an enemy strong-point at a crossroads in vicinity 680820 taking twenty prisoners. Battalion continued its advance and by 1630, occupied a line P 687713 - 688817 - 689822. Patrols were then sent toward Courtil. The 3rd battalion advanced rapidly to the edge of the woods, being stopped once by a dug-in high velocity gun at 688803 which was silenced, by flanking action. Battalion then occupied a defensive position along line P 688803 -- 685807 -- 688810 before noon. 2nd battalion remained in regimental reserve throughout the day at Langlir. Patrols were sent to Courtil to determine strength and disposition of enemy. Artillery

fire was lighter than the previous day. Twenty-six (26) prisoners. Casualties: KIA - four (4); WIA - forty-four (44); MIA - three (3).

15 January 1945, 3rd battalion patrol to Courtil ran into enemy on road at 690804 and returned at 0030. At 0100, battalion was ordered to move one company (Company L) into Courtil. Company L was stopped by enemy resistance at 690804 and Company K was ordered to flank the position. However, at 0700, this attack was called off due to receipt of additional enemy information. Companies K and L continued to work on enemy resistance of tanks and infantry at road junction at 688803. Company I established a road block at 684800 at 0930. However, this position was recaptured by hostile counterattack. Company I was ordered to relieve Company K and reestablish block. At 1530, Company K had been relieved but road block not yet reestablished. At dark, enemy resistance at 690804 had not been eliminated. 2nd battalion remained in assembly area and made plans to attack Courtil from northwest at 1700. However, attack was not ordered put into effect. Four prisoners. Casualties: KIA - six (6); WIA - twenty-one (21); MIA - eight (8).

16 January 1945, 1st battalion remained in position during the day. Reconnaissance and preparations made for attack on Bovigny in conjunction with 329th Infantry. 2nd battalion moved to assembly area vicinity P 675823, and remained there until 1515. At this time, Company G led battalion to new positions vicinity P 682800, clearing out woods as they progressed. Companies F and G reached this position by 2400, Company E remained at P 672820. 3rd battalion enemy resistance continued active at P 683807. Attempt to establish road block at 683800 was successful only to the extent of being able to lay mines and cover by fire of riflemen, light machine gun and tank destroyer. Direct enemy observation made further work impossible. Later in the day, an artillery liaison plane reported that the strong-point at P 683807 consisted of three tanks. Artillery fire placed on the position knocked out one tank. The other two withdrew in the direction of Bovigny at 1315. Two prisoners. Casualties: KIA - eighteen (18); WIA - twenty-five (25); MIA - eighteen (18).

17 January 1945, new boundaries were assigned to the regiment early in the day with a shift to the right. The 329th Infantry began relief of the 1st battalion within its area at 0600, A and B Companies moving to assembly area at P 684805. New Left regimental boundary was east - west line through Y grid 815. Right boundary was Y grid 790. Prior to 0700, Company G had relieved Company L and occupied a position at 683804 just behind Company I. Tank Destroyers were placed at 685807 and 687807. Fire was brought on enemy tank at 688804 enabling Company I to advance to within 200 yards of road running southwest out of Courtil. Small arms fire stopped further advance. Plans were made for 1st and 2nd battalions to attack to southeast at 1200. 1st battalion to cut road into Courtil from southeast at P 705800. 2nd battalion to block to south and southwest across road at 682799. Attack jumped off at 1200. By 1800, 2nd battalion had accomplished its blocking mission and 1st battalion reached a line P 690797 -- 696802. During the action enemy launched a counterattack on 1st battalion's left flank from Courtil at 1400. Ten tanks accompanied by a company of infantry made the attack. Accurately TOT's placed on the attack destroyed the infantry, knocked out three tanks and forced the

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remainder to withdraw to Courtil. The 3rd battalion continued its attack on the strong-point at 688804 which was neutralized by 1200 when 1st battalion passed through Company I. The attack of the 1st battalion was slow due to hostile tank and small arms and heavy going underfoot. Some artillery fire was encountered. Two (2) prisoners. Casualties: KIA - one (1); WIA - forty-one (41).

18 January 1945, 1st battalion patrols sent to objective P 705800 met little resistance. Battalion moved forward at 0900 clearing out the woods before them during their advance. By 1430, Companies A and B were on the objective and controlled the road southeast from Courtil. At 0900, Company G moved south to the division boundary clearing out woods in their advance. Company E moved east to protect the right and rear of the 1st battalion. The 3rd battalion maintained its positions of the previous day protecting the wood line facing Courtil from the southwest, cutting the road southwest from Courtil and protecting the left flank of the 1st battalion. At 1830, a column of German tanks and trucks came out of Halcoureaux and moved along the road toward Courtil. Company A was forced back by tank fire but resumed its positions after the tanks had been dispersed in the direction of Courtil. At the end of the period units were disposed with A and B Companies and one platoon of Company C from P 702793 to P 701802. The 2nd battalion extended from P 681796 to P 699793. The 3rd battalion formed a semi-circle from north to south, Companies I, K, L (one platoon) in order from P 688802 to P 686807 to P 688809. One platoon of Company C and one squad of Company E filled a gap between the right of Company I and rear of Company A. Company L less a platoon was in rear of Company K. One prisoner. Casualties: KIA - eight (8); WIA - twenty-two (22); MIA - four (4).

19 January 1945, early in the morning plans were made for the relief of 1st battalion by one company of 329th Infantry and elements of the 2nd battalion and Regimental Maurauder platoon. During the afternoon, this relief was completed with Company K, 329th Infantry plus one section heavy machine guns and one section 81mm mortars. 3rd battalion remained in place with one squad of Company E on the right flank of Company I. The Maurauder platoon replaced Company A, backed by Company K, 329th Infantry. Company G replaced Company B. Companies E and F remained in place. One tank was moved into position at 696803 to assist in protection of north flank. Company K closed in its position at 1900. 1st battalion closed in billets at Langlir at 1800. Nine (9) prisoners. Casualties: KIA - two (2); WIA - sixteen (16); MIA - one (1).

20 January 1945, 1st battalion moved from vicinity Langlir at 1130. Battalion closed in vicinity of Aisne, Belgium at 1430. 3rd battalion was replaced by elements of 329th Infantry and left area at 1500, closing in new area at Faye, Belgium at 1800. Relief of the 2nd battalion by elements of 84th Division began at 1630. 2nd battalion immediately began movement to new area, cleared Ottre at 1800 and closed at La Beule, Belgium at 2240. No prisoners. Casualties: KIA - one (1); WIA - ten (10).

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This ended the 331st Infantry's part in the 1st Army's counter-attack against the German drive of December. The Regiment was in contact or heavily engaged with the enemy from 7 December 1944 to 20 January 1945. Total prisoners: Seven hundred thirty-five (735).

During the operation the regiment had its first experience in fighting in heavy woods and under winter conditions. Following are some of the more important lessons learned or reaffirmed.

1. Vehicles should be camouflaged (painted white).
2. Adequate winter clothing should be provided the infantry. Shoe packs and heavy woolen outer-garments are needed.
3. Engineers were invaluable in keeping open roads in a country where armor and all types of vehicles were road-bound by snow, mud and heavy forests. Engineers should be kept well forward.
4. Bull-dozers are invaluable and effort should be made to furnish extra equipment of this type.
5. The Germans still mine roads and ditches. No extensive mine-fields were found. In some instances mines were laid in open fields for no apparent reason as they presented little obstacle value. Abatis across roads was habitually mined.
6. German artillery was invariably placed on towns they had just evacuated and upon road intersections.
7. Upon our capture of an objective we could always expect artillery fire or a counter-attack, sometimes both, although the counter-attacks were limited to company size.
8. Snipers were not as prevalent as in the hedgerows.
9. Tank destroyers (SP) were invaluable to us and we kept them well forward as consistent with the situation. This practice smeared more than one counter-attack before it could gather momentum.
10. When the Germans did not have any of their own armor in close support and our infantry appeared with tanks or tank destroyers, the Germans withdrew or surrendered.
11. The German is still a tricky and wily foe and sometimes treacherous. We must be constantly on the alert for new tricks.

21 January 1945, regiment in its new area previously occupied same billets from 2 January to 7th inclusive. 1st battalion is at Aisne, 2nd battalion temporarily at La Beele, 3rd battalion at Fay, Cannon Company one and one-half kilometers northwest of Fay, Anti Tank Company at Grand Bru, Service Company at Werbement and Regimental command post at Grand Bru. Regiment spent day getting settled.

22 - 23 - 24 January 1945, spent in bathing troops at Hamoir. Movies shown to all units and visits made to unit areas by Red Cross Clubmobile. On 21 January, 2nd battalion less Company E moved to Jehanheid, Company E to Fagne. Care, cleaning and maintenance of weapons and vehicles carried on. Plans completed for training schedule to start on 25 January 1945, emphasizing weapons firing for remainder of week, particular attention being given to new reinforcements.

25 January 1945, work continued on rehabilitation and supply. 1st battalion conducted firing of rifle, carbine and machine guns. 2nd battalion carried on training in woods and trail fighting. 3rd battalion conducted small arms and rocket firing.

26 - 27 January 1945, all elements of the regiment conducted training to include range firing, woods and village fighting, movement across country in extended formations. Non-commissioned officers and officers met and discussed lessons learned in last operation. Combat Team Commander held a meeting of battalion commanders, Regimental Staff and commanders of units attached during previous operation. Weaknesses discovered during last operation were discussed and means of correcting them. Methods were discussed for improving coordination of effort with particular emphasis on tank support.

28 January 1945, regiment observed a day of rest. Religious services were held during the day.

29 - 30 January 1945, units continued training in woods fighting, use of marching fire and assault of enemy strong-points.

31 January 1945, all troops of command paid. Training continued in village and street fighting, assault of tanks and problems involving patrolling. All units witnesses showing of training film "Your Job in Germany".

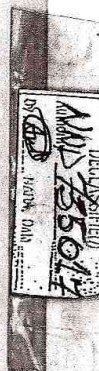

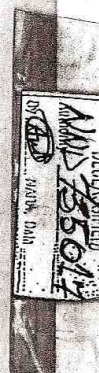

AFTER ACTION REPORT

JANUARY 1945

The following awards were awarded personnel of the 331st Infantry during the month of January 1945.

SILVER STAR MEDAL

FIRST LIEUTENANT HENRY C. WEINHARDT, O-1297629, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For distinguishing himself by gallantry in action on 10 July 1944, at Sainteny, France. During a terrific enemy bombardment of the town of Sainteny, it became necessary to send a very important message to the Regimental Command Post. All means of communications, except by messenger, had been cut, and the available route to the command post was being constantly subjected to enemy shelling aided by apparently direct enemy observation. All vehicles on the road immediately became targets for enemy artillery and many had been hit. When the Regimental Commander, who was then present, asked for a volunteer to carry the message, Lieutenant Weinhardt immediately volunteered for the hazardous mission, fully cognizant of the great risk involved. He set forth, travelling under constant and intense enemy shelling and was killed when his vehicle suffered a direct hit. The unswerving devotion to duty, unhesitant disregard for his own safety and staunch personal courage of this officer reflected the highest credit on himself and the finest traditions of the military service of the United States. Entered military service from Missouri. Residence: 4231 John Avenue, St Louis, Missouri.

BRONZE STAR MEDAL

STAFF SERGEANT CARL F. BRANDT, 36899482, (Then Sergeant), Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for distinguishing himself by meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Entered military service from Michigan.

STAFF SERGEANT JOSEPH H. GULASY, 33418875, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for distinguishing himself by meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

STAFF SERGEANT VERNON J. RICHTER, 37584593, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for distinguishing himself by heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Entered military service from Minnesota.

STAFF SERGEANT RICHARD G. TREGGE, 38501195, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for distinguishing himself by heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. Entered military service from Louisiana.

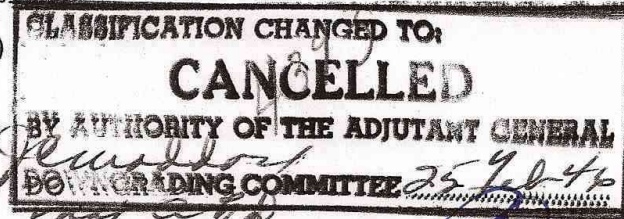

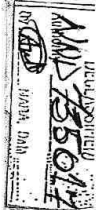

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APPENDIX NO. 1
NARRATIVE

1st and 2nd February 1945, training continued, including the following subjects: Woods fighting, village fighting, assault against tanks, attack on strongpoints, squad problems with emphasis on duties of leaders. On 2 February 1945, battalion S-3's and Regimental Staff witnessed a short demonstration of the M-24 light tank. Regimental Commanding Officer received warning order to move regiment on 3rd preparatory to future operations.

3 February 1945, normal training continued. Quarters parties left at 0815 for new assembly area. Move of regiment postponed.

4 February 1945, religious services held throughout command. No training.

5 February 1945, scheduled training to include squad and platoon problems. Test was given by Division to Company L on "Combat in Woods" and to Company G (3rd platoon) on "Attack of a Tank". Regiment alerted to move on 6 February 1945.

6 February 1945, regiment prepared to move to new area. Leading element crossed IP at Cherhalle at 1610. Closed vicinity of Berneau, Belgium at 2230. Order of march:

6 - 7 February 1945

7 February 1945, regiment spent the day in getting settled in new area, care and cleaning of equipment and maintenance of vehicles.

8, 9, 10 February 1945, all units again continued training in preparation for projected operations. Assault of pillboxes and squad and platoon problems were stressed. All units provided hot showers at near-by coal collieries. On 9th, Cannon Company attached to 908 Field Artillery Battalion and moved to firing positions.

11 February 1945, religious services held for all units during the day. No training conducted. Cannon Company relieved from attachment to 908th Field Artillery, returned to regimental area, closing at 2230.

12 February 1945, units continued training, emphasizing attack across open terrain with use of smoke. 2nd Battalion conducted exercise, battalion in night attack.

13 February 1945, training continued stressing approach and attack of villages. 3rd battalion conducted night exercise, Battalion in Attack.

14, 15, 16, 17 February 1945, all units continued training, stressing attack of villages, attack over open terrain and operations with tanks and night attacks. During this period Division tests were held as follows:

Night Attack	-	Company I on 14th
Night Attack	-	Company E on 15th

18 February 1945, no training. Religious services held in all areas.

19, 20, 21, 22 February 1945, units continued training stressing squad and platoon problems, attack over open terrain, attack of villages and attack in conjunction with light tanks (M-24). Night of 21st -22nd, all battalions conducted an exercise in occupation of a defensive position, withdrawal during darkness, move to an assembly area followed by a daylight attack. Billeting details left for new area at 0830, 21 February 1945.

23 February 1945, Regimental Commanding Officer, Assistant S-3, S-2, Battalion Commanders and Battalion S-2's left for new assembly area at 10:00. Remainder of regiment preparing for movement.

24 February 1945, regiment and attached units left billets in vicinity of Berneau, Belgium at 1315 and closed in area Alsdorf - Durboslar at 1900. Order of march:

Upon arrival in new area, platoon "Z", 453rd AAA Battalion reported as in support of regiment. Regimental command post and Headquarters Company located at K 891529; 1st Battalion and Service Company at Oidtweiler; 2nd Battalion at K 897531; 3rd Battalion and Tanks at Durboslar; T.D.'s, Anti Tank, Cannon and Engineers in vicinity of

25 February 1945, religious services held in all units. Following units moved from present location to areas indicated beginning at 1300. 2nd Battalion (less Company E) moved to Bettendorf; Company E moved to Oidtweiler; Anti Tank, Cannon, Company C, 308 Engineers, Company C, 308 Medical Battalion and Company C, 643rd T.D. Battalion moved to Hongen. Regiment during the afternoon was alerted to be prepared to move to east of Roer River night of 25th - 26th or daylight 26th. Alert was cancelled at 1900.

26 February 1945, Headquarters Company and Regimental command post moved to Siersdorf at 1300. Command post opened at Siersdorf at 1400. Regiment again alerted at 1540 to be prepared to move to east of Roer, vicinity of Welldorf night of 26th - 27th or daylight 27th. These orders were cancelled at 1800. Second Armored Division moving first. Reports of rapid progress by V and XIX Corps indicate early committment of Combat Team 331. Regiment notified to be ready to move on three (3) hour notice. Training continued during the day in attack over open ground and familiarization firing with so called 60 mm "knee" mortars.

27 February 1945, training continued in attack of villages and over open terrain. At 2242, the 3rd battalion with 1st platoon, Company C, 643rd T.D. Battalion in support, one platoon Company C, 308th Engineers attached together with the 908th Field Artillery and Company C, 308th Medical Battalion crossed the Roer River at Julich. Column was attached to CCB, 2nd Armored Division and proceeded under XIX Corps Military Police to Opherten and detrucked at 0100. The battalion rode forward on tanks to CCB's line of departure at Garzweiler. CCB jumped off at 0700, in the direction of Grevenbroich. Mission of the 3rd battalion was to follow the armor and mop up any pockets of resistance that were bypassed, then proceed east to Erft Canal in the vicinity of Grevenbroich. The battalion moved north-east behind the armor, passing through Elfgen and Elsen and then turning east. By 1700, the 3rd battalion had cleared and occupied that portion of Grevenbroich west of the Erft Canal.

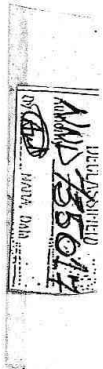
28 February 1945, at 0700, regimental command post group and the bulk of Regimental Headquarters Company left for Ameln (F 085858 where forward command post was established). The regiment (less 3rd battalion, Regimental Headquarters Company and 3rd platoon Anti Tank Company) with the following attachments and supporting units left regimental area at 0945.

Company C (-) 643rd T.D. Bn. (support)
Company C (-) 308th Engineer Battalion
Prov. Platoon 453rd AAA Battalion.

Column arrived at Kalrath (F 105665) at 1130. The column was here met by guides who led units to assembly areas generally astride the road from Garzweiler to Jackerath. Regimental command post was

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established at Garzweiler. From its initial assembly area, the 1st battalion moved to Elsen and thence to a line Bedburdyck to Hemmerden to relieve elements of CCB. This mission was accomplished by 2050. The 2nd Battalion moved to Belmen to assembly area. Regimental command post moved to Elfen at 1800. No other activity during the period. Casualties: WIA - Six (6). Prisoners: Three hundred and forty (340) estimated.

Personnel of the 331st Infantry Regiment who were awarded the Silver Star Medal during the month of February 1945.

FIRST LIEUTENANT RUFUS DOCKERY, O-1300143, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. (Posthumously) For distinguishing himself by gallantry in action on 14 December 1944 in Germany. Lieutenant Dockery, although under enemy observation, placed his mortar and machine gun in position and established his observation post near the last building at the edge of a town in Germany. As the combat patrol advanced on its mission it was met by intense enemy small arms, automatic weapons and artillery fire. Lieutenant Dockery continued to direct the fire of his weapons, personally pointing out the targets to the mortar crews. This drew heavy enemy artillery and mortar fire upon his position. When the gathering dusk and smoke of battle made it difficult to designate new targets, Lt. Dockery, with heroic disregard for his own safety, exposed himself to full view of the enemy and fired tracers from a rifle toward his targets for verification of his squad leaders. His daring action resulted in accurate fire on the enemy, but in the counter fire that was returned, the observation post received a direct hit and Lieutenant Dockery was killed. His fearless devotion to duty and outstanding courage reflect the highest credit on himself and the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Alabama. Residence: 2725 Third St., Tuscaloosa, Ala.

PRIVATE FIRST CLASS COSMO C CAPPUZZO, 20230037, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 15 December 1944, in Germany, which reflects the greatest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

STAFF SERGEANT JOSEPH A. NITROY, 33873544, Infantry, 331st Infantry United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 15 December 1944, in Germany, which reflects the greatest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

PRIVATE FIRST CLASS KENNETH E. RUTMAN, 36689584, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 18 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the greatest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Illinois.

CAPTAIN DANIEL M. MOORE, O1301517, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 16 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

TECHNICAL SERGEANT WILLIAM FEKAS, 12007910, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For distinguishing himself by gallantry in action on 11 December 1944 at Gev, Germany. Sergeant Fekas lead his machine gun section in support of the attack on a village. Enemy artillery fire pinned down the attacking units. With complete disregard for his safety, Sergeant Fekas continued forward to the

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crest of a hill to locate positions from which his gun sections could fire. After placing the guns, he continued forward to an observation post to direct the fire. Although he was exposed to intense enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire, he remained gallantly at his position until he was fatally wounded. The cool and courageous devotion to duty of this non-commissioned officer reflect the highest credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York. Residence: 511 West 139th Street, New York, New York.

STAFF SERGEANT ADAM W. KOSOBUCKI, 32955907, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For distinguishing himself by gallantry in action on 17 January 1945 in Belgium. During the advance of his company against an important highway in Belgium, six enemy machine guns supported by artillery fire were encountered. Sergeant Kosobucki with utter disregard for his own personal safety exposed himself to the enemy fire and called to his squad to follow him across the road. While leading his squad in this daring movement, Sergeant Kosobucki was killed by enemy fire, but his example of fearless determination so inspired his men that they continued on their mission and silenced the machine guns. The gallant and courageous devotion to duty of this non-commissioned officer reflect the highest credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey. Residence: Road #1, 2nd Avenue, West Cape May, New Jersey.

TECHNICAL SERGEANT HERSHEL A. METHENY, 6857125, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For distinguishing himself by gallantry in action on 13 December 1944, near Gey, Germany. Sergeant Metheny was platoon sergeant of a heavy machine gun platoon. A barrage of enemy mortars and artillery caused numerous casualties, including the platoon leader. With cool presence of mind, Sergeant Metheny went to the different squads reorganizing the men and rallying them to the attack. As the first squad was advancing two enemy snipers opened fire, halting the squad. Sergeant Metheny fired upon them with his sub-machine gun and ordered them to surrender. When they answered by a burst of fire, he charged their position, killing one and caused the other to expose himself to the fire of the platoon. In the course of this daring leadership of this non-commissioned officer he was fatally wounded. The fearless initiative and conspicuous leadership of Sergeant Metheny reflect the highest credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Nebraska. Residence: General Delivery, Grand Island, Nebraska.

FIRST LIEUTENANT DONALD L. NONAHUE, 01297693, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 11 December 1944, in Germany, which reflects the greatest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Minnesota.

PRIVATE FIRST CLASS THOMAS D. RUCHMAN, 35750650, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 12 December 1944, in Germany, which reflects the greatest credit upon himself and the Armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from West Virginia.

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STAFF SERGEANT HARRY L. COOPER, 39550370, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 10 December 1944, in Germany, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from California.

FIRST SERGEANT FREDERICK W. HELMERS, 6835318, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 12 July 1944, in France, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

PRIVATE FIRST CLASS ERNEST B. KAMINSKAS, 36684142, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 14 December 1944, in Germany, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Illinois.

FIRST LIEUTENANT JOSEPH W. SLOAN, 01319670, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 10 December 1944, in Germany, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Alabama.

TECHNICIAN FOURTH GRADE HENRY M. MARTIN, JR. 34329144, Infantry Medical Department, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 12 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Tennessee.

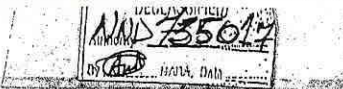
STAFF SERGEANT ARTHUR R. MAYBERRY, (Then Corporal), 33387867 Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For distinguishing himself by gallantry in action on 10 December 1944, in Germany. When the advance of the automatic rifle team he was leading was threatened by machine gun fire from an enemy dugout, Sergeant Mayberry with complete disregard for his own safety and outstanding leadership, succeeded in eliminating the position by killing four of the enemy and routing the others. The courageous devotion to duty of this non-commissioned officer reflects the highest credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Maryland. Residence: 4641 Park Heights Ave. Baltimore, Maryland.

CAPTAIN WILFRED F. BARBER, 01292989, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 11 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

SERGEANT WILLIAM P. COOPER, (Then Private First Class), 39621624 Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 12 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Montana.

STAFF SERGEANT FLOYD M. DOWSON, 34394172, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 10 December 1944, in Germany which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Alabama.

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FIRST LIEUTENANT DONALD W. DUNCAN, 01317080, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 18 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

STAFF SERGEANT NORMAN D. NEILY, 31177280, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 10 December 1944, in Germany, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

PRIVATE WHITNEY F. NORTON, 42141927, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 11 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.

CAPTAIN HARRY C. GRAVELYN, 01286998, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 14 December 1944, in Germany, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Michigan.

PRIVATE FIRST CLASS CARL L. WHITELEY, 36875020, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For distinguishing himself by gallantry in action on 11 December 1944, in Germany. Private Whiteley volunteered to eliminate an enemy machine gun emplacement which was holding up the advance of his platoon. Armed with a grenade launcher and accompanied by two riflemen he moved down a slight ravine until he was about 25 yards from the enemy position. Directing his assistants to cover him, he ran directly toward the enemy and succeeded in getting within ten yards of the emplacement before they opened fire. As the enemy fire reached its mark he was seen to momentarily falter but with heroic determination he continued onward and destroyed the position with his grenade before he fell forward mortally wounded. The sacrificial bravery and devotion to duty of this enlisted man reflect the highest credit upon himself and exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Michigan. Residence: 1739 North 22nd Street, Saginaw, Michigan.

SERGEANT FRANZ F. EGGER, 32927339, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 18 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New Jersey.

SERGEANT LEEOWEN LYNCH, 35665837, (Then private First Class) Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 18 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Kentucky.

PRIVATE FIRST CLASS HERBERT RAY, 32902531, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 11 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from New York.

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TECHNICAL SERGEANT PAUL N. LEWIS, 33023857, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 18 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States, Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

FIRST LIEUTENANT MAURICE G. REIDY, 01287061, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 11 July 1944, in France, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Massachusetts.

PRIVATE FIRST CLASS GEORGE W. EVANS, 35229339, Infantry, Company G, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For distinguishing himself by gallantry in action on 10 January 1945, in Belgium. Private Evans, after reporting the exact location of his platoon to the company commander, volunteered to return alone to his platoon because he knew that it was dependent upon him for further instructions although he knew that an enemy sniper lay hidden somewhere along the route. In carrying out this courageous action which was beyond the call of duty Private Evans was killed. The outstanding devotion to duty and personal bravery of this enlisted man reflect the highest credit upon himself and exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio. Residence: 1157 1/2 Woodland Avenue, Toledo, Ohio.

TECHNICAL SERGEANT JAMES L. LUSK, 35020969, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For distinguishing himself by gallantry in action on 19 July 1944, in France. When the need for ammunition for one of the attacking companies became critical, Sergeant Lusk organized a carrying party and set out across open, marshy terrain covered by enemy machine gun, mortar and artillery fire. In leading the men across this area Sergeant Lusk's display of fearless confidence inspired his men to continue moving aggressively toward their objective. When the company had almost been reached, Sergeant Lusk was mortally wounded by mortar fragments but his men were able to accomplish the vital mission. The heroic initiative and cool and courageous leadership of this non-commissioned officer reflect the highest credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio. Residence: 1154 Bittaker Street Akron, Ohio.

STAFF SERGEANT ALBERT F. MEIER, 35587994, Infantry, Company G, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For distinguishing himself by gallantry in action on 17 January 1945, in Belgium. Sergeant Meier, with heroic disregard for his own safety exposed himself to the enemy in order to locate their machine gun positions guarding a vital highway. Knowing the importance of securing the enemy positions he chose this course himself because he was not willing to have one of his men risk his life in such a maneuver. While engaged in this action a burst of machine gun fire mortally wounded him but the patrol inspired by his self sacrifice and aided by the information gained thereby, effected a crossing of the road and successfully eliminated the enemy positions. The gallant leadership and outstanding bravery of this non-commissioned officer reflect the highest credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Ohio. Residence: Applecreek, Ohio.

FIRST LIEUTENANT NOEL ANDERSON, 01304540, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 10 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. CAPTAIN WAYNE L. BART, 024707, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 5 July 1944 in France, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered United States Military Academy from New Jersey.

TECHNICAL SERGEANT ROBERT H. CLOPTON, 18007075, Infantry, 331st Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 13 January 1945, in Belgium, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Texas.

PRIVATE FIRST CLASS DELBERT C. SINGLER, 33430961, Infantry United States Army, for gallantry in action and disregard for personal safety displayed on 16-17 December 1944, in Germany, which reflects the highest credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

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APPENDIX I

NARRATIVE

27 February through 3 March 1945 - On the 27 February 1945, Combat team 331 and attachments were attached to CCB, Second Armored Division. Unit was alerted to move only one battalion. The 3rd Battalion was chosen and together with Company C, 308th Medical Battalion, 1st platoon Company C, 643rd TD Battalion (T), one platoon Company reached the Engineer bridge at Julich at 2242, where a guide from the 2nd Armored Division met the column and led them to Opherten (K 097690), arriving at 280200, where they detrucked and rested. At 0600, the battalion, riding on tanks of CCB, jumped off from a general east - west line through Garzweiler (K 129790) with Company I in the lead. The attack moved northwest astride the road to Neuss, successively attacking Elfgen and Elsen with Companies I and K. Small arms and machine gun fire were encountered. Resistance was light. One 88mm gun was knocked out and Company I captured six machine guns and three anti tank guns. One hundred seventy-five prisoners were captured. Company K advanced to Orken where it blocked to the north, while Company L turned east to Grevenbroich and advanced to the Erft Canal, clearing the town. At 1700, the 28th, Company I was at Elsen, Company K at Orken, and Company L at Grevenbroich.

The regiment (less the 3rd Battalion) and with Company C (-1 platoon) 643rd TD Battalion in support and Company C (-1 platoon) 308th Engineers and a Provisional platoon 453rd AAA Battalion attached, crossed the Roer river at Julich at 1010, 28 February and moved east and north via Stetternich - Steinstrass and Roddingen to Kalrath where guides met the columns and led them to assembly areas along the highway between Garzweiler and Jackerath. Cannon Company joined the 908th Field Artillery Battalion already in position. A regimental command post was set up in Garzweiler. Second Armored Division staff officer said the movement was one of the best he had seen particularly in view of the heavy traffic. The column began arriving at Kalrath at 1130 and by 1430 had cleared that point.

308-1000

The 1st Battalion detrucked just south of Garzweiler, moved again on foot at 1415 toward Elsen. Enroute, they were notified to proceed to Hemmerden and occupy and block the area Bedburdyck - Hemmerden. The movement was across flat fields in order, A, C, B and D Companies.

Outside of Elfgen at 1815, approximately 30 rounds of artillery shell fell in the vicinity causing but one casualty. The line Hemmerden - Bedburdyck was occupied at 2050. Several prisoners were taken in the area without putting up a fight.

The regimental command post was moved from Garzweiler to Elfgen at 1830. At 0030, 1 March 1945, order was issued to continue the advance to the northeast at 0430 from the northern edge of Hemmerden. The 1st Battalion was to follow CCB, protect their flanks and rear and mop up by-passed resistance. Attached to 1st Battalion was:

- 1 Platoon (SP) Company C, 643rd TD Bn.
- 1 Platoon medium Tanks (CCB)
- 1 Platoon Anti Tank Company

The 3rd battalion with one platoon Anti Tank Company was to occupy Kapellen to protect the right flank of the regiment. Company K to occupy Hemmerden and Company L to continue blocking mission at Grevenbroich.

The 1st battalion moved out from Hemmerden at 0105 to mount tanks of Second Armored Division. Formation: Companies A, C, D in column with Company B in reserve. By 0400, the tanks were in position ready for Company A and one platoon of Company C to get on them; moving out at 0515. Anti tank mines and fire from high velocity guns were encountered just south of Kockrath.

Hostile high velocity guns obtaining tree bursts killed Lieutenant Bates and wounded seven men. Meeting light resistance and suffering no further casualties,

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the battalion had advanced to Rockrath by 0810 and pushed on across country reaching Grefrath at 0915 with Companies A and B in the lead. By 1030, Grefrath had been cleaned out. No contact had been made with the 2nd battalion in Loveling to the east. The battalion consolidated and prepared to advance on Buttgen. This movement was started at 1145. By 1600, the battalion (less detachments) was firmly established in Buttgen. Company A and a platoon of Company B advanced to the Nord Canal in the vicinity of Hinterfield to assist the Armor in holding road block established and bridgehead over canal. Tanks, T.D.'s and anti tank guns were in support of this force.

During the advance on Buttgen, Lieutenant Ritchie with one squad of Company D had knocked out an enemy strong point at a cross road at 226876, captured thirty-six prisoners and two 88 guns, two AA guns and five trucks.

The 2nd battalion moved from detrucking point in the vicinity of Hemmerden at approximately 0300, moved northeast and by 0515, company E passed through B Buscherhof, Bangartz and Rockrath, taking fifty prisoners while Company F was headed for Loveling and Company G for Holzheim. By 0700, F and G Companies had both cleared Loveling and Holzheim taking some 200 prisoners. Company E in Rockrath was told to be ready to move to new objective.

At 0530, the battalion command post had closed in Rockrath. Word was received that a counter attack had cut the 2nd battalion's supply line at Vierwoinden attempting to get into Hemmerden at 0730. By 0900, the situation had cleared sufficiently to permit moving of the command post to Holzheim. At this time Company C was moving into the southern edge of the "housing project at 270863". Slight resistance was met and some prisoners taken.

At 1030, company E was told to move up and complete the cleaning out of the "housing project". Company E arrived on their objective at 1200 and quickly accomplished their mission. By 1700, the battalion had consolidated its gains, facing east in a position along the highway from 263853 to 266867. Losses for the day had been nine wounded.

As part of the regimental plan for the day, Company K advanced to Hemmerden and took up positions around the town. Company I followed K and moved on Kapellen with the mission of clearing the town, covering the canal curving to the east and protecting the MSR leading north. By 0815, Company I reported the town cleared and were reorganizing. They captured thirty-three prisoners, killed twenty-seven and knocked out two Mark V tanks. Regimental command post was moved from Elfgen to Hemmerden and closed at 0530. Company L remained at Grevenbroich.

At about 1000, enemy tanks appeared at Sierkeller, a total of six being sighted. One pushed on into the northern edge of Hemmerden, knocked out a T.D. gun and continued on into Hemmerden where it in town was destroyed by another T.D. P 47's worked over the remaining tanks and knocked out three. Tanks and T.D.'s fire forced the others to withdraw, to the northeast. Later in the day, tanks appeared southeast of Kapellen but were driven off. Throughout the day, artillery and high velocity shells fell in Hemmerden. There were no casualties. Casualties in the 3rd battalion were three wounded.

2 March was a red letter day for the 331st Infantry. Elements of the regiment were the first to reach the Rhine and the regimental command post saw more close action than at any time since Normandy.

The 1st battalion remained in the vicinity of Buttgen and Hinterfield throughout the day. At 1500, the battalion was relieved from attachment to US Second Armored Division and attached to the 330th Infantry. At the same time the regiment reverted to control of the 83rd Division.

At 2330, the 1st battalion on the left flank of the 330th moved through Hinterfield in the direction of Heide - Bruche and Meer. The 2nd battalion resumed operations toward the Rhine at 0130, with the mission of taking Nixhutte Grimlinghauserbrücke and the group of buildings at 295885 on the banks of the Rhine. At 0140, Company G reported that they had occupied Nixhutte, and by 0230, Company F had cleared Grimlinghauserbrücke and taken a few prisoners. Company E, however, seemed to have struck the German forces in the area. Two platoons led by Captain Oliver ran into stiff resistance near 295885. In the dark, the Ger-

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mans closed in from the flanks and captured thirty-five men including Captain Oliver and Lieutenant Welch and inflicting some casualties. The 2nd platoon, however, reached the Rhine at 0500 and claimed the honor of being the first troops to do so. By 1130, it was obvious that Company E would need some help to kill or capture the Germans remaining in the area. Company G, a platoon of F and a company of tanks moved to the southern edge of Neuss, left the platoon of F to protect their rear and then swung east toward 295885. By 1500, the area was cleared and 200 prisoners captured. By 1900, the battalion was buttoned up with Company G consolidated on the Rhine, Company F in Grimlinghauserbrücke, and Company E in the southern edge of Neuss after being completely relieved by Company G.

3rd battalion shortly after midnight, when the 2nd battalion jumped off toward the river, Companies L and K moved up to Holzheim, closing between 0200 and 0230. Later in the morning (1030), Company L relieved Company G at Nixhutte. At 0705, Company I in Kapellen reported that they were receiving a counter attack with tanks and infantry. One enemy tank was knocked out by a mine, one of our anti tank guns over run. Other details were obscure. Accordingly, Company C was ordered to move from Buttgen to Hemmerden to give the regimental command post additional protection. Command post personnel were alerted and the Marauder and I & R platoons put in defensive positions on the northern and southern edge of Hemmerden. Command post personnel from rear command post 3rd battalion were also used. At 0800, five tanks were reported approaching Kapellen from 224810. Request was immediately made to Division for air support to knock out this threat. One platoon of tanks was alerted to move into Kapellen. At approximately 0900, three tanks appeared at Bierkeller just northwest of Kapellen. P 47's strafed this group, setting one afire. The other two withdrew a short distance and halted apparently out of order. The company commander of the attached T.D. Company reported that one of his platoons had been caught in a road cut near Bierkeller while going into position at 0700. Three men who escaped and returned reported that all of the guns and half-tracks had been knocked out by tanks. These same German tanks firing at the crossroad at 213825 had knocked out two 2 1/2 ton trucks, one command car, one half-track and two jeeps belonging to other organizations while they were attempting to move south on the highway. A friendly patrol sent to this cross road to determine strenght of enemy in vicinity of the cross roads were halted by machine guns firing from the vicinity of Bierkeller. A medium tank from the Second Armored Division fired eight rounds into Bierkeller, silencing the machine guns and starting a fire. At 0950, the commanding officer of the 120th Infantry (30th Division) reported into the command post that he had instructions to assist us. Plans were made to relieve Company I with Company A, 120th Infantry and a company of medium tanks. At 1005, the platoon of tanks that had been alerted to move into Hemmerden was told that they would not be needed. At 1055, Company I reported that the enemy had withdrawn and things were quieting down. However, at 1130, two enemy tanks again appeared south of Kapellen and the air was called on to knock them out. These tanks withdrew to the south at 1315.

At noon, Lieutenant Colonel Bailey was wounded by a sniper while passing through Weckhoven. He was evacuated and Major Sellers took command of the battalion. Company C was returned to 1st battalion at Buttgen and by 1630, relief of Company I was begun. First reports from Company I listed ninety men missing in action, the result of the first German counter attack that had cut off parts of the 1st and 2nd platoons. The elements of Company I, that had been relieved, were assembled, marched to Hemmerden, fed and moved by truck to Holzheim. Lieutenant Miller, Assistant S-3, who had gone into Kapellen with Company A, 120th Infantry, returned with three men who stated that there were still some Company I men in the town. A further search resulted in finding thirty-three men. Five more showed up the following day. Regimental command post moved to Grafrath at 2300, opening at 2330. The final count of missing in Company I cut the number down to twenty nine. Casuals in the battalion for the day were five killed eight wounded and twenty-nine missing.

3 March the 1st battalion continued its mission of the flank of the 330th, passing through Neuserfurth and Weinenberg thence northeast to Meer. Enroute it was necessary to remove a road block and fill a bomb crater in the road in order to get the vehicles forward. Company B, 308th Engineers removed the road block and Company B filled up the crater with rocks. Company C and A continued toward Meer, Company C passing through and company A mopping up taking 150 prisoners. This

was at 0130. Company C continued to Buderich. Company B and one platoon of Company C mounted on fourteen medium tanks and four tank destroyers attached followed Company C as far as Buderich. Here a flash message from Company C informed the battalion commander of mine fields on the road adjacent the Rhine river, so the route of the tank T.D. - infantry task force was changed to pass by the metal factory at Oberlorick. At this time Company C had patrols within 200 yards of the Rhine. At the edge of this factory one of our tanks was knocked out by a mine, killing one and wounding five, holding up B Company temporarily. A and C Companies continued toward the bridge harassed by scattered small arms fire and fire from AA guns. A Company reached the bridge (324930) at 0930 and was preparing to send a platoon across when the middle span was blown out.

Company B in the meantime had continued their advance and passed A and C and took up positions facing the river, south of Company A. The battalion was then in position along the river from 320927 to 320935. At 1040, the battalion was detached from the 330th and reverted to control of the 331st. Casualties were two killed, one wounded and three missing. From Hemmerden to Oberkassel the 1st battalion captured 492 prisoners, exclusive of stragglers who were sent to the rear without guards, 482 being captured from Oberlorick to Oberkassel.

Company C - 208 Prisoners
 Company A - 150 Prisoners
 Company B - 84 Prisoners
 Company D - 40 Prisoners

The 2nd battalion remained in its positions of the previous day. The only activity was heavy shelling at 1500 hours in Company F area causing some casualties. At 1700, the battalion was relieved by the 2nd battalion, 329th Infantry at 2100. Battalion moved to Weissenburg and occupied billets there, closing in at 040015. Troops were shuttled on organic transportation. Casualties were nine killed and eight wounded.

The 3rd battalion moved from Holzheim to Neusserfurth during the morning, closing in at 1200. A road block to the east was established at road junction 250915. No other activity.

Regimental command post was moved to Neuss, closing in at 1715. Located at 262902. All units were instructed to rest, reorganize and check equipment.

During the operation 27 February 1945 to 3 March 1945, the regiment suffered the following casualties.

4 March the 1st battalion moved its position of 3 March (330th Area) to billets in vicinity of Neklenbroich (266952). Company F established an outpost line along the Erft Canal within the regimental area. No change in other units.

Road blocks and patrols were established to prevent circulation of civilians. Units continued resting and rehabilitation.

5 March screening of all male civilians of military age was begun by CIC detachments aided by teams from each battalion. This was concurrent with a search among the civilians for firearms of any type. The 2nd battalion increased its outpost along the Erft Canal. Two platoons each of F and G Companies, F Company on the right occupied a line from 270905 to 291925. No other changes.

6 March screening and search for weapons continued. Troops engaged in improvements of billets, care of equipment and clothing. Critique was held at Regimental Headquarters at 1600 hours on the last operation. Faults and weaknesses were discussed and means of correcting same taken under consideration.

7 and 8 March screening of civilians continued. Training begun by all battalions in use of assault boats and street fighting.

9 March instruction given in loading of personnel and equipment on "ducks". Familiarization and test firing of "Panzerfaust" begun. Screening continued.

10 March screening by CIC completed. School for officers in adjustment of artillery fire begun. Training in use of Panzerfaust continued. 1st battalion conducted night training in use of assault boats.

11 March church services held for all organizations. No training except 2nd battalion conducted night exercise in use of assault boats.

12 March 1st and 3rd battalions conducted training in attack over open terrain and attack of a village. 2nd battalion training in reconnaissance and occupation of a village. 3rd battalion also conducted training in attack over open terrain with tanks in support.

13 and 14 March tank-infantry training continued and emphasized. Instruction in Panzerfaust continued.

15, 16, and 17 March training continued, the highlights of which were:

- Tank-Infantry
- Street Fighting
- Panzerfaust Firing
- Mortar Firing
- Battalion CPX
- Adjustment of Artillery fire

A 100 percent inspection of small arms was made by 783rd Ordnance Company. On the 17th, beginning at 1300, regiment conducted a battalion field exercise for the 1st battalion. Exercise included attack over open terrain with tanks, occupation and organization of a position, followed by a night attack over a canal.

18 March no training. Church services held for all organizations.

19 and 20 March units continued training with assault boats, squad problems and firing of Panzerfaust. On the 19th, warning order was issued to units for move west to Maas (Meuse) river to conduct training in river crossings. Regiment to be relieved by elements 379th Infantry, 95th Division. Quartering party left for new area at 191300. Preparations made for move to new area.

21 March 1st and 2nd battalions began training in river crossings which consisted



21 March 379th Infantry assumed responsibility for regimental area at 0600. Head of column crossed IP at 0745, and closed in new area at 1220. Regimental command post opened at Susteren, Holland (K 687758) at 1030. 1st battalion at Stein (K 733718); 2nd battalion at Moosteren (K 655776); 3rd battalion at Ohee (677776) Headquarters, Service, Anti Tank Companies at Susteren, Cannon Company at Isenbruch.

22 March 1st and 2nd battalions began training in river crossings which consisted of squads loading into assault boats and rowing across Maas River carrying their organizational support weapons. 3rd battalion conducted training in street and village fighting.

23 March 1st and 2nd battalions conducted training in technique of village fighting and mopping up of a village. 3rd battalion conducted company exercise in technique of river crossings, and at night, practice by squads of night crossings.

24 and 25 March 1st battalion conducted exercise, company and battalion in attack of a river line. 2nd battalion conducted training in attack of a town with tanks, T.D.'s and other supporting weapons. Night of 25th, assault across a stream at night. 3rd battalion conducted exercises in attack over open terrain and assault of a river line at night.

26 March all units participated in a regimental field exercise, involving attack through a bridgehead with supporting tanks and T.D.'s moving rapidly over extended distance. Exercise began at 1000 and ended at 1800. Regiment alerted to move to new area near Munchen-Gladbach on the next day.

27 March movement to new area delayed. Preparations made for move.

28 March trucks to completely motorize regiment received during the morning. Trucks from 9th Army are to remain with combat team. Regiment crossed IP at cross road east of Echt, Holland at 2003 in order:

Column closed vicinity of Kleinenbroich, German at 2400.

29 March 1945, regiment in billets alerted to move during the day to east of Rhine river to assembly area preparatory to resuming offensive operations. Combat team 331 passed IP at Willich, Germany, at 1428, crossed Rhine east of Rheinberg and went into assembly area northwest of Bruckhausen. Command post at (A 283359). Combat Team closed at 2115. The leading elements of the 1st battalion reached the east bank of the Rhine at 1645.

30 and 31 March - Regiment was alerted to be prepared to cross the Ems canal in the vicinity of Hunxe, move rapidly to the east and follow the 2nd Armored Division, mopping up any pockets of resistance that may be by-passed. The RCT crossed the IP at Hunxe at 2204 and closed in assembly area in the vicinity of Haltern at 310215.

The 1st battalion (motorized) was given the mission of relieving elements of the Second Armored Division in Olfen, thirteen kilometers to the east by 0600. The battalion moved out at 0430, but was delayed by Second Armored Division columns on the road. Just east of Haltern, three rounds of artillery fell close to the column, one round wounding Captain Bart, the Battalion S-3. By 1100, the 1st Battalion had reached Olfen and reported it clear. A and C Companies occupied the east bank of the east branch of the Dortmund Ems Canal, east of Olfen. Patrols

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to Berk reported that place clear at 1400.

Rapid advance by the Second Armored Division made it imperative that the regiment close up at once. Accordingly, the 2nd battalion left the vicinity of Haltern at 1200 and closed in Offen at 1400. The 3rd battalion followed at 1230 and closed in assembly area in woods at 710470 at 1600. Reconnaissance to Walstedde by officer patrol from 3rd battalion proved that place to be unoccupied. Orders were received to continue the advance after dark. The advance was continued by the 3rd battalion at 2145 with the following units attached:

- 2 Platoons Medium Tanks - 736th Tank Bn.
- 1 Platoon Light Tanks - 736th Tank Bn.
- 1 Platoon Assault Guns - 736th Tank Bn.
- 1 Platoon T.D.'s - 643rd T.D. Bn.
- 1 Platoon Anti Tank Company.

By 2400, the battalion had passed through Selm and was east of Sudkirchen. The Regimental Commander and operations group moved to Nordkirchen at 2030 and established a command post at that place. Casualties: One (1) wounded. Prisoners: None.

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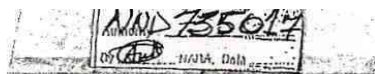

FIRST LIEUTENANT BERNARD F. BAUGH, 01316875, Infantry, Headquarters Company, First Battalion, 331st Infantry, United States Army. For distinguishing himself by gallantry in action on 6 August 1944 at St. Benoit-des-Ondes, France. When the advance of his unit was held up by a twelve man enemy patrol about to ignite TNT blocks on a mined bridge, Lieutenant Baugh, despite the intense covering enemy machine gun and mortar fire, fearlessly crossed the bridge and with the aid of a British officer engaged the enemy in a fire fight. His cool and accurate fire was responsible for killing eight of the enemy and causing the remainder to retreat. During the engagement the British officer was wounded, and with complete disregard for his own safety Lieutenant Baugh went to a position forward of the wounded officer and covered him with rifle fire until he was able to crawl to safety. His while engaged in this gallant action Lieutenant Baugh was fatally wounded. His conspicuous courage and outstanding devotion to duty reflect the highest credit on himself and the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States. Entered military service from Washington. Residence: Port Angelus, Washington.

SERGEANT JAMES P.
