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OPERATION



During the month of April 1945 the 308th Engineer Battelion was busier than at any other time since arriving on the Continent. The Companies supported the Infantry Regiments throughout and performed many tasks among them being read block removal, mine awaeping, ferry operation, assault river crossings, bridge construction, mine laying and removal, and bridge security guard.

For the first six days of the month until the Division reached the Weser river the Engineer Battalion assisted the Division by clearing roads to the east and preparing bridges on the southern flank for desclition. A class 40 three span timber bridge was constructed at NEWHAUS in order to shorten the main supply route. (B6760)

On 6 April 1945 one Infantry Regiment reached the Weser river in the vicinity of BODENWERDER (C2277) where the enemy had destroyed all existing bridges. So that no momentum would be lost, an element of this Regiment crossed the Weser river over the 2nd Armored Division bridge in the vicinity of GROHEDE (C1681) and then swung back into the Division area. The Engineers constructed and operated two ferries one at KANNAD (C2277) and the other at HENLEN, to support this unit. The ferries were of the trail type and the existing enemy trolley cable equipment was used. The operation was very successful.

On 8 April 1945 the other Regiment reached the Weser river in the vicinity of POLLE (G1868) after breaking bitter encoy replatance. At 0900 hours the Angineers supported the assault crossing and later constructed a motor-drivem Infantry support ferry. The crossing was made with two companies abreast, resistance was light. An ME treadway bridge was started by the 246th Angineer Battalion at the ferry site near FOLLE at 1050 hours and was finished at 2050 hours after experiencing some difficulty with the swift current.

The Division then continued moving eastward. The crossing of the Leine river presented no problem as the Division had advanced so rapidly that the energy was unable to establish an effective rearguard action. All bridges were left intact and were suitable for Division loads.

Two Regisents then raced on towards the Elbe river while the third attacked the enery in the HARZ mountains and protected the southern flank so that the forward supply lines would not be cut.

One Regiment reached the Elbe river on 12 April 1945 after eliminating the encay's stiff resistance in the vicinity of BARBY (D8582). A double track railroad bridge, the only bridge in the Division area was demolished by the encay on the afternoon of 11 April 1945.

On the afternoom of 12 April 1945, two Regiments made assault crossings in the visinity of BAREY. Each Regiment used 54 boats crossing two companies abreast. He difficulties were experienced during the initial phases of the crossing but after the Infantry pushed on, encey self propelled guns started shelling the crossing site. Immediately after the first companies crossed the Ingineers constructed one five boat treadway raft and three Infantry support rafts. The operation of these ferries, especially the treadway ferry was of prime importance for they enabled the Infantry companders to be supplied during the entire operation until the treadway bridge was completed. Over two hundred heavy vehicles including medium tanks and TD's were ferried across on the treadway ferries. This contributed immeasurably to the success in repelling several serious counterattacks. Soon after the TD's arrived on the energy shore the self propelled guns were silenced and at no other time was there any artillery fire on the crossing site.



Later in the afternoon an M2 treadway bridge was constructed by the supporting 295th Engineer Battalion at the existing ferry site immediately southeast of BAHN. It was completed without difficulties except for some indirect artillary on the morning of 15 April 1945.

During the next two days the encay made several counterattacks but failed to penatrate the bridgehoad.

In order to make the bridgehead more secure it was decided to construct an additional treadway bridge over the libe at the ferry site 4 kilometers south of bANBY. However to accomplish this it was necessary to make an assault crossing of the Saale river and drive the encey from the pocket between these two rivers. On the afternoon of 15 April 1945 the Company C, this organization supported an assault crossing of the 320th infantry Regiment of the 55th infantry Hivision. Only 17 boats were used as one battallow crossed on a partially destroyed railroad bridge. Although the encey was well entrenched on the opposite shore the assault crossing was made without a shot being fired. An Infantry support raft was operated until the treadway bridge was completed the next atternoon. The bridge was started at midnight 15-16 April 1945 and its construction progressed satisfactorily until in the early morning, when an encey patrol infiltrated through our lines and fired on the bridge and personnel with machine gun and small arms. Considerable damage was done to pontons and equipment but the bridge was completed at 1500 hours.

Shortly after the attack the Engineers constructed a five boat treadway ferry to transport 4 light tanks across the river. This ferry was later used in the bridge.

The next morning at day broak the 2nd bridge over the Elbe was started and was completed at 1750 hours without difficulties by the 254th Engineer Battalion.

The enery became very sensitive to our new bridge and made several attempts to destroy both bridges. First the artillery became more pronounced. Then for two nights concentrated enery artillery became more pronounced. Then for two nights concentrated aerial bosbarchent attacks were made. Our anti-aircraft prevented their hitting the bridges, but the bombs dropped caused several casualties in the general area of the bridges. Soon the energy launched numerous floating mines upstream which floated downstream but never seriously threatened the bridges because of the anti-sine booss which had been installed about 600 yards upstream. In addition to the anti-mine boos, Engineer riflemen were stationed upstream and on the bridges to shoot at any mines which were sighted. In spite of all the precautions, one mine case within fifteen feet of the bridge before it was finally destroyed by rifle fire. The concussion from this mine was quite severe and caused one casualty but no serious damage to the bridge. A day or two later the enemy gent two crews of swimping saboteurs downstream. One of the reported crews was never located. The other crew consisting of two BM and one Officer were all finally captured. They experienced great difficulty with the mine boos and were forced to give up their mine after working an hour and a half trying to free it from the boom. No more attempts to destroy the bridges were made.

Shortly after the bridges were completed a portion of each of the Engineer compenies assisted the Infantry in laying and recording minefields along the MLR of the bridgehead. Nearly 14,000 mines were laid, in addition, many anti personnel and trip flare devices were installed.

During the last few days of the month the Engineers started to recover the minefields and open roads to the cast in order to make contact with the Russians.

The ingineers worked two days in the 4043 of 200857 (19985) with three DV desers to clear the rubble from the main routes to the east. In one section of the town the streets were completely blocked with debris 10 feet high. Streets were successfully cleared for two way traffic.

On the last day of the month one platoon supported the Calvary Squadron to clear roads out to the extreme front near the Russian advanced elements in this sector;
