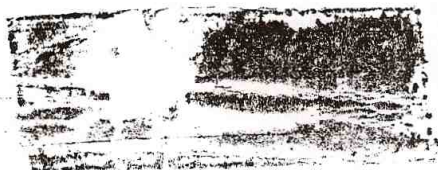

1. In accordance with paragraph 10 (c3) AR 345-105, the following report after action against enemy for the month of June, 1944, is hereby submitted.

2. On 27 June 44 the 330th Infantry regiment relieved those elements of the 101st Airborne Division which were holding the sector along the general line 358819 380815 419818 (Map reference-France, 1/50,000, LaHaye-DuPuits 6 E/5)

3. The activity from the time of relief until 2400 30 June 44 consisted of aggressive patrolling and some exchange of artillery fire.

~~SECRET~~ Report After Action Against the Enemy.

TO : The Adjutant General, Washington, D.C. (Thru Channels).  
In accordance with paragraph 10, (c-3), AR 345-105, the following report after action for the month of July 1944 is submitted.  
Period: 1 July through 31 July.

Location 1.8 miles SE of CARENTAN, 375823. Regiment occupying defensive positions.

Action was limited to night patrolling and the exchange of s/a and arty fire.

Casualties very light.

4 July. The Regiment in conjunction with units on the right and left launched an attack at 0500 after a 15 minute arty preparation. 1st and 2nd Bns in the assault. The attack met stiff resistance especially mortar and arty fire which was zeroed in on hedgerows over which the attack had to pass. At 0800 the 2nd Bn was pinned down by mortar and arty fire and were unable to advance. The attack was halted. 1st Bn resumed the attack at 0855. The 2nd Bn received a counterattack and was forced to withdraw to their original O.P.L. The 3rd Bn was committed at 1907 across the 2nd Bn front and were held up at 1937. Very little progress was made during the day.

5. July 1944. Regiment resumed attack at 0900. The 2nd Bn was ordered to assemble and reorganize and be prepared to attack by 1400. 2nd Bn was committed at 1550 to assist 1st Bn whose situation was not good. 3rd Bn was attached to 329th Inf. 1st and 2nd Bns resumed attack at 2030 and reached objective at 2132. Progress slow.

6. July 1944. 3rd Bn heavily shelled at 0100 as it moved into position with 529th. Shelling disorganized the Bn and caused heavy casualties. Co L was cut off from Bn received enemy counterattack in considerable force which was beaten off after inflicting heavy casualties. 3rd Bn by-passed by 529th.

7 July 1944.

Enemy counterattacked at 0500, attack was repulsed but counterattack delayed Regt from launching its attack at 0800. Regt supported by company of tanks attacked.

Enemy tanks were encountered, two of which were knocked out by AT gun fire. 3rd Bn cut off, communication lines cut, ammo and food delivered in jeeps escorted by light tanks. 1st and 2nd Bn advanced abreast  $2\frac{1}{2}$  Kilometers and reached objective relieving pressure on 3rd Bn. This advance was made possible by use of a rolling arty barrage, which chisled a narrow penetration through enemy positions leaving a number of small enemy groups on each flank.

8 July 1944.

Attack was resumed, enemy tanks and assault guns encountered. Our tanks were unable to assist materially in advance, suffering heavy losses. Enemy tanks counterattacked but were stopped by bazooka and sticky grenade teams. Regtl OP attacked by tank. Tank was knocked out. 1st and 2nd Bns Aid Stations captured. Regtl received 320 replacements.

9 July 1944.

An attack scheduled for 0900 started off when scouts moved out at 0830 to get to L.D. Our attack held up by delay in arrival of supporting tanks. Attack never reached L.D. due to enemy tanks located in front of the center of 2nd Bn. Tanks stopped our attack during the morning. At 1345 a plan to reduce the tanks holding up the attack was put into action but the arty concentrations fell 300-400 yards short and accompanying friendly tanks ran into fire and the attack failed. At 1540 C.O. stated he had been relieved of command of Regt by Div C.O. Asst Div C.O. arrived and took over temporary command of Regt. At 1830 a third attack planned by acting Regtl C.O., was launched and the net gain was from 200 to 300 yards with furthestmost elements almost reaching M.L.R. The operation finished at this point with 7 tanks found to oppose us, used as stationary pill boxes firing from hull down positions. During the advance of assault Bns the reserve Bn occupied positions formerly occupied by 1st and 2nd Bns.

At 2225 the order was given to return under cover of darkness to original positions occupied before the attack.

10 July 1944.

Colonel McLendon officially relieved of command. 3rd Bn arrived in assembly area at 1130 for an attempt to envelope enemy right flank. Crossed the L.D. at 1414 delay being caused by inability of the tanks to get up on time. 3rd Bn advanced 200 yards from L.D. and ran into road blocks covered by fire from tanks. 15 tanks estimated to be in whole area. Little progress made and 3rd Bn ordered to withdraw to original assembly area. Well placed concentrations and time fire causing great damage to Germans who were caught in open for first time.

11 July 1944.

Attack resumed at 1030. Attack supported by dive bombing. Situation improved and 1st and 2nd Bns broke through defense line held by tanks. After supporting tanks and T.D.'s were left behind by the Infantry.

12 July 1944.

Operations consisted of cleaning up LE PORT peninsula, 385762.

13 July 1944.

Regt, (less two reinforced rifle companies garrisoning the LE PORT peninsula) moved into assembly area. Col. Foster assumed command of the Regt.

14 July 1944.

2nd Bn attached to 531st for their support. Regiment, (less 2nd Bn,) was attached to 9th Division and proceeded to LES CHAMPS DE LOSQUE, 395712.

15 - 17 July 1944.

Regt (- 2nd Bn) made coordinated attack against REMILLY SUR LUZON, 381708, with units of 9th Inf Div at 1130. It was necessary for 3rd Bn to make a stream crossing during this operation. Enemy had observation on the stream and 3rd Bn suffered casualties from small arms fire. 24th Cav was attached to Regt and assisted Regt in accomplishing mission successfully.





18 - 24 July 1944.

Regt reverted to 83d Div control on 18th. Slow but steady progress made during period against stubborn resistance. Approximately 225 replacements received during this time.  
25 - 28 July 1944.

Regt began attack at 1110 coordinating with 9th Div on left. Attack was preceded by 80 minute bombing preparation by some 1800, dive, medium and heavy bombers. Greatest part of bombing being done in 9th Div sector. Attack made slow progress toward PERIERS - LESSAY road, 365692. Heavy fire from all arms encountered. Flanking fire from MARCHESLEUX, 356719, area being effective against us. 106th Cav protected our right and left flank and maintained contact with 60th Inf on our left. Casualties: 273. The left elements of Regt reached the PERIERS - LESSAY road, 368685, on evening of 26th. Very stiff resistance by enemy covering withdrawal of forces from MARCHESLEUX area, met by Regt at key road junction on PERIERS-LESSAY Road. On 28th July Regt took final objectives and began rapid advance to the south to LEBORY, 389815.

29 - 31 July 1944.

Regt continued to mop up enemy pockets of resistance, which had been by-passed in rapid advance, and to occupy defensive position. 83d Div passed to Corps reserve, and the Regt was alerted for possible movement on short notice.

Total casualties for July 2150.

Total replacements received in July 2681.

3 September 1944.

SUBJECT: Report After Action Against the Enemy.

TO : The Adjutant General, Washington, D.C. (Thru Channels).

In accordance with paragraph 10, (c-3), AR 345-105, the following report after action for the month of August 1944 is submitted.

Period: 1 - 2 August 1944

Location: LE LORY (389815). Div in Corps reserve. Regiment reorganizing; cleaning and repairing equipment. Training in hedgerow fighting and firing MGs, bazookas and rifle grenades carried out. Reconnaissance of roads and assembly areas to S & S.W. made in conjunction with an alert order for movement.

3 August 1944

At 0005, CG issued order for Regiment to move by motor to assembly area in vicinity of FONTORSON (1602), a move of 75 miles. 330th Combat team, motorized crossed IP at 0225, and closed into assembly area at 1455. Entire move made without encountering enemy action but considerable delay was caused by roads congested with armor and supply columns. At 1830, CT 330, moved by truck to new assembly area near BAGEUR PIGAN (025028) two miles east of DOL.

4 August 1944

At 1000, CT launched attack to seize DOL DE BRETAGNE (982025). 2nd Bn in assault astride road, 1st Bn on right rear and 3rd Bn on left rear. Only light resistance was met although extensive defensive positions consisting of road blocks, wire and AT ditches surrounded the town. At 1130 2nd Bn was on objective and proceeded through town toward main highway leading to PIERGUER (915005), the new Regt'l objective. 1st Bn remained in vicinity of Dol to clean out the MONT DOL sector (771050). Regt (- 1st Bn) advanced to vicinity of MINIAC (860992) where they moved into assembly area for night. No resistance was met after passing through DOL.

5 August 1944

Regt in Div Res. 3rd Bn was given mission (on Div order) to cross the RANCE River in vicinity of (800978) to establish a bridgehead across the river and block the main DINAN-DINARD road. Patrols were sent out during the night to reconnoiter for suitable site for crossing and to feel out enemy. 1st Bn moved from DOL at 0630 into assembly area joining rest of Regt. At 1900 3rd Bn crossed two companies in assault boats after arty and mortar concentrations drove enemy from positions. At 2000, 3rd Bn was ordered by CG to withdraw from bridgehead across river and was attached to Task Force A, commanded by Brig. Gen. Ernest. Withdrawal effected under heavy enemy arty concentrations. Regt (- 3rd Bn) moved to new assembly area vic of (865099) preparatory to launching attack on ST MALO.

6 August 1944

Regt (- 3rd Bn) attacked at 0900 in column of Bns, 1st Bn leading, advanced rapidly 3 1/2 kilometers and were on objective at 1130. At 1750 attack on ST MALO proper began with a rapid advance by 1st Bn until they were held up by a mine field. 2nd Bn was committed around left flank of 1st Bn.

August 1944

Attack on ST MALO renewed at 0630. 2nd Bn was held up by strong point (ST JOSEPH FORTRESS) (815142). This strong point consisted of permanent gun emplacements in granite rocks of a quarry. Shafts led down to caves hewn out of granite in which enemy holding this point were garrisoned. Stone walls and wire were in front of point. 1st Bn advanced to (809149) following heavy arty preparation on high ground to their front. 1st and 2nd Bns suffered 120 casualties and captured 215 prisoners.

8 August 1944

2nd Bn still held up at ST JOSEPH'S FORTRESS and spent most of the day trying to maneuver around it. 1st Bn initially held up at same strong point but sufficiently strong arty concentrations were placed in front of them to reduce long range mortars and MG fire allowing them to advance to the right of ST JOSEPH FORTRESS (814145). Arty continued to pound ST JOSEPH FORTRESS and 2nd Bn advanced a little taking many prisoners. By 2115, 185 prisoners had surrendered to 2nd Bn and Lt. Col. Norris at 2140, requested arty fire to cease to enable more prisoners to surrender. 2nd Bn resumed attack and were still attempting to close in on bunkers at 2400. Casualties for day 124. 350 prisoners captured.

9 August 1944

2nd Bn continued attack on bunkers till 0245 but were forced to give up attempt to occupy them during darkness due to FPL MG fire along wire and stone walls. At 0725 Germans in ST JOSEPH FORTRESS (815141) began negotiations for surrender with the 2nd Bn and the greater part of the morning was spent by 2nd Bn in taking over the fort. 434 prisoners were brought to the PW cage. After passing the fort opposition was light except for SP guns. 1st Bn launched attack at 0830 and moved forward against slight resistance. By 1120 A Co had reached the waters edge of ST MALO in its zone (798144) and B Co was close behind in its zone, and operations began to comb out snipers and pockets of resistance which had been by-passed. L Co and 2nd Bn, 331st Inf, attached to the Regt for operations against old ST MALO and LE VARDE peninsula. Total PWs for the day: 657.

10 August 1944

1st Bn attacked across causeway (797151) leading to old ST MALO, progress slow. Enemy fought from house to house and had to be blasted out by TD fire and grenades. Heavy fire was received from islands to the north. 2nd Bn 331st started attack to seize ST IDEUC (828161). Patrols were pushed into town but were withdrawn. Bn received fairly heavy fire from LE VARDE peninsula, believed to be naval guns and automatic artillery (AA) from ST IDEUC. Heavy arty fire was laid on ST IDEUC and part of garrison surrendered. 2nd Bn 331st Inf casualties: 9.

11 August 1944

1st Bn relieved 2nd Bn in its sector and continued mission of occupying old ST MALO. 2nd Bn detached and moved to DINARD area under Div control. 1st Bn operations consisted principally of reducing pillboxes and silencing arty fire from ST MALO. At close of day 1st Bn had advanced to point (792150) and occupied the CASINO. 2nd Bn 331st Inf progress slow but methodic in face of arty fire from concrete and steel coastal defense bunkers. Anti-Aircraft guns were used by enemy as direct fire weapons. Pillboxes, bunkers, and strong points were reduced with aid of heavy arty, and tank destroyer weapons. French Resistance forces under command of an American officer protected our right flank. 2nd Bn 329 was attached to Regt on evening of 11th for operations on following day.

12 August 1944

1st Bn 330th Inf with L Co 331st Inf, attached continued attack on the CHATEAU (78951500) guarding approach to ST MALO. No great progress made. Efforts to reduce walls, pillboxes and gun emplacements by heavy arty and direct fire weapons was continued. CHATEAU was dive bombed at 1330. Enemy 20mm guns still active. 2nd Bn 331st captured fort at ST IDEUC (825164) taking 160 prisoners in process, then advanced steadily and strong point at LA FRESNE (825169) was taken in early afternoon. 2nd Bn 329th launched its attack on LE VERDE peninsula and assisted 2nd Bn 331st by flanking strong points that had held up their advance.

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12 August 1944 (con nue

G Co, 329th Inf, on the left of Bn sector was held up by bunkers at LA BASTILLE (839169). After reducing this strong point the Bn advanced rapidly through skillful use of supporting tanks, TDs and other supporting weapons. By 2130 all the area SE of LA VERDE peninsula had been cleaned out and the peninsula itself cut off. French Resistance forces occupied ST VINCENT (843171) and had a strong patrol in ROTHENEUF (831181) after patrols during previous night found them unoccupied by the Germans. Total prisoners for the day: 303.

13 August 1944

No change in tactical situation in ST MALO sector. 1500 civilians evacuated from ST MALO under a truce. 2nd Bn 329th relieved 2nd Bn 331st in its sector. 2nd Bn 331st reverted to control of the 331st Inf. 2nd Bn 329th cleaned out rest of LE VERDE peninsula after stubborn resistance of fortified positions at (818176) and (820118) was overcome. Fire from AT and TD weapons kept bunkers buttoned up while infantry assaulted with grenades and flame throwers. 106 prisoners, four of which were officers, taken in capture of bunkers.

14 August 1944

Heavy arty fire was placed on THE CHATEAU and old ST MALO at dawn. At 0900 1st Bn began assault. 3" TD guns were employed to smother fire of enemy and smoke was placed on flank to prevent enemy from using supporting fires from the CITADEL. Tanks were employed but ran into minefields and were unable to advance. Infantry surged through the city gates into the city of old ST MALO meeting only slight resistance. L Co 331st Inf and A Co, 330th Inf, by-passed the CHATEAU and went on into the city. Only snipers and MGs were encountered in mopping up the city. MGs firing from top of the CHATEAU hampered efforts of G Co to place prepared demolitions on walls of building. Upon use of the demolitions the enemy garrison surrendered. 150 PWs taken from CHATEAU. Casualties - none. 329th Inf relieved the 1st Bn 330th Inf in ST MALO, at 1900. Regt (- 2nd and 3rd Bns) at 2130 began move by motor to assembly area at BOIS DE PONTUAL. (092732).

15 August 1944

Regt and attachments closed into assembly area in early part of morning. Regt given mission of mopping up a sector by-passed by 331st Inf in its attack on DINARD. No enemy found in sector. Remainder of day given over to rest for troops. All attachments released. 2nd Bn reverted to Regtl control and moved to assembly area vicinity of Regt.

Period 16, 17 and 18 August 1944

Regt in Reserve. Care and cleaning of personnel and equipment and training programs carried out.

19 August 1944

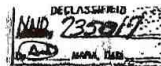
Regiment ordered to garrison the ST MALO - DINARD Area from CONCALE (918171) west along the coast to ST JACUT DE LA MER (S 6609). Mission: Locate and guard enemy supplies and equipment, maintain order, capture or prevent enemy forces from landing along coast. 1st Bn relieved 331st Inf in DINARD sector. 2nd Bn relieved 329th Inf in ST MALO Area. Regtl CP located on the outskirts of DINARD (76581220). 323d FA Bn (- 1 Btry) and Co C, 802d TD Bn attached.

Period 20 - 24 August 1944

During period search and consolidation of German supplies carried out. Outposts along coast established with motorized patrols maintaining contact. German food and supplies issued civilians through Civil Affairs section and Regtl Supply section. An attempt on 20 August was made, under white flag of truce, to induce garrison on ILE DE CEZEMBE (758180) to surrender. Attempt unsuccessful. Harassing fire from Arty and TD guns on CEZEMBE continued. ILE DE CEZEMBE being the only German resistance remaining in this area. On 21 Aug, 150 PWs were attached to Regt. 50 in turn were attached to 1st Bn and 100 to 2nd Bn for employment.

On August 22 propaganda leaflets were fired on island by Arty after which another party, under flag of truce, again went to island to try and induce them to surrender, this attempt also unsuccessful. Island was dive bombed on 23 August.

25 August 1944

Co E relieved 1st Bn in the DINARD area and 2nd Bn took over responsibility of garrisoning the ST MALO - DINARD Sector. Cannon Co was attached to 2nd Bn for this mission. At 1000, Regt (- 2nd, 3rd Bns and Cn Co) with 323d FA Bn and Co C, 802d TD Bn attached, departed from ST MALO - DINARD area on 180 mile road march to CHATEAU LA VALLIERE (484852). The movement was made without incident. 308th Engr Bn, a provisional battery of 453d AAA Bn (AW) consisting of quadruple .50 cal. guns and two recon platoons of 802d TD Bn were attached to Regt to assist in carrying out mission of establishing OPs and patrols, and to search out and prevent enemy from infiltrating across LOIRE River between SAUMUR (exclusive) and ORLEANS (exclusive). 1st Bn closed into assembly area vic of CIERRE (530714) and Regtl Hq and attachments vic 2 1/2 miles south of CHATEAU LA VALLIERE at 2200.

26 August 1944

1st Bn reconnoitered and outposted LOIRE River line from SAUMUR 1755 (exclusive) to TOURS (7567) (exclusive) LANGAIS (540603) and CINQ-MARS-LA-PILE (582628) thought to be enemy strong points were occupied. All enemy in sector driven south of LOIRE River. Patrols consisting of elements of the I & R Platoon, quadruple .50 cal. guns of 453d AAA Bn and motorized infantry were formed. These patrols reconnoitered area N and N.W. of TOURS and vic S., S.E. and S.W. of CHATEAU LA VALLIERE. Contact made with Free French, who were active in area, and plans for coordination of efforts effected.

27 August 1944

1st Bn continued to man OPs and patrol area in its sector. River line and area between TOURS and ORLEANS patrolled. No contact with enemy made in either sector. Efforts to coordinate and equip FFI with German equipment continued. The caves captured at CINQ-MARS-LA-PILE (582628) was found to contain German supplies, principally food, of tremendous proportions. There existed tunnels, some 22 kilometers in length, with large store rooms off each side of tunnel. Regtl Staff contacted Div Hq to get a higher Hq to take over control of caves to avoid complications with FFI who claimed possession of the captured stores.

28 August 1944

At 0800, 329th Inf assumed control of 330th sector. 1st Bn 330th was attached to 329th Inf and remained in present positions. At 0830, Regt (less 3 Bns) plus Co B 808th Engrs and Co C, 802d TD Bn attached moved by motor to DINARD. Regt closed into assembly areas at 1900. Because joint operations with navy were to be inaugurated to seize ILE DE CEZEMERE (755180), elements of Div forward CP were moved to Regt CP.

29 - 30 August 1944

Plans for assault of CEZEMERE were formulated and 2nd Bn troops receiving training in landing technique using alligators and LCVs. Softening up process on island continued with air bombings, naval bombardment and arty fire.

31 August 1944

Softening process continued. 300 Heavy bombers and 24 P51's, latter with oil bombs, bombed island. 8" Howitzers and 8" guns shelled island.

SUBJECT: Report After Action Against the Enemy.

TO : The Adjutant General, Washington, D.C. (Thru Channels).

In accordance with paragraph 10, (c-3), AR 345-105 the following report after action for the month of September 1944 is submitted.

Period: 1 September 1944.

Training for landing operations on Isle of CEZEMBE by 2nd Bn continued. Date for landing set for 2 September. Island was heavily bombed by heavy, medium, and dive bombers. Shelling by warships and heavy arty (one Bn 8" Howitzers and one Bn 8" guns) continued. Two more trips to CEZEMBE made in attempt to induce surrender, both trips were unsuccessful. (At this time Bns disposed as follows: 1st Bn attached to 329th Inf vic CHATEAU LA VALLIERE; 3rd Bn attached to Task Force A in operations against BREST)

2 September 1944.

At 0800 garrison on CEZEMBE raised a white flag and troops were immediately dispatched in LSPV's to take prisoners off island. 320 men, one German and two Italian officers taken prisoner. 2nd Bn resumed garrison of ST MALO - DINARD area and were also ordered to put detachment on CEZEMBE but rough sea prevented them doing this. 323d FA (- 1 Btry) and Co C, 802d TD Bn were attached to 330th Inf and ordered to vic of CHATEAU LA VALLIERE (484852) and were temporarily attached on arrival to 322 FA pending arrival of 330th Inf in that area.

3 September 1944.

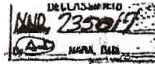
323d FA (- 1 Btry) and Co C, 802d TD Bn crossed IP for CHATEAU LA VALLIERE at 0830. One rifle Co (- one rifle platoon) plus 1 platoon HMGs and 1 Sec 81mm Mortars put on CEZEMBE as garrison. (Garrison was reduced to a platoon on following day). Regt received warning order for movement to ANGERS to relieve 329th Inf in that area.

4 September 1944.

Regt (- 3 Bns) moved by motor at 0900 for ANGERS (8279), a move of 122 miles, and closed into assembly area in ANGERS at 1630. 1st Bn was relieved from attachment to 329th Inf and moved from CLERE (530714) to ANGERS closing in at 0830. Contact with 329th Inf was made preparatory to taking over area on 5 September. Mission was defensive, to prevent enemy crossing LOIRE RIVER from S in Regtl sector; CHAMP TOCE SUR LOIRE (584728) W to SAMUR, and responsibility for guarding all captured German stores in regimental sector.

5 September 1944. - 12 September 1944.

Relief of 329th Infantry completed in the morning. 1st Bn assigned sector from ST SENN DAS LINIERES (57577) SE to LOIRE RIVER, then E along N bank of river to LA BOHALLÉ (59373). Outposts and patrols established along LOIRE between ANGERS and CHAMP TOCE SUR LOIRE (584728) and Co C, 802d TD Bn established patrols along LOIRE from ANGERS to SAUMUR. Contact patrols were sent out to contact FFI in area. Patrols of the I & R Platoon made reconnaissance along S bank of LOIRE RIVER and went as far south as CHEMILLE (56850). No enemy encountered. On 9 September the 2nd Bn was relieved in the DINARD - ST MALO area and on the Island of CEZEMBRE by one company of the 156th Inf. The 2nd Bn made motor march to bivouac area 7 kilometers W of ANGERS joining the regiment and were ordered into Regtl reserve where they conducted training. Co D, 774th Tank Bn was attached to Regt and joined on Sept 11 for use in Tank - Infantry Training. On 11 September 83d Rcn Trp was attached to 330th Inf for employment in patrolling on river line. Regimental boundary was extended W along N bank of LOIRE to NANTES (exclusive) and E along N bank of LOIRE to BLOIS (exclusive). 2nd Bn moved by motor to bivouac area vic CHATEAU LA VALLIERE on 12 Sept preparatory to Regt relieving 329th Inf in that sector.

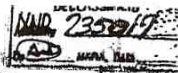
13 September - 22 September.

83d Rcn Trp was relieved from attachment on 13 September and the Regtl CP was moved from ANGERS to vic of CHATEAU LA VALLIERE (484851). The 323d FA Bn and Co C, 802d TP Bn also moved to same area. One R Co 2nd Bn with 1 Plat HMGs and 1 Sec 81mm Mortars attached, assigned sector W bank of LOIRE RIVER opposite TOURS. 2nd Bn (-) in Regtl reserve. 1st Bn with A-T Co attached, remained in ANGERS. The 1st Bn was given the mission of outposting and patrolling area NANTES (exclusive) to VARENNES (272518) and maintaining guard on German Stores in ANGERS. The TD Co was assigned the river line from VARENNES to TOURS (exclusive). I & R Platoon patrolled area from TOURS (exclusive) to BLOIS (exclusive). On 14 September, Co D, 774th Tank Bn (- 1 Platoon) moved from ANGERS to bivouac area vic of 2nd Bn to continue training. The Cannon Co closed into bivouac area vic of Regtl CP on 17 September and Service Co closed into bivouac area vic of 2nd Bn on 18 September. On 19 September orders were received to turn over all German caches in Regtl Area to Communication Zone. The 1st Bn (- A Co and A-T Platoon) and A-T Co moved by motor from ANGERS to bivouac area vic of CHATEAU LA VALLIERE closing in at 1605 22 September and Co A and A-T Platoon joined Bn on 23 September. During period no enemy was contacted. Normal training plus emphasized training in Tank - Infantry operations and attack of fortified positions was conducted during period.

22 September - 23 September 1944.

On September 22 the 323d FA Bn, Co C, 802d TD Bn (- patrol elements of 10 jeeps and personnel), and Co D, 774th Tank Bn reverted to unit control and departed to rejoin at MONTARGIS. The Rifle Co of the 2nd Bn was withdrawn from TOURS to bivouac area of Bn. 3rd Bn relieved of attachment to Task Force B and organic motor elements closed into bivouac area vic CHATEAU LA VALLIERE at 2030, 22 Sept after a 350 mile motor march from vic of BREST. Foot elements moved by rail to CHATEAU DU LOIR and by truck to bivouac area closing in at 0800 23 September. Regt alerted to move to vic of LUXEMBOURG, hour of departure based on arrival of QM Truck Cos.





ber 1944.

crossed I.P. at CHATEAU LA VALLIERE at 1630 on motor march to LUXEMBOURG. Co B, 308th Engrs joined column at MONTARGIS. First stage of march, 233 miles, to BRIENE LA CHATEAU, made in 11½ hours. Here trucks were gassed up and 4 hour rest halt made. Regt resumed march at 0815 25 Sept and head of column reached assembly area 4 miles NE of LUXEMBOURG (921173) at 1800, tail of Regt closed at 2030. Total distance traveled 372 miles. Regiment in Division reserve.

25 September - 26 September 1944.

Regt spent day on maintenance and setting up in bivouac area. On 26 Sept, 3rd Bn was moved from bivouac area vic of LUXEMBOURG to HETTANGE GRANDE (851910) and were attached to task force POLK as Task Force reserve and to conduct training in assaulting fortified positions against pill boxes and emplacements in MAGINOT LINE in this area. 1 Platoon of A-T Co was attached to 3rd Bn for this training. Co C, 802d TD Bn were also bivouaced in the same area for direct fire training on fortifications. Regt conducted reconnaissance of routes and areas of 329th and 331st Combat teams and for counter-attack plans.

27 September - 30 September 1944.

Reconnaissance by I & R Platoon, Bn Staffs and Co C.O.'s for counter-attack plans continued. Cn Co attached to 322 FA Bn for fire missions and departed at 0800, 29 September, rejoined Regt in former bivouac area at 1030, 30 September. Tank and Infantry training with Co C, 774th Tank Bn conducted, demolition and training in attack of fortified position stressed in this phase.

TO : The Adjutant General, Washington, D. C. (Thru Channels)

In accordance with paragraph 10, (c-3), AR 345-105, the following report after action for the month of October 1944 is submitted:

Period: 1 October 1944.

Disposition at beginning of period: Regt in Div reserve. 3rd Bn attached to Task Force POLK as Task Force reserve vicinity of HETTANGE GRANDE (851910) conducting training in assault of fortified positions on MAGINOT LINE Fortifications. 1st and 2nd Bns conducting training in demolitions, assault group and tank-Inf near bivouac areas 4 miles NE of city of LUXEMBOURG. Regtl CP near SENNINGEN at (921173). 1st Bn relieved 3rd Bn as TF POLK reserve closing into assembly area HETTANGE GRANDE at 1010. 3rd Bn closed into assembly area NE of LUXEMBOURG at 1230.

2 October - 4 October 1944.

Training continued. Reconnaissance for counter-attack plan completed.

5 October 1944.

Regt conducted attack problem under Div control, 1st Bn defending, 2nd and 3rd Bns attacking. Problem ceased at 1630 and Bns moved into assembly areas vic of HASSEL (896068) Regtl CP located at SYREN (905082).

6 October 1944.

Regtl CP opened at DALHEIM (933057) at 0800. Reconnaissance begun preparatory to relieving the 331st Inf on the right Div sector of MOSELLE RIVER line. Relief to be completed prior to 2400 7 October. 1st Bn to relieve right Bn of 331st Inf and 2nd Bn the left Bn. Bn, Co, and platoon commanders contacted commanders of 331st Inf, reconnoitered areas and routes, and arranged for guides to effect relief the following day. Regtl sector: W Bank of MOSELLE RIVER from AHN (inclusive) (0515) S. to point opposite RETTEL (978949). Mission: Drive enemy E. of and patrol vigorously to the MOSELLE RIVER and prevent enemy crossing to W. bank in Regtl sector. Co C, 774th Tank Bn attached to Regt at 1200.

7 October 1944.

Co I, reinforced, attached to 2nd Bn. 1 platoon Co C, 774th Tank Bn attached to 1st Bn and 1 platoon to 2d Bn. Co C, 774th Tank Bn (-2

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platoons) in Regtl reserve. 1st Bn sector N. along W. bank of MOSELLE RIVER from right boundary to (020070). The boundary between Bns: W. from that point through BOUS (9807). 2nd Bn sector extended N. from (020070) to left Regtl boundary. 3rd Bn (-1 rifle co) in Regtl reserve. CP 3rd Bn closed into WALFRANGE (950055) at 1200 and 3rd Bn completed relief of 3rd Bn 331st Inf at 1522, area vic of WALFRANGE. K Co motorized. 1st Bn marched at 0800 and completed relief of 2nd Bn 331st Inf at 2218. 2nd Bn marched at 0800 and completed relief of 1st Bn 331st Inf by 2130. Relief of some outposts completed after darkness and by infiltration because positions were under enemy observation and fire. Front line Co's from N. to S. in 2nd Bn sector were G, F, and I Co. 1st Bn, N. to S. was C and A. Regt supported by arty gpmt under command of CO 323d FA, consisting of 323d FA Bn; Cn Co, Co B, 774th Tank Bn; Co C, 802d TD Bn (direct support of 2nd Bn); 908th FA Bn; Co B, 802d TD Bn (direct support of 1st Bn); 689th FA Bn (med) in general support. In addition Co C, 774th Tank Bn was employed on secondary mission with arty.

8 October 1944.

Rcn of area continued. OP's and outposts manned.

9 October 1944.

Reserve Bn completed rcn and plan for counterattack. Small enemy patrols active on W. bank of river. Our ambush patrols active. Rcn by Bn and Sep Co's carried on in connection with Div Defense Plan. Enemy arty active and our own arty and mortars active firing on enemy troops, bldgs containing enemy, and other targets of opportunity spotted by Inf and Arty OP's.

10 October 1944.

At 2130 an enemy patrol of undetermined strength entered I Co area at (017130), the patrol was driven off in the fire fight that followed.

11 October - 12 October 1944.

Enemy active on E. bank of river especially at NENNIG area where enemy column of 25 vehicles were brought under arty fire. Enemy appears careless both in exposing themselves and vehicles in daylight and fires and lighted vehicles at night.

13 October 1944 and 14 October 1944.

E Co relieved G Co and L Co relieved I Co in 2nd Bn sector. L Co attached to 2nd Bn. I Co relieved A Co in 1st Bn sector on 13 October. Inf OP's adjusted arty fire on enemy personnel and installations spotted across river. Ambushes set up by Cos and I & R Plat to trap enemy patrols operating on our side of the river, with negative results. 81st FA Bn (med) replaced 689th FA Bn in arty groupment supporting regiment.





15 October 1944.

The two platoons of tanks attached to 1st and 2nd Bns reverted to Co control and Co C, 774th Tank Bn assembled vicinity of DALHEIM, to be employed in secondary mission. At 0930 a nine man enemy patrol entered A Co sector in vicinity of (Q006967). The patrol was engaged by our outpost and a patrol of A Co attempted to surround the enemy; the enemy withdrew and contact could not be regained.

16 October 1944 and 17 October 1944.

An ambush set up by the I & R Platoon encountered an enemy patrol vicinity of (Q007976) as they were moving into position at 161900. The I & R Platoon brought fire on the enemy and enemy withdrew. Marked increase in enemy arty fire on 16th October which lessened on 17th October. Five deserters of enemy 10 man patrol were picked up. The five men had volunteered for patrol duty in order to get on W. side of river to desert.

18 October 1944.

Enemy parachutists were reported to have landed in Div rear area. Motorized patrol of 7 jeeps under officer command formed on Div order at 172040 to proceed to FRISANGE (8803). Patrol was taken from 3rd Bn, 4 536 radios and 2 284 radios given patrol to facilitate communications. Patrol leader and Regtl S-3 reported to Div CP to receive orders. Patrol given mission of proceeding from FRISANGE to NOERTZANGE (785025), contact police chief there who had information of enemy parachutists landing vic MONDER-CONZE (735052), set up CP there and patrol roads between NOERTZANGE and BELVAUX (690028), prevent enemy from moving S. of main road between patrol points. At 180052 patrol moved out from FRISANGE on mission. No parachutists found. Patrol gathered what information it could as to the rumor and was ordered to return to Regtl Area at 181030. Patrol returned at 181245.

19 October 1944.

K Co relieved L Co at 1845. F Co relieved G Co at 1845, composition of outposts and OPs remained the same. Two men from K Co outpost missing.

20 October 1944.

Regiment took part in demonstration of river crossing at PALZEM (0107) prepared by Div Hq for purpose of testing enemy reaction. Co B 308th Engr Bn moved assault boats to BOUS (980072) on afternoon of 19th as part of demonstration. One platoon of tanks also moved to BOUS on October 19th to be available for rapid employment in the event of enemy action and also as part of the demonstration. The 81mm mortars and HMGs of 3rd Bn were put in position to lay fire on PALZEM. The hv wpns of the 1st and 2nd Bn in outpost within range of PALZEM also were employed in demonstration. The arty gpmt supporting Regt fired concen-



tration from 0700 to 0715, followed by 81mm mortar and MGs. No foot troops were used in the demonstration. No shifting of enemy reserves was noted, enemy reaction slow in returning arty fire. A six man patrol entered B Co's area in vicinity of (U975958) at 0730. They were engaged by a B Co outpost and the enemy patrol leader killed.

21 October 1944.

Enemy arty activity increased during day. Outpost vic of AHN (LO515) made contact with enemy patrol and inflicted casualties on enemy in fire fight. The 3rd Bn occupied a sector on the river line between 2nd and 1st Bn from (014105) S. to (017064). K Co reverted to control of 3rd Bn and reinforced by 1 sec HMGs and 1 section 81mm mortars occupied the sector.

22 October 1944.

1 sec tanks fired direct fire mission on pillboxes at (015088) camouflaged as haystacks, 38 rounds were fired with no damage believed to have been done pillboxes, tanks received no return fire. No enemy patrol action.

23 October 1944 and 24 October 1944.

Sector quiet during the period.

25 October 1944.

The 32nd Cav relieved 1st Bn in its sector from (978949) N. along W. bank of MOSELLE RIVER to point just S. of WINTRANGE (0001) at 1000. Boundary between 32nd Cav and 330th Inf a line from (0001) W. through S. edge of ELVANGE (972019) to (940019). 1st Bn's sector was extended N. along river line to (013080) and the 1st Bn completed relief of that part of 3rd Bn S. of that point at 1000. The 2nd Bn completed relief of the 3rd Bn in the 3rd Bn area N. of STADTEREDIMUS at 2000. The boundary between the 1st and 2nd Bn; a line from (013080) W. on main road to BOUS (982072), BOUS inclusive to 2nd Bn. The 3rd Bn (-1 platoon of K Co not relieved at that time) moved by motor at 1300 to vic of FLAXWEILER (995195) preparatory to relieving elements of 329th Inf on following day. 3rd Bn to occupy the left sector of the Regt from (053154) N. along MOSELLE RIVER to (100235). The boundary between 330th Inf and 329th Inf on our left; from (100235) S.W. along RR to BETZDORF (0022). One sec tanks Co C, 774th Tank Bn fired 170 rounds HE at targets in PALZEM (015083) beginning at 0730. Building used by enemy as OP was damaged and other buildings used by enemy set fire. No counterbattery fire received by tanks.

26 October 1944.

Cn Co moved from GOSTINGEN to position near WECKER (030227) closing in new position at 1040; Cn Co attached to 323rd FA Bn for fire missions.

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3rd Platoon of K Co moved to join 3rd Bn at 0800. The I & R platoon moved CP from BURMERANGE to BOUS at 1230. Mission of I & R platoon: Establish CP and ambush enemy patrols; patrol forward areas, clear and apprehend suspicious civilians. The 3rd Bn completed the relief of the 329th Inf in its sector at 1330. The eight trucks assigned to motorize one Co of 3rd Bn were transferred to 1st Bn to motorize one company. The 1st Bn, employed 1 rifle company, reinforced, on the river line. 2nd Bn outposted river line with 3 rifle companies (-1 $\frac{1}{2}$  squads), reinforced, and the 3rd Bn with 2 rifle companies (✓) reinforced. A carrying party of 10 men carrying rations to a platoon of L Co in GREVENMACHER was ambushed by an enemy patrol as they returned to the Co CP at 2015, two of our men were killed and three missing. A patrol sent out to intercept enemy patrol as it withdrew did not contact the enemy.

27 October 1944.

Sector quiet - no change.

28 October 1944.

One platoon of motorized company dispatched to woods vic of WALDERED-IMUS (948066) at 1700 to search out 4 man enemy patrol who were seen there by a civilian. The patrol could not be located. 1st Bn apprehended an enemy agent who had been brought across the river by 4 German soldiers who remained on this side of the river. An ambush was laid to trap the enemy soldiers as they attempted to return to GERMANY under cover of darkness. The ambush contacted two enemy groups and succeeded in killing one and it is believed wounded others. One of our men was killed by MG fire from across the river. A German Major of the 17th SS Pz Gren Div crossed river and surrendered to 1st Bn outpost.

29 October 1944 and 30 October 1944.

Sector quiet, no contact with enemy during period.

31 October 1944.

The 3rd Bn pushed strong patrols to high ground at (059184) vic of MACHTUM with view of setting up new outposts; the operation drew enemy fire from concealed positions on both sides of the river. The patrols were withdrawn as the ground was untenable.

General Comment:

The river line in Regtl sector is some 19 miles in length, heavily wooded with deep valleys and draws extending the whole length. Observation is excellent from both sides of the river. The enemy was aggressive in his patrolling on our side of the river and succeeded in inflicting some casualties on us. Our troops made extensive use of booby traps

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around outpost positions and the enemy suffered casualties as a result. Our troops were also successful in ambushing enemy patrols sent across river. Enemy vehicle and anti-personnel mine fields were found to be extensive in the BASE-KONTZ area (993958) where we had three vehicles damaged by mines. We suffered casualties in clearing mines in fields that had been booby trapped. Enemy arty and mortars were active throughout period but apparently not much effort was made on part of the enemy to adjust their mortar fire when they had observation. Arty fire, enemy and our own, was principally harassing and interdictory.

1 December 1944.

In accordance with paragraph 10, (c-3), AR 345-105, the following report after action for the month of November 1944 is submitted:

Period: 1 November 1944.

Disposition at beginning of period: Regt occupied defensive sector on MOSELLE RIVER from point just S. of WINTERADE (0001) N. along MOSELLE RIVER to (100235), river line held from N. to S. with 3rd Bn, 2nd Bn and 1st Bn. Regt1 CP at DALLHEIM (93057). Attachments: Co 3, 774th Tank Bn, assembled vic of DALLHEIM, employed in secondary mission. Co 3 attached to 323d FA Bn for fire missions, gun positions vic of WECKER (030227). At 0010 an enemy patrol of 6 to 8 men with automatic weapons approached a "C" Co outpost at (1018121). One man of "C" Co outpost was killed in the exchange of fire. At 0220 an enemy patrol of 7 or 8 men approached an outpost of "F" Co at (1005083). The patrol was allowed to advance within 30 yards of the outpost position before they opened fire. The enemy patrol leader and a corporal were killed and a third wounded.

2 & 3 November 1944.

Sector Quiet.

4 November 1944.

The 1st Bn was relieved by the 2nd Bn on the river line at 1100. Co D (- 1 platoon MG's) was attached to 32d Cav for employment in clearing the enemy on the W. bank of the river in the CONTZ area. The 1st Bn (- D Co elements attached to 32d Cav) closed into assembly area in woods (9998) at 1210. The boundary between the 2nd and 3rd Bn from a point on river line (050142) W. to (000149). The 3rd Bn relieved elements of 2nd Bn N. of this line at 1020. No enemy patrols contacted during period, arty and mortar fire light. 1st Bn contacted 32d Cav & executed reconnaissance before dark preparatory to clearing enemy from bridgehead on W. bank of MOSELLE RIVER in the CONTZ sector (0096) on 5 November. D Co elements reverted to Bn control.

5 November 1944.

At 0800, 1st Bn initiated attack to clear enemy from CONTZ salient. "A" Co began attack on the right, advancing from CONTZ (995958) generally S.E. around reverse slope of the bluff. "B" Co began the attack from SCHENGEL (006977) advancing south. Heavy arty and mortar fire encountered by both Cos from emplacements on E. side of river. The enemy were well dug in on the steep S.E. slope of the STROMBERG Hill in the sector and our arty was unable to put fire on them. "A" Co advanced slowly under heavy arty, mortar and s/a fire and through dense anti-personnel mine fields. At 1030 "A" Cos left platoon had advanced to (0095) where it was pinned down by s/a fire. "A" Co attempted to maneuver right platoon around right flank of enemy and get in rear of enemy. This platoon also came under heavy fire and was pinned down. At 1100 "B" Co had advanced to (005970) where they encountered heavy s/a fire from E. bank of river. Mortars smoked E. bank of river and "B" Co was able to continue advance.

5 November 1944 (Continued)

"A" Co committed support platoon at 1130 and by employing marching fire had advanced to (005954). At 1420 "A" Co was counterattacked and pushed back to (001950). At 1530 "B" Co repulsed counterattack. No further progress made. At 1700 1st Bn completed consolidation of their positions and were ordered to hold present positions for the night.

At 1630 one rifle company (reinforced) 331st Inf attached to 330th Inf and were moved to MONDCRFF (941145) for possible employment in operations next day.

I & R platoon withdrawn from BCUS assembled at Regtl Hq.

2nd and 3rd Bn sectors quiet.

Casualties - 8 KIA - 93 WIA - 13 MIA.

6 November 1944.

"A" and "B" Cos resumed attack at 0845 am. At 1040 right platoon of "B" Co made contact with "A" Co at (003955), "C" Co was echeloned to right rear of "B" Co and employed to clear area along river line. No opposition, no mortar or arty fire encountered. At 1015 all objectives had been occupied and 1st Bn began reorganization and occupation of sector.

The rifle co of 331st Inf released from attachment at 1440.

7 November 1944.

The 1st Bn outposted STROMBERG Hill sector with "A" & "B" Cos initially. At 1925 "C" Co relieved "A" on outposts. "A" Co, who suffered fairly heavy casualties was placed in reserve to reorganize. 1st Bn sector on river line: from (000974) S to (988950). 200 rounds arty fell within sector (104422). Fire was undoubtedly counterbattery fire directed at Cannon Company. Rounds missed gun position 800 to 1,000 yards. 2nd and 3rd Bn sector quiet.

8 November 1944.

An enemy patrol of 3 men was fired on by "K" Co outpost vic (1029163) at 0025, shortly after daylight two men of this patrol were captured by "K" Co. Enemy arty and mortar fire light. Co B, 705th TD Bn attached in present position (8307) at 1200.

9 November 1944.

TF POLK began relief of Regt in morning hours and the three Bns were completely relieved at 2130. The Regtl combat team began assembling in staging area for operations east of MOSELLE RIVER. The 1st Bn closed into assembly area, "A" & "B" Cos vic of BURMERANGE (977994), "C" & "D" Cos vic of ELVANGE (971018) at 2145. 1st Bn CP located at BURMERANGE. "E" Co (- 1 platoon), "F" Co, and advance elements of Bn CP closed into 2nd Bn assembly area vic of FILSDORF (923050) at 1630. The remainder of Bn remained in former area for the nite. The 3rd Bn CP, Hq Co and "M" Co closed into assembly area at ALLEWEIS (929023) at 2100. "K", "L", & "I" Cos remained in former area for the nite. "I" Co captured enemy patrol leader vic of (1006235) at 0545.

10 November 1944.

The remaining elements of 2nd Bn closed into Bn assembly area at 0830 and 3rd Bn closed at 0910. Cn Co closed into assembly area (922075) at 0905 and the 323rd FA Bn closed into vic of FILSDORF (9205) at 1010. One platoon of Co B, 705th TD Bn attached to each 2nd and 3rd and joined Bns in assembly area at 1050. The

assembly of combat team, except for Co C, 81st Inf Co, enroute from METZ Area and attached to Regt, completed at 1010.

11 November 1944.

At 1920 CG, 3rd Inf Div issued oral orders for Regt to reoccupy former positions on MOSELLE RIVER LINE by 1000 on 12 November.

12 November 1944.

1st and 2nd Bns moved at 0700 to relieve TF POLA on river line. At 1000 both 1st and 2nd Bns had completed relief in their sectors, except those positions to be relieved under cover of darkness. Relief complete at 1800. Regtl N. boundary (057195) W. to (980109); S. boundary (979753) W. to (920955). The boundary between 2nd Bn on N. and 1st Bn on S. (018077) W. to (988025). 3rd Bn in reserve vic of FILSDORF. Co positions vic of ELVASE (972017). Other units of Regt remained in present positions. No enemy patrols contacted during period. enemy mortar and arty fire very light.

13 November 1944.

Sector quiet. No contact with enemy. 36 rounds 81mm mortar fell in STAUDEREDIMUS (009080) between 2120 - 2145 hours. Five deserters surrendered to 2nd Bn.

14 November 1944.

On 13 November Regt assigned new boundaries on MOSELLE RIVER Line extending from a line (992957) - (9399) N. to a line (017110) - (112985) - (918097). The new boundaries shortened Regtl sector on river line approximately 10 kilometers. The 3rd Bn occupied the N. Sector of the river line and completed relief of 2nd Bn in their sector and had occupied positions by 1700, with "I" and "K" Cos outposting Bn sector and "L" Co in reserve. "L" Co in assembly area vic of WALDEREDIMUS (952073). Bn CP at BOUS. The 1st Bn occupied S. Sector at 1700 with "A" and "B" Cos on outpost line and "C" Co in Bn reserve vicinity of BURMERANGE (978993). Bn CP at BURMERANGE. 1st Bn also maintained CP at HAUTE KONIG (975959). The 2nd Bn was relieved by 351st Inf in that part of their sector N. of new Regtl boundary at 1640 and by 3rd Bn in 3rd Bn sector at 1700. The 2nd Bn closed into assembly area at MCHODORF (940018) at 1955 and were placed in Regtl Reserve with one company motorized. Cannon Co closed into positions vic of BOUS (980071) at 1500 for support in U. part of Regtl Sector. No contact with enemy patrols reported, arty and mortar fire very light. A patrol of 7 men from "G" Co crossed MOSELLE RIVER at (1023120) and reached RJ at (105051265) a few meters from WINCHINGEN. No enemy mines, road blocks or personnel encountered. Patrol returned at 2400.

15 November 1944.

An 8 man patrol led by an officer of Co A crossed MOSELLE RIVER vic of SCHENGEN (0007977) at 141945. The patrol penetrated to edge of FAKL (020978). No defensive works, mine fields, road blocks, booby traps or enemy personnel encountered. Visibility was poor, patrol returned at 0300 15 November. Shortly after midnight an enemy patrol was observed at (1011078) and was fired on and dispersed by our outpost. Enemy arty and mortar fire light.



16 November 1944.

3 man patrol of "I" Co crossed river at (020075) but failed to get beyond river bank which was steep at the place patrol landed, no enemy encountered.

17 November 1944.

No enemy patrols encountered and no enemy arty or mortar fire fell in sector during period. 3 man patrol of I & R Platoon failed to get across MOSELLE RIVER when rubber boat capsized with patrol in the flood stage river.

18 November 1944.

Three patrols crossed MOSELLE RIVER on the night of the 17th. The 3 man patrol of I & R Platoon and a 3 man patrol of the 3rd Bn crossed river at (019062) and immediately ran into enemy. The two patrols were able to break contact but encountered booby traps and more enemy personnel and were unable to penetrate beyond 300 yards of the rivers edge. The patrol of the 1st Bn crossed river at SCHMIDT (009978), contacted TF POLK. The patrol captured one PW. "L" Co relieved "I" Co on river line.

19 November 1944.

Sector quiet - no contact with enemy patrols on W. side of river. A patrol of the 1st Bn crossed MOSELLE RIVER at SCHMIDT to contact TF POLK, ascertain extent of enemy resistance and make a terrain study of ground in area vicinity of (021990) (030971) and (031981) at 1500. Patrol returned at 1900 after completing mission. 1 squad remained across river from SCHMIDT.

20 November 1944.

A two man enemy patrol was fired on by one outpost at STAUBENHUB (003081). No enemy arty or mortar fire reported during period.

21 November 1944.

The advance of the 10th Armd Div east of the MOSELLE RIVER uncovered "B" Co and they were therefore directed to withdraw outposts from their sector on river line from SCHMIDT (009978) (exclusive), to HAUSE SCITZ (inclusive). The withdrawal began, at 1030 and "B" Co was assembled at HAUSE SCITZ (993999) at 1200. "B" Co sent two officer led patrols across MOSELLE RIVER at 1500 in rear of 10th Armd Div front lines to contact 10th Armd Div and determine the nature and extent of the resistance and make terrain study behind the lines of the 10th Armd Div. "B" Co maintained 4 OPs in their former sector and patrolled between OPs to prevent enemy agents from infiltrating across river.

22 November 1944.

No change in situation. Two patrols of 1st Bn crossed MOSELLE RIVER at 0700 and had contact with 10th Armd Div.

23 November 1944.

The 1st Bn having been uncovered by the advance of the 10th Armd Div east of the MOSELLE RIVER was ordered to withdraw outposts from river line. The withdrawal was completed at 0930, and the 1st Bn (- C Co) assembled vic of HESFELD (F862102) at 1715. "B" Co remained in SCHMIDT (978993). The I & R Platoon established a patrol between 3rd Bn boundary and SCHMIDT (992997) and the

23 November 1944. (Continued)

Mine Platoon of AT Co established outposts and patrols between REMERSBACH and BASSE CORTZ (993960). The mission of the I & R Platoon and the Mine Platoon of AT Co: keep civilians from re-entering villages along river and prevent enemy from infiltrating across river.

24 November 1944.

"I" Co closed into assembly area at BURNETLAND at 1100 and "C" Co joined 1st Bn vic of MELFRAANGEN at 1300. Sector was quiet during period, contact made with 10th Armd Div.

25 November 1944.

The 2nd Bn completed relief of the 3rd Bn at 1200. "I" Co remained in BURNETLAND. 3rd Bn closed into reserve assembly area vicinity of MONDORFF at 1330. One rifle company of 3rd Bn was motorized and placed on 30 minute alert. One PW was captured by AT Co patrol in a bldg in which he had been hiding since 1st Bn cleared LE STROMBERG Hill on 6 November. No enemy patrols, arty or mortar fire reported during period.

26 November 1944.

1st Bn placed on 2 hour alert and made available to CG 329th Inf upon request to CG 33d Inf Div. 1st Bn made reconnaissance of routes to 329th Inf sector for possible employment.

27 November 1944.

The 10th Armd Div withdrew its forward elements on the east side of MOSELLE RIVER leaving a gap on west bank of river. AT Co was ordered outpost river line from 3rd Bn S. to SCHENGEN (exclusive) and maintain patrols at night. At 1515 the AT Co had occupied sector and the I & R Platoon had begun patrolling in the sector from SCHENGEN to BASSE CORTZ (994957). Enemy arty and mortar fire light during period, no patrols contacted.

28 November 1944.

No Change. Regt Mine Platoon, in mine clearing operation in STROMBERG Hill Area (003960), removed over 3000 S. mines.

29 November 1944.

At 0001 Regt received warning order to be prepared to move by motor on 30 November. The 2nd Bn, AT Co, Cannon Co and the I & R Platoon were relieved on river line by 331st Inf at 1600. The 2nd Bn closed into assembly area vic of FLESDORF (923050) at 1700. AT Co closed into DALLEM at 1600. The 323d FA Bn, Co B, 308th Med Bn located at MONDORFF (945016), Co B 308th Engr Bn (837179) and Co C, 802d TD Bn (948023) were attached to Regt in place at 1200. Enemy arty and mortar fire light during period.

30 November 1944.

Co C, 774th Tn Bn (7405) attached to Regt at 1200 and Co C, 802d TD Bn relieved of attachment. Assembly of Regt Combat Team for move complete. The 3 Bn COs and quartering parties departed at 0850 to contact commanders of the 4th Division prior to relief of one Inf by Regt.

Casualties 29 November: 10 - KIA; 96 - WIA; 13 - MIA.

SUBJECT: Report After Action Against the Enemy.

TO : The Adjutant General, Washington, D. C. (thru channels).

In accordance with paragraph 10, (c-3), AR 345-105, the following report after action for the month of December 1944 is submitted:

Period: 1 December 1944.

Disposition at beginning of period: Regtl combat team in assembly area vic of DALHEIM, LUXEMBOURG (933057), attachments:

323rd FA Bn (945016)

Co B, 308th Engr Bn (837179)

Co B, 308th Med Bn (7405)

Co C, 774th Tk Bn (7405).

Sector quiet. Move to VII Corps Area postponed for 24 hours. Co C, 774th Tk Bn relieved from attachment to 330th Inf.

95 Trucks of two 1st Army QM Truck Cos closed into Bn areas at 1800.

Co B, 308th Engr Bn and Regtl Mine Plat departed at 0800 to move to VII Corps sector to clear mines in Regtl Combat Team assembly area. VII Corps had reported roads, trails, fields and woods heavily mined and no assurance could be given that rear areas were clear of mines.

2 December 1944.

At 1015 Regtl Combat Team received orders to cross IP at 1200 for move to assembly area vic of GRESSENICH, GERMANY. 1st Bn, lead element, crossed IP at 1200.

The 1st Bn closed into assembly area vic of SCHEVENHUTTE, GERMANY (005-422) at 2115 and all elements of combat team had closed into assembly areas at (030130).

The service train which followed the main body suffered 6 casualties from strafing enemy aircraft.

330th Inf became attached to the 4th Div on arrival.

3 December 1944.

The 1st Bn moved from assembly area at 0730 to relieve the 1st Bn of the 22nd Inf, the 2nd Bn moved at 0745 to relieve 3rd Bn, 22nd Inf, and the 3rd Bn moved at 0800 to relieve the 2nd Bn, 22nd Inf. The Regtl CP was established at (025382), the location of the 22nd Inf CP, at 0845. The 1st Bn had completed its relief at 1600, the 2nd at 1700, and the 3rd at 1200. At 2105, Regt assumed responsibility for sector. Our troops occupied same positions as those occupied by 22nd Infantry.

Dispositions: 1st Bn: (06753903) - (06953875) - (06703850), B Co on left, C Co on right, A Co in reserve. 2nd Bn: G Co (05833990) - (06083928); E Co (06083930) - (06403918); F Co (06403918) - (06453880); 3rd Bn: (06303870) - (06203805), K Co on left, I Co in center, and L Co on right. 121st Inf on right, 12th Infantry on left. Contact with 121st Inf made by patrol and was maintained throughout night.

Mortar and arty fire was extremely heavy, fighting went on throughout the process of relief and we suffered casualties in effecting the relief. Muddy roads and fields together with the fact that practically all fields were mined and booby trapped made it impractical to get all organic transportation forward. Therefore, Hvy wpons Cos took 6 jeeps w/trailers and rifle Cos took 1 jeep w/trailer forward. The remainder of Bn vehicles remained behind in Bn motor pools. Co B, 629th TD Bn (SP) arrived in area and attached to 330th Inf on arrival. Co B, 774th Tk Bn attached.

4 December 1944.

Positions unchanged, mortar and arty fire heavy on forward elements, one vehicle 2nd Bn destroyed by mine. Enemy aircraft strafed Regtl area, no casualties resulted.

Co B, 629th TD Bn (SP), relieved elements of 803rd TD Bn (SP) in sector at 1030 and Co C, 774th Tk Bn relieved 70th Tk Bn elements at 1030. Contact with 121st Inf maintained every 3 hours during night by patrol from 3rd Bn.

5 December 1944.

At 0645, approximately 50 enemy attacked B Co's positions from the NE, preceded by heavy concentrations of mortar and arty. B Co allowed enemy to approach to within 50 yards of their positions. In the fire fight that followed, 20 prisoners were taken and approximately 20 killed. B Co suffered very light casualties.

The sector was quiet throughout remainder of day except for arty and mortar which continued to be heavy on front line elements.

At 2330, a reconnaissance patrol of 3rd Bn passed outpost line to reconnoiter area via of (070392). This was the area from which B Co had received their attack. The patrol was met by accurate mortar fire each time they attempted to advance to their objective, the patrol failed to accomplish mission.

Contact patrols maintained contact with 121st Inf on right throughout night.

6 December 1944.

The 1st Bn readjusted their front lines and occupied the positions of K and I Cos with A Co. 3rd Bn assembled NE of GROSSHAU (048386) as Regtl Reserve. This readjustment was completed at 2400. G Co relieved B Co at 1330. B Co assembled at (063383) in Bn Reserve. The 759th Lt Tk Bn (-B & C) attached to Regt at 2000.

7 December 1944.

330th Inf relieved from attachment to 4th Div at 1600.

Two patrols of Mauser Plat were given mission of: (1) reconnoiter road leading into SCHAFFSBURG and (2) reconnoiter hill 375 (071378), discover the strength and disposition of enemy forces occupying hill and if possible occupy hill with combat patrol. The patrol reached a point (068381) but received considerable mortar fire and was unsuccessful in penetrating to objective. The patrol returned through A Cos outpost at 0010.

At 1300, a reconnaissance patrol led by A Co NCO penetrated to what he believed to be hill 375 (072377) and reported it unoccupied by enemy. At 1645, 1st Bn started infiltrating 1 Plat to occupy hill 375. At 1855, 1st Bn reported A Co occupied hill 375. One enemy patrol was encountered during movement and driven off.

The Regtl Mine Plat began operations to clear roads leading to hill 375 in order to get light tanks up to reinforce A Co.

Enemy arty and mortar fire was heavy throughout day and night on forward elements.

One officer was killed and jeep destroyed by a mine on a road in 3rd Bn sector that had been traveled on extensively throughout preceding two days.

8 December 1944.

At 072300 A Co discovered it did not occupy hill 375 but rather position generally at (489379). A Co was ordered to occupy hill 375 and B Co alerted to follow. By 0625, both A and B Cos had taken position on hill forming a circular defense the center being at (492377).

The enemy occupying position was taken by surprise, 15 men and two officers were taken prisoner before they were aware our forces were on hill. The mission of the enemy on the position was to warn their headquarters in case of an attack.

One platoon of light tanks Co A, 759th Tk Bn, began moving to hill 375 before morning. One tank was lost in friendly mine field of 121st Inf that was not marked. Regtl Mine Plat cleared road ahead of tanks there-



after. At 1230, 1st Plat of Lt Tks had arrived on hill. Co I was attached to 1st Bn to occupy former A Co sector and establish contact with A Co on hill 375. I Co suffered casualties in heavy arty and mortar concentrations and were only partly successful in occupying positions between C and A.

The 2nd Plat of Lt Tks had joined 1st Plat on hill 375 at 1600. The Marauder Plat sent patrols to (073383) where they observed SCHAFBERG at (07453740).

Dec 4A and B Cos attempted to readjust their lines during night of 8 - 9 Dec and were partly successful, extremely heavy arty and mortar fire caused heavy casualties in A and B Cos. The enemy launched counterattack on A Co's position with Inf and one SF gun or tank. The Lt Tks engaged the enemy tank repeatedly but were unable to do it any apparent harm. The enemy tank withdrew and the attack was repulsed. Small groups of enemy infantry supported by tanks attempted to penetrate I Co's sector but were unsuccessful. However, I Co became disorganized as a result and small groups of I Co joined C Co on left while approximately 1 Plat maintained positions. The arty and mortar fire was very heavy in I Co's sector and I Co was unable to maintain contact with A and C Cos. All of Co A, 759th Lt Tk Co were able to complete move to hill 375 with Cos A and B. A and B Cos' front lines: no appreciative change.

#### 10 December 1944.

The Regt launched attack at 0630. The plan of attack was for the 1st Bn to advance from present lines and secure the forward slope of hill 375 (071375), and prevent counterattack from S and SE. At the same time, the 3rd Bn would launch attack in column of companies to seize town of STRASS (078391). The time of attack 0630 was given to take advantage of darkness to prevent observation of enemy and to secure surprise if possible. The 3rd Bn with L Co leading, crossed LD at 0630 through C Co lines and passed through SCHAFBERG (074384) under cover of darkness with little opposition from enemy personnel but against heavy arty and mortar fire. Some prisoners were taken. At 0728, 3rd Bn reported they were in STRASS and that K Co was being committed on the right of L Co and that mopping up operations in the town had begun. Enemy tanks or assault guns attacked 3rd Bn and 3rd Bn knocked out 3 tanks with bazooka fire. The 3rd Bn called for G Co, 774th Tk Bn to come forward and join the Bn at 0900. At 1100, G Co, 774th Tk Bn had joined 3rd Bn in STRASS and were engaged with enemy tanks or SF guns. 1 Plat of Co B, 629th TD Bn moved to STRASS, one TD was knocked out enroute. Our arty continually took enemy SF and Inf under fire. Enemy forces in SCHAFBERG, including direct fire weapons vic of (083387) that had been-bypassed by 3rd Bn, blocked the road between LD and STRASS. No vehicles were able to get past (071381) where the TD was knocked out. At close of day, 3rd Bn still occupied STRASS with L and K Cos and the only communication with 3rd Bn was by radio of 629th TDs. The 1st Bn jumped off at 0630 and after advancing approximately 300 yards, were held up at line (075377) - (07553790) at 0800 before entrenched enemy infantry and extremely heavy arty and mortar fire. No further advance was made by 1st Bn. 1st Bn knocked out 1 enemy tank; 3 of our light tanks were knocked out. At 0855, 1 Plat Co B, 629th TD Bn, towing 1 Plat Regtl AT guns moved to A and B Cos' sector to give direct fire support to 3rd Bn and 1st Bn from vic of (0838). At 1330, G Co was committed to clean out SCHAFBERG area. At 1530, G Co was engaged with entrenched enemy infantry at (071387) and were unable to advance.

During night of 10-11, repeated attempts were made to get supplies to 3rd Bn in STRASS by foot patrols and vehicle. Only tracked vehicles were able to negotiate the muddy roads and tanks were lost to mines and direct fire weapons during daylight. Extremely heavy arty and mortar fire and s/a prevented patrols from getting through. Co A, 87th Cml Co arrived in Regtl Area at 1238 and began supporting Bns by fire at 1430.



11 December 1944.

1st Bn maintained position throughout day under heavy arty and mortar fire. During early hours of morning L and K Cos in STRASS were attacked by enemy armor and infantry. The TDs and Tns engaged armor and reported knocking out 3 enemy armored vehicles. L and K repulsed infantry throughout remainder of daylight. Our forces in STRASS were subjected to continual heavy arty and mortar fire and 3rd Bn had lost four Bn commanders killed, missing and injured. At 1900, 3rd Bn received another attack of infantry and armor from SE but again repulsed the attack and maintained their position. All TDs had been knocked out by close of day and only 7 tanks of Co C, 774th Tk Bn remained in operating order. One 10-man patrol with food, ammo and medical supplies got through to STRASS after dark. 60 casualties were reported to be in STRASS, no evacuation was possible. Only communication by TD radio. At 0730, Co A, 759th Tk Bn was relieved from attachment and elements of GCB, 5th Armd Div passed through 1st Bn. 1st Bn remained on present positions.

12 December 1944.

G Co resumed attack and at 0900 were at (07503855). At 1010, I Co of 331st relieved E and F Cos and E and F Cos went into assembly area behind G Co. At 1300, E Co was committed around right flank of G Co but little progress was made. E and G Cos resumed attack on SCHAFBERG at 0730 and were engaged with enemy infantry and SF guns vic of SCHAFBERG. At 1655, E and F Cos moved into SCHAFBERG at (078381) and were mopping up and G Co was going on into STRASS. Over 100 Fws were taken by 2nd Bn in SCHAFBERG area. At 1755, G Co made contact with 3rd Bn in STRASS and at 2150, F and E Cos followed. The 1st Bn moved from positions on hill 375 into SCHAFBERG at 2000. Col Foster returned to Regtl CP from 2nd Bn. Had received light wound from shell fragment, was evacuated at 1755. Col Walther assumed command of Regt at 1955.

The 3rd Bn maintained position in STRASS through period. Medical supplies, food and ammunition was dropped by sub plane on STRASS. Enemy made no further attempt to retake STRASS during period. Large foot patrols, reinforcements and supplies succeeded in getting through to STRASS during night of 12 - 13. Col Shuster accompanied patrol and assumed command 3rd Bn. Tanks towing trailers arrived in STRASS with supplies. Co E, 308th Engr Bn and the Regtl Mine Platoon had been working constantly throughout every night removing mines and making roads passable. Some tanks were lost to mines and direct fire in efforts to relieve 3rd Bn in STRASS.

13 December 1944.

Marauder Plat was given mission of searching out enemy believed to be ambushing wire patrols of 3rd Bn at (056378). Marauder platoon searched the dense forest but were unable to find any enemy. The 2nd Bn was attached to GCB at 0700. 2nd Bn remained at STRASS preparing to attack and seize half of 1st Objective of GCB at (092386). Attack was scheduled for 1030 but GCB did not attack. The only communication with 2nd Bn still by radio and GCB was unable to get Arty FC to 2nd Bn. The 3rd Bn maintained positions in STRASS. Arty and mortar fire continued to be heavy on SCHAFBERG and STRASS and the area between the two towns. 1st Bn maintained positions in SCHAFBERG. During the night foot patrols and reinforcements of both 2nd and 3rd Bns got through to STRASS. These patrols carried supplies of all types. 4 out of 5 light tanks towing trailers got through by the SCHAFBERG route. Co A, 87th Cml Co relieved of attachment at 2150 and attached to 331st Infantry VOGG. Co B, 308th Engr Bn worked throughout the night on the road from STRASS towards GEY to clear the roads of mines. The Engrs attached to 331st Inf worked from GEY towards STRASS. At 140330, the road was reported clear of mines; however, one light tank returning from STRASS hit a mine.



14 December 1944.

The 2nd Bn jumped off in column of companies, E Co leading and at 0725, was at (086387) where they came under s/a fire and were engaged by two enemy SP guns or tanks. Both enemy vehicles were knocked out by bazooka fire. Enemy fortifications on their flanks at (086389) held up E Co's advance. To relieve pressure on supply route to 2nd and 3rd Bns, 3rd Bn was ordered attack to NE and seize high ground at (080397). The 3rd Bn received heavy arty fire which held them up initially but later advanced rapidly and were on their objective at (08003973) with L Co at 1045.

At 1245, 2nd Bn made contact with AI of GCB at (085385). 3 Co moved around left flank of E to flank enemy pillbox and emplacements at (085388).

15 December 1944.

At 0015, Co B, 308th Engr Bn, completed construction of a treadway bridge over a ~~small stream~~ on the STRASS-GEY road and by morning of the 15th, the evacuation and supply of troops in STRASS was well in hand. E Co continued to hold objective at (08003973) and the remainder of the Bn garrisoned STRASS.

The 2nd Bn, attached to GCB, 5th Armd Div, began attack with GCB and at 1015, G and F Cos were on 1st Objective at (08953869) - (08923905) and at 1105, 2nd Bn had leading elements on 2nd Objective of GCB at (097388).

Disposition of supporting elements:

Co C, 774th Tk Bn: 1 Plat - completely missing or knocked out.  
2 Plat - 3 tks in STRASS, 2 tks in Co area.  
3 Plat - With 3rd Bn in STRASS, at least one known to be knocked out.

Co B, 629th TD Bn: Aslt Gun Plat - In Co assembly area at (042382).  
1 Plat attached to 1st Bn and in SCHAFFBERG - 3 guns operating.  
2 Plat attached to 3rd Bn - In assembly area at (055382). 4 guns in good shape.  
3 Plat - completely knocked out, was with 3rd Bn in STRASS.

At 1305, 1st and 3rd Bns were alerted to move to assembly area at dusk and at 1700, 1st Bn had closed into assembly area vic of (055387) with Bn CP at GROSSHAU (05153818). At 1900, the 3rd Bn closed into assembly area at (047387) vic GROSSHAU. 330th Inf (-2nd Bn), having accomplished mission, passed to Div reserve. 323rd FA Bn relieved of direct support of 330th Inf at 2100.

16 December 1944.

Co C, 774th Tk Bn, and Co B, 629th TD Bn, relieved from attachment to 330th Inf at 1000, and Co B, 308th Engr Bn, relieved of direct support mission. The Regt (-2nd Bn) engaged in refitting and recovering materiel and resting troops. The 2nd Bn (-G Co) in woods N of Quarry (091386) in assembly area. G Co occupies BERGHEIM (104388).

17 December 1944.

No change. There was considerable air activity over Regtl Area, some bombs were dropped and strafing reported. We suffered no casualties or damage.

1st Bn conducted reconnaissance of assembly area to the N.

18 December 1944.

At 1030, 1st Bn closed into assembly area vic of (0442). This move was made to put 1st Bn in favorable position for employment on N flank of Div. Regtl Area was searched for enemy paratroopers; none found. Plans and reconnaissance completed to move regiment to repulse counterattack.



19 and 20 December 1944

Plans completed for defense of GEY area (022398) completed and teams organized to ride tanks and TDs in event regiment is called on to move to repel counterattack. No change.

21 December 1944

No change in tactical situation. 1st Bn completed move back to assembly area vic of GROSSHAU (055388). Regiment (-2d Bn) in one assembly area. Defensive and counterattack plans continued to be improved and supplemented.

22 December 1944

Colonel Walthour relieved of assignment and duty as Regimental Commander, and Colonel Foster assumed command of 330th Infantry at 0920. The 330th Infantry given mission of relieving elements of 5th Armored Div from the boundary W of 331st Inf running from (113033) W to (103395)-(090394) to a boundary on S with 4th Cav Group running E-W from (098370)-(087379). Boundary between battalions (112376) NW to (100382). Third Bn on Right and 2d Bn on left. The 2d Bn was relieved from attachment to 5th Armored Div at 2300 and reverted to Regimental Reserve vic (093386) upon being relieved by 3rd Bn at 2200. The 1st Bn relieved elements of OCA in their sector at 2150. The 3d Bn established contact with Co A at 2305. Sector quiet. 3d Bn received light mortar fire in effecting relief; no casualties resulted. 323d FA Bn in direct support. Regimental CP closed into new location (065393) at 1235. One platoon AT Co attached to each 1st and 3rd Bns.

23 December 1944

The 1st and 3rd Bns continued to make adjustments in their defensive positions. The 1st Bn made contact with 331st Inf on left. The 2nd Bn occupied reserve position and carried out reorganization and rehabilitation. Co B, 772d TD Bn (T) reported in and began reconnaissance to support the regiment. Co C, 774th Tn Bn attached. Because the 5th Armored Div was withdrawn from line before having accomplished mission of clearing ground on W bank of ROER River in the sector, the 330th Infantry was ordered to attack and clear enemy from W bank of ROER in its sector. Mission of 1st Bn: Clear enemy in E of A, occupy town of WINDEN (113385) to W bank of river and destroy bridge at (116389). Mission of 3d Bn: Clear enemy from high ground at (109374) and occupy ground to W bank of ROER River in its sector and destroy bridge at (112373). The 2d Bn remained in reserve and support of 1st and 3d Bns with fire from present positions. At 1615, Co C launched attack from its positions at (111391) towards S edge of WINDEN (114389) and B Co from positions at (11053818) attacked E toward WINDEN, and Co A sent one platoon to attack the town from the S. Both B and C Cos met heavy small arms and artillery fire. Co C got into N edge of town at 1730, but B Co was unable to reach town before nightfall. The 3d Bn from present positions along crest of hill at (106374) attempted to send engineer party accompanied by Infantrymen of Co I to blow bridge at (112373). This party encountered heavy artillery and small arms fire from across river and were unable to reach bridge. 1st Bn, 331st Inf attached in present position at 2400.



24 December 1944.

Co A with a platoon of tanks advanced from southern end of WINDEN (111378) and by 1100 had reached the church at (113386). Resistance was light. Co A, after encountering heavy mortar, bazooka and small arms fire in N edge of town (113389) during night, were able to move forward with one platoon of tanks and by 1100 had penetrated town to a point at (113388). Co B was unable to advance, and was pulled back into Bn reserve in its original position. The resistance of the enemy in the vicinity of the church (113386) was very determined, and was supported by two SP guns. At 1300, Co B was ordered to infiltrate into town from the S and assist Co A in clearing the town. Co I continued to push toward the bridge at (112373). Enemy small arms and artillery fire covered the approaches to the bridge from the center and left and made it impossible to reach bridge from the left. At 1500, Co I began a new attack from positions vic of (105377) and advanced to within 150 yards of bridge where they came under small arms fire from enemy located in factory at (107372). One platoon of Co I attacked factory to clear enemy positions after an artillery preparation of light and heavy howitzers was placed on factory district. By 2300, the platoon of Co I had taken factory positions and captured 26 PWs.

25 December 1944.

Co F attached to 1st Bn to assist in clearing town of WINDEN. The 1st Bn with Co A leading followed by Co B attacked at 0730 with objective the factory at N end of town (11283890). At 1055, Co A was two houses short of objective. Co B, which initially followed Co A, turned right to secure road junction at (11503885). Initially, small arms fire from automatic weapons was main resistance, artillery and mortar fire being sporadic. Co A was held up in present position by bazooka fire. Co F in Bn reserve, followed attacking companies and cleared houses on their right flank. Co C occupied positions on N edge of town (11253917). At 1200, Co A and B received heavy concentrations of mortar fire which was silenced by artillery counter-fire. At 1720, 1st Bn reported the town of WINDEN cleared. Lt. Mannheim, Co B, 308th Engr Bn, made reconnaissance to bridge and placed charges, and at 260300 the bridge was blown. A patrol of Co K and Engrs from Co B, 308th Engr Bn, attempted to reach bridge (112373) by going around hill 253 (10753820) through WINDEN, accompanied by two medium tanks, but ran into small arms automatic fire and were forced to abandon attempt. The platoon of Co I continued to search out small enemy pockets in factory throughout daylight. Both attempts of 3rd Bn to blow bridge at (112373) were not making satisfactory progress; therefore, Co G was attached to 3rd Bn, and Co G and one platoon of Co K plus three tanks were given the mission of securing road junction (11153750) and escorting engineer party through WINDEN at (112-380), clearing enemy to bridge, and covering Engrs while charges were placed. By 2040, Co G had cleared road junction and had gotten engineer party to bridge approach. At 2100, while Engr officer was making his reconnaissance to place charges, the bridge was blown at E end by the enemy.

1st Bn 331st Inf was relieved by elements of 113 Cav Gp at 2000 and moved immediately to rejoin 331st Inf. Co G, 774th Tk Bn, relieved from attachment.

26 December 1944.

The 113th Cav Group began relief of 1st Bn at 251930, and at 260330 the 1st Bn had been completely relieved. 1st Bn moved out immediately for new assembly area vic of AACHEN, and closed in that area at 0830.



26 December 1944, cont'd.

Co F rejoined 2nd Bn at 0330 and Co E rejoined at 0600; at 0800, 2nd Bn moved from STRASS to assembly area vic of AACHEN and closed in that area at 1115. The 3rd Bn finished mopping up factory area at 2300, but the relief by the Engrs of the 113th Cav Group was not completed until 0600. The 3rd Bn assembled vic of STRASS, and at 1200, due to artillery fire being placed on road between STRASS and GROSSHAU by the enemy, the Bn marched to GROSSHAU by foot. The 3rd Bn moved by motor at 1400 for assembly area at AACHEN, and closed in that area at 1630. The Regtl CP located at (834403) was the center of the regimental assembly area. At 1730, the Regimental Combat Team with 323rd FA Bn, Co B, 308th Engr Bn, Co B, 308th Med Bn, and Co B, 772nd TD Bn (T), attached for movement, moved by motor to assembly area vicinity of SOMME LEUZE, BELGIUM (3195).

27 December 1944.

Regimental CP opened at (316958) at 0230, and by 0530 all units had closed into assembly area. 330th Infantry (-1st Bn) was attached upon arrival to VII Corps, and placed in Corps reserve. The 1st Bn was attached upon arrival to the 84th Inf Div, and went into assembly position in 84th Inf Div sector. Co B, 772nd TD Bn (T); Co C, 774th Tr Bn, and one platoon Co B, 308th Engr Bn attached to 330th Infantry. Co C, 774th Tr Bn closed in regimental assembly area vic (316958) at 2000. All units of regiment engaged in resting and rehabilitation.

28 December to 31 December 1944.

No change in tactical situation during remainder of period. Regiment engaged in reorganizing, training of replacements, critique of earlier operations and reconnaissance of routes to units of VII Corps for counterattack plans.

In accordance with paragraph 10, (c-5), AR 345-105, the following report after action for the month of January 1945 is submitted.

Period: 1 January 1945.

Disposition at beginning of period:

330th Inf (- 1st Bn; atchd to 84th Inf Div), atchd to VII Corps Reserve.

Regt in assembly area vic of SOMME LEUZE, Belgium (3195). Co G, 774th Tk Bn; Co B, 308th Med Bn; and one platoon Co E, 308th Engr Bn; atchd.

At 1100, the Regt was atchd to 3d Armd Div and was alerted to move and join 3d Armd Div in assembly area.

The Regt was atchd to 3d Armd Div in the following manner:

Regt (- 2nd and 3rd Bns) atchd to GCR.

1st Bn, upon release from attachment to 84th Inf Div, to become atchd to GCR, 3d Armd Div.

2nd Bn attached to CGA.

3rd Bn attached to GCB.

The Bn Comdrs of 2nd and 3rd Bns and quartering parties from all units of Regt departed at 1230 to contact respective units to which they were attached.

All attachments to Regt released at 1200.

The 2nd Bn crossed IP at 1435 to join CGA; 3rd Bn crossed at 1650; and the special units had cleared at 1600. The 1st Bn was released from attachment to 84th Inf Div at 1850 and moved at 2000. By 2100, all units of Regt had closed into assembly area of unit to which they were atchd.

One platoon of AT Co atchd and joined each, 2nd and 3rd Bns.

Regimental CP located vic of TERWANGE, Belgium (306079).

2 January 1945.

One platoon of AT Co atchd to 1st Bn at 0850 and joined 1st Bn at 1025.

Hq & Hq Co, Cn Co, AT Co (-), crossed IP at 1300 for new assembly area vic FERRIERES, Belgium (490025). At 1500, all had closed in.

The 3rd Bn atchd to CGD, 3d Armd Div. 3rd Bn moved from BARSU (286-017) to assembly area at PETITE HOUSLINNE (506939), closing at 1320. Preparation made for attack on following day.

3 January 1945.

Hq & Hq Co moved to CP location at WERBOMONT (543007), closing at 1730.

2nd Bn atchd to CGA. Bn assembled at BRA (575935). G Co rode tanks from BRA to FLORET (591931) where they dismounted and were committed with a company of tanks to clear road between FLORET and LANSIVAL (603904). G Co only was used in this operation. G Co and tanks attacked down road and by nightfall had reached point at (595921). Opposition consisted of infantry supported by artillery and mortars.

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At 0730, CCB with 3rd Bn riding on the tanks moved out of PETITE HOUSINNE to seize MALEMPRE (561889). The attack was made down roads. The infantry cleared road blocks when column was held up and tanks sprayed woods and protected flanks. By 1200, a point at (555890) was reached. Infantry of 3rd Bn made attack on MALEMPRE with L Co attacking right of town across open ground and K Co through woods on the left of town. Marching fire employed in taking town against opposition of snipers and heavy artillery fire. Tanks followed infantry into town and the town was cleared by 1700. The 3rd Bn pushed past the town and established road blocks and set up outpost line from (562882) to (568886) to protect town. Heavy artillery fire and Nebelwerfer fire fell on town throughout night. Approximately 87 PsW from 12th VGR were taken during day's operation. Losses light.

4 January 1945.

1st Bn attached to TF Hogan, CCB, 3d Armd Div.  
1st Bn moved to MANHAY (533902) in preparation for attack, final objective being CR at (576854). 1st Bn given mission of seizing high ground at (557877)-(565840). A and B Cos attacked cross-country, B Co to the left rear of A Co. C Co secured the road between (548894) and MALEMPRE (560890). A and B Cos encountered light artillery fire in reaching hill. A Co ran into enemy infantry digging in on forward slope of hill and drove them off with little difficulty. By nightfall, the positions had been secured and organized for defense. No supporting tanks were used in this operation.

2nd Bn - G Co, with one company of tanks, was given mission of taking LANSIVAL (603904) and F Co, with one company of tanks, given mission of securing JEVIGNE (599904). Both columns moved down main road between FLORET and LANSIVAL. The attack was made in severe cold with heavy snow falling and poor visibility. The infantry leading, closely supported by tanks. By 1200, lead elements had reached the road fork at (600905) against enemy infantry, artillery, and mortar fire. There, F Co moved toward JEVIGNE, and G Co toward LANSIVAL. As both forces neared the towns, opposition became stiffer and it developed into a house-to-house fight with tanks shooting up buildings and the infantry closing in and cleaning out the enemy infantry. Two enemy 75mm high-velocity guns were knocked out. Both towns were cleared by 1500. Approximately 100 PsW from 12 SS Pz Div were taken.

At 1600, E and G Cos launched attack to seize hill 108 (610895). This action was infantry action only, and by nightfall, the enemy infantry had been driven off and the hill secured. The attack was made against enemy automatic weapon fire, artillery, and mortar fire. E and G Cos occupied hill over night. F Co remained in LANSIVAL. Very heavy artillery fire was received in LANSIVAL throughout the night.

The day's operation was primarily infantry action by 3rd Bn. At 0800, K Co, abreast of trail at (564886), attacked to SE against heavy infantry and automatic fire and artillery fire. At 1030, I Co was committed on the left of the trail with L Co following. Progress was slow against stubborn resistance. High-velocity weapons, together with heavy mine fields, prevented the tanks from giving close-in support to infantry. By 1500, a line from (565884) to (573880) had been secured. No further progress made.

5 January 1944.

Cn and AT Cos closed into area vic of Regtl CP at 1455. AT Co established road blocks in CP area. Cn Co made reconnaissance to give fire sup-



port to 1st Bn and GCR.

A and B Cos advanced at 0800 with tanks astride trail from MALEMPRE toward RJ at (568859). Little opposition was encountered until column reached (566866). Here the attack ran into strong enemy emplacements, thick mine fields, and heavy artillery, mortar, and small arms fire.

Co C, and one tank company, were sent to outflank the enemy. This column took road from MALEMPRE to RJ (548893), then down main highway towards the main CR at (576854). Co C dismounted at (545875) and advanced to (563863) where heavy mine fields, artillery, and small arms fire and enemy tanks were encountered. C Co was unable to advance further.

At 0730, E and G Cos were counterattacked by three SP guns and approximately 50 infantry. The attack came from the NE and was preceded by artillery and mortar fire. The attack was repulsed and the SP guns and remaining infantry withdrew.

E and G Cos maintained positions on hill 108 throughout day and F Co, with tanks, worked their way to the first few houses of LIERNEAUX (617890). Slow progress was made by 3rd Bn; primarily infantry action. AT guns on flanks still preventing friendly tanks from giving close support. I and K Cos attacked abreast road; I on the left and K on the right; L Co following on the road. At close of day, a point at (572872) was reached.

#### 6 January 1945.

At 1000, Cn Co moved to gun positions from which they could give direct support to the 1st Bn.

A and B Cos took RJ (569660), opposition consisting of enemy infantry, automatic, and mortar fire. Enemy tanks had withdrawn during previous night and C Co reverted to Bn reserve after assisting in clearing road blocks and mine fields. A and B Cos made a night attack across the road and secured the high ground (570855).

F Co continued to push into LIERNEAUX from the W, and E and G Co pushed into town from the N. Resistance was light and by 1400, the town was completely cleared.

E and F Co, without tank support, took hill at (626884) dominating VERLEUMONT by nightfall, against enemy infantry and automatic weapons fire.

3rd Bn - The attack on FRAITURE (586863) was resumed on the morning of the 6th against light artillery fire. By 1600, FRAITURE had been entered and the tanks came up to assist the infantry in cleaning the town. House-to-house fighting developed and by nightfall, the town had been cleared by tanks and infantry. Approximately 200 POW were taken.

#### 7 January 1945.

A and B Cos attacked and seized the RJ at (576854). This attack was made by infantry; tanks being unable to advance through mine fields. 1st Bn was opposed by entrenched infantry and heavy mortar and artillery fire. A Co pushed beyond RJ to point at (578849). B Co occupied ground at (572848). C Co swung to the left and established road block at (582852). During the night, A Co sent patrol into woods to the S and contacted enemy infantry.

One platoon of F Co, riding medium tanks, attacked VERLEUMONT (629878) and took it with little opposition.

The remainder of the Bn came across country and joined the tank force.

At 1400, two columns started across country for JOUBIEVAL. E Co with right tank column and F Co with left column. The edge of the town was

reached but AT fire was met and the columns pulled back to the edge of woods at (642873).

3rd Bn - Attack for REGNE (611856) was launched by CCB. 1st Bn attacked town from the NW and the infantry of 2nd Bn, 33rd Armd Inf Regt attacked from the E. By 1000, fighting was going on in the town and by 1900, the town was secured and road blocks had been established to the E, S, and SW.

8 January 1945.

The Regt (- 2nd and 3rd Bns) reverted to control of 83d Inf Div at 072300, and was given mission of seizing and securing the town of BIHAIN (626842), and thus protect the right flank of the Div in conjunction with 83d Div mission of establishing bridgehead over LANGLER River.

At 072300, Co C, 774th Tk Bn; one platoon Co B, 629th TD Bn (SP); one platoon Co B, 308th Engr Bn; and 83d Cav Rcn Trp; and Co B, 308th Med Bn, were attached to Regt. 323rd FA Bn in direct support.

At 0930, the Regt (- 2nd and 3rd Bns), and attachments, began moving into assembly area vic of LANSIVAL (603903). The 1st Bn, upon relief by 1st Bn, 333rd Inf, at 0900 began moving from position at CR (576853) to assembly area at LANSIVAL. The 1st Bn closed in at 1410, and the AT (- 2 platoons) closed at 1600. Last elements of Co C, 774th Tk Bn, moved throughout night to assembly area vic LANSIVAL.

Movement was by infiltration due to great amount of vehicular traffic on roads, together with the icy condition of the roads.

Co C, 774th Tk Bn, attached to 1st Bn.

83d Rcn Trp sent one platoon to investigate quarry at (625848). The platoon of 83d Rcn Trp got into quarry at 1900, accompanied by 3-man patrol of Regt I&R Plat. One prisoner was captured.

From an OP at (624847), enemy troops and vehicles could be heard in BIHAIN (624839).

2nd Bn - Heavy mortar and artillery fire was kept on town throughout night and the tanks, with G Co mounted, moved into JOUBIEVAL in the morning with little resistance. The town was clear by 1000.

G Co cleared woods to the right of road at (664857), and F Co on left. Road blocks were established at (664856), (665858), and (660855), after stubborn enemy had been driven back by the two companies.

9 January 1945.

The 1st Bn began moving by motor at 0600 for assembly area at HEERONVAL (6386), detrucking at REGNE (600856), and closed in at 0800.

Co B was given mission of passing through quarries at (626847) and proceeding E and clean out woods at (635847). Co B moved from REGNE toward quarry. At 0855, Co B contacted enemy at (622847), who at that time were attacking the platoon of the 83d Cav Rcn Trp, occupying positions in the quarries. The enemy was driven off and Co B, whose effective strength was about 25 men, was ordered to take up defensive positions in quarries at (626847). The 2nd Plat of the Rcn Trp was ordered to join the 1st Plat in quarries and had joined the 1st Plat by 0930.

Cos A and C jumped off at 1140 in column of companies, C Co leading. The mission was to seize and secure BIHAIN, and the plan was for C Co to attack from the NE, C Co to by-pass woods at (625847) and A Co to clean the woods if the enemy gave them trouble.

By 1330, C Co's leading elements had reached (62658430) with their right on road at (629844). C Co passed woods at (625847) without meeting resis-



stance from them. At 1355, C Co had reached mill at (628842), where they met scattered s/a fire. Co C, after maneuvering, eliminated resistance and reached RJ at (62608405) at 1540 and Co A and one platoon of Engrs were moving to mill (628842).

Enemy vehicles were seen leaving BIHAIN by road (620838) and infantry moved from town into woods (630837). Arty took them under fire. The tks had remained behind on the high ground (632851) and at 1800, tks began moving towards town; two tks were in town at 1900, one was knocked out by high-velocity fires. Only one more tk got into town. The TDs remained on high ground at (634844).

B Co and Ren Trp maintained positions in quarry and received fairly heavy arty and mortar fires. Co C's opposition consisted principally of s/a and automatic fire.

Weather still cold and overcast; snow fell throughout day. Icy roads, vehicles in ditches, and snow banks made movement difficult. Cross-country movement by vehicle impossible.

1st Bn contacted Co G, 331st Inf during night and coordinated plan for operation on 10 Jan 45.

2nd Bn - G and F Cos pushed to (626855), (6785), and (668849).

3rd Bn CP closed into HEBRONVAL (632862). I Co was relieved of guarding road blocks at OTTRE (645853). Relief was made in small groups due to intense arty and mortar fire. L and K Cos closed into assembly area at HEBRONVAL.

Regtl CP: LANSIVAL (604904).

10 January 1945.

At 0800, 83d Ren Trp, with mission of protecting right of Regt and maintaining contact with 1st Bn and friendly elements on right, investigated and cleared quarries from (623847) E to (629847). The quarries were found to be unoccupied. No arty or mortar fire was received in quarry area during day.

B Co was given mission of sweeping woods at (635847) to be sure no bypassed pockets remained in rear of our forward elements. By 1030, B Co had swept woods from W to E and found woods unoccupied. B Co returned to (631-848) where they took up position. B Co contacted Co G, 331st Inf.

Both C and A Cos were held up by cross-fire from enemy MGs in woods just S of BIHAIN that had excellent observation on town. A Co moved from mill at (629842) to a position in rear of C Co (626841). C Co was held up just past cross-roads at (625841) at 1100. Six tks were in town supporting A and C Cos, and the platoon of TDs were on high ground at (626845) with good observation to the E and SE.

C and A Cos made slow progress fighting for each building against automatic and accurate s/a fire and light mortar fire. At 1400, C Co had reached a point at (625840). At 1600, A Co was at (624839), C Co was at (624840) and B Co, who rode into town on the 3rd Plat of tks, was at (6250-8395). Resistance by troops of the 19th Regt of 9th SS Pz Div was extremely bitter. At this time, about 12 houses remained to be taken in the town.

At 1700, the last house had been taken and the 1st Bn was clearing town, establishing road blocks and preparing to defend town.

At 1720, the I&R Flat relieved the 83d Ren Trp in quarry positions and the 83d Ren Trp reverted to 83d Inf Div.

The 323rd FA Bn and Cn Co kept fire continually on woods S of BIHAIN and 3 TOTs of 11 Bns each were fired on woods just S of BIHAIN.

110 PaW from 9th SS Pz Div taken during day's operations.

2nd Bn - No change. One rifle company supported by tks protecting road blocks. Bn CP at JOUBIEVAL (655864).



3rd Bn completely assembled at HEBRONVAL, reorganizing.  
Regt CP closed LANSIVAL. Opened at HEBRONVAL (6366) at 1600.

11 January 1945.

The 330th Inf reattached to 3d Armd Div at 0800 and all attachments to 330th Inf reverted to 83d Div. Regt Hq and Sep Cos attached to Hq 3d Armd Div. 1st Bn attached to CCR, 3d Armd Div.

At 0600, heavy concentrations of mortar and artillery fire began falling on 1st Bn in BIHAIN after a quiet night. The concentrations lasted for 30 minutes.

One platoon of tanks of 83d Rcn Bn, 3d Armd Div, and a section of TDs, 3d Armd Div, got into BIHAIN at 0700. At 0845, small arms and automatic weapons fire was received in BIHAIN, coming from woods just S of town and it was believed enemy infantry and tanks were forming for an attack on the town. Soon after, enemy tanks were sighted at (629839). Artillery was called down on the tanks and suspected infantry locations.

The enemy launched an attack with five tanks, preceded by infantry, from woods just S of BIHAIN, at 0900. Attached and supporting tks and TDs fired on enemy armor. Three enemy tks were knocked out at (625838), (625836), and (625836). The 1st Bn took 38 Pw. The attack was repulsed with heavy losses for the enemy. The two remaining tanks withdrew to woods and the artillery fired TOT on road on which the tanks withdrew.

Arty observation planes picked up a column of enemy troops moving S along road between (609836) and (608820), estimated to be of Bn strength. This column was taken under fire by artillery with good effect.

The 1st Bn was given mission by CCR of taking bridge at (62558220) and securing line to the SW. The 1st Bn moved out at 1600, C Co leading, and at 1920, had taken bridge, with little opposition. 31 Pw taken, 8 of which were wounded. 1st Bn given this mission because it was believed enemy were starting a withdrawal and new troops could not be brought in in time; therefore, 1st Bn, which had been fighting continually for six days, had to launch another attack. At 2000, the Bn set up defenses to protect the bridge and themselves. The of 3d Armd Div were moving up to reinforce 1st Bn.

The town of BIHAIN, having been secured and the attack continuing, the 1st Bn was withdrawn from positions in quarries.

1st Bn received two small counterattacks; one at 1950, and one at 2100; one enemy tank knocked out and the counterattack repulsed.

2nd Bn - No change.

3rd Bn - No change.

12 January 1945.

Regt CP at HEBRONVAL (6366); Cn and AT Cos in same vic. The 1st Bn maintained positions around bridge at (62558220) throughout the night and at 0837, the 83d Rcn Bn began passing through the 1st Bn and by 0930, had completed same. Shortly after, the 1st Bn moved back to BIHAIN to secure the town and rest and reorganize. At 2130, C Co was ordered to return to bridge at (62558220) and establish road blocks in surrounding road net.

Heavy artillery and Nebelwerfer concentrations fell on BIHAIN throughout the day.

2nd Bn - No change.

3rd Bn began moving to assembly area at (638816) in preparation for attack on LOMRE (643799).



Because the assembly area at (638816) had not been taken by preceding elements, the Bn moved into assembly area via of BIHAIN (625838).

13 January 1945.

1st and 2nd Bns - No change.

3rd Bn - At 0530, the 3rd Bn moved out in column of companies with mission of taking LOMRE (644800). At 0800, the Bn deployed; K Co on the right of trail leading to LOMRE and L Co on the left. The 3rd Bn passed through the 1st Bn, 331st Inf, 400 yards S of LANGLIR (648818). The tks moved abreast of K and L Cos, giving close support. The enemy fought a delaying action and heavy automatic and mortar fire was encountered. I Co was committed on the left of L Co, which had suffered heavy casualties. I Co advanced rapidly and by 2000 had occupied LOMRE.

14 January 1945.

1st Bn - The Bn moved from BIHAIN to an assembly area at (630777), closing at 0800. At 1030, an attack was launched to take HALONREUX (645781), Bn in column of companies, C Co leading, each company supported by tks. Rapid progress was made initially but resistance stiffened as the column approached the objective. HALONREUX was taken at 1530 by the tank-infantry team.

A Co, supported by tks, advanced on MONT LA BAN (645785), attacking it from the S to assist TF Kane in taking the town. By 1800, the two forces had met at the center of the town. Resistance consisted of infantry supported by artillery, mortars and high-velocity weapons.

At 2400, B Co, mounted on tks, attacked to seize high ground at (648773) in preparation for attack on VAUX (655768) on following day. This attack was repulsed by dug-in infantry supported by high-velocity weapons and artillery. B Co and the tanks withdrew to HALONREUX.

2nd Bn - No change.

3rd Bn - The attack was resumed with mission of seizing CHERAIN (665775). The attack was launched with the rifle companies riding the tks, I Co on lead tks. The column got within 1220 yds of CHERAIN where the advance was halted by high-velocity fire. At 1300, the attack was resumed against heavy arty and direct fire weapons. After advancing 300 yds, the tks were forced to withdraw after having lost tks to high-velocity guns located in and around CHERAIN. L Co covered the withdrawal.

At 2300, the Bn (- tanks) attempted to enter CHERAIN from the NW and E but encountered entrenched enemy infantry and heavy machine gun fire; the attempt was unsuccessful.

15 January 1945.

Cn Co, after having made reconnaissance for gun positions, moved from assembly area to support 2nd Bn at 1430.

1st Bn - The Bn attacked in column of companies, A Co leading, at 1130: initial objective the same high ground at (648773) and the final objective the town of VAUX (655768). The initial objective was taken at 1400 against very determined resistance by infantry supported by artillery, mortar and SP guns.

84 reinforcements were formed into a task force and, under command of Capt Fritts, took up positions on the high ground at (648773) to enable the



Bn, whose effective strength was depleted, to reorganize for the attack on VAUX. With the task force under Captain Fritts occupying position on the high ground at (648773), A, B, and C Cos, mounted on tks, advanced to within 300 yds of VAUX where they dismounted and fought their way through the town supported by the tks. VAUX was secured at 1700. A few PsW were taken and approximately 60 enemy killed in the town.

The replacement task force came forward to secure the town while the remainder of the Bn reorganized.

2nd Bn - At 1600, the Bn moved toward BACIAIN (664791). On reaching the edge of the woods at (664805), the column halted and F Co, with tks, attacked across country to take STERPIGNY (676778). The attack was launched at 2200 and continued throughout the night against enemy infantry supported by four Mark IV tks. Our tks knocked out the four enemy tks and by 160430, both tks and infantry were well into the town. E Co sent a combat patrol to CHERAIN (665775) where contact was made with elements of our 3rd Bn near the NE edge of the town.

3rd Bn - The Bn, supported by tks, launched an attack at 1200, under a smoke screen laid by M Co and supporting arty, to take CHERAIN. The attack progressed to the stream at (66057765) where the infantry came under extremely accurate machine gun and mortar fire. All of the supporting tks were put out of action by AT fire. The attack was unsuccessful. The infantrymen were forced to take cover in the water of the streams to escape the enemy fire. A withdrawal became necessary and with L Co covering the withdrawal, I and K Cos moved back to the former position.

The AT guns and heavy machine guns were brought up and defensive position established at (659777). Effective fighting strength of I, K, and L Cos - 2 officers and 17 men.

16 January 1945.

The 1st Bn continued to secure VAUX.

2nd Bn - G Co joined F Co at 0730, and shortly afterwards H Co displaced weapons to STERPIGNY. The remainder of the day was spent in clearing town and establishing road blocks and perfecting defensive positions.

3rd Bn - At 0900, E Co, 2nd Bn, 330th Inf, passed to the left of the 3rd Bn positions and the 3rd Bn assembled at LOMRE.

17 January 1945.

The Regt was notified by the 3rd Armd Div that release of the Regt (- 2nd Bn and Cn Co) to the 83d Inf Div control would be effected on the following day. Quartering parties from all units departed at 1500 for HAM-ORF, Belgium, to secure billets.

The gun platoons of AT Co, that had been attached to battalions, reverted to company control.

1st Bn - No change.

2nd Bn - The 2nd Bn was given the mission of clearing the woods extending 2000 meters along the main road from STERPIGNY towards GOUVEY (708-778). The attack was launched at 1400 with E Co on the right of the road and F Co on the left. E and F Cos advanced approximately 600 yds and reached a line generally along the creek (684781) where they came under intense fire from entrenched infantry and two tks and one SP gun located along the W edge of the woods just beyond the creek. Both Cos were pinned down.

G Co with five tks attempted to outflank the enemy positions by moving NE out of STERPIGNY on a trail at (680786). This force was held up at



(683786) by machine gun fire and infantry from both the left and right in the woods just to their front. No further progress made.

18 January 1945.

The special units (- Cn Co) began moving at 0800 for new assembly area. The 3rd Bn cross IP at LANGLIR at 0900.

The Regt CP was opened at ST ROCH, Belgium (507048) at 1130. AT Co closed into FERRIERES (496024) at 0945. Sv Co closed into same location as Regt Hq at 1345. The 1st Bn moved under 3rd Arm Div control and closed into HAMOIR (433053) at 1850. The 3rd Bn closed into HAMOIR at 1100.

2nd Bn - At 0600, E and F Cos resumed the attack. Because the rifle companies were depleted, both E and F Cos attacked on the left of the road in column of companies, E Co leading. By 1400, after having fought enemy infantry for 2000 meters, E and F Cos reached the E edge of the woods. Combat patrols of G Co swept the right side of the road and found it unoccupied; the enemy tks had withdrawn during the night.

19 January 1945.

Relief of the 2nd Bn by the 2nd Bn, 335th Inf was begun at 0900. The Bn assembled at BARCLAIN and at 1430 began, under 3rd Arm Div control, movement by motor to billets at IZIER (470005), closing at 1800.

Cn Co closed into assembly area at FERRIERES (496024) at 1430.

All elements of the Regt under Regt control at 1800.

20 January 1945.

The 3rd Bn moved from HAMOIR to FILOT (461051).

All elements of Regt began reorganization and training program. Bn emphasized the training of replacements in weapons firing and small unit training.

21 January 1945.

The 1st Bn moved from HAMOIR to billets in HEYD (4596), Bn CP located at MORVILLE (435955). Cn Co moved from FERRIERES to billets with Regt Hq and Sv Cos.

22 - 24 January 1945.

Training and reorganization continued. Regt Hq, Sv and Cn Cos, moved from ST ROCH to make room for XVIII Corps troops.

Sv Co closed into billets in MY (453080). Regt Hq closed into FERRIERES (486024) and Cn Co moved to THIER DE FERRIERES (488016).

25 - 31 January 1945.

Intensive training program was carried on throughout the remainder of the period. The training emphasized the training of new leaders, both officers and NCOs as well as the reinforcements. Included in the schedule was: attacks on villages and woods, both day and night; attacks by the tank-infantry teams; tank stalking by bazooka teams; familiarization firing of infantry weapons by reinforcements; and small unit problems.

In accordance with paragraph 10, (c-3), AR 345-105, the following report after action for the month of February 1945 is submitted.

AT Co at HOUPET (495025).  
Training of reinforcements carried on throughout period.

6 February 1945.

The 83d Division passed to control of the XIX Corps for operations in the JULICH sector. Extensive preparations were made to make the move secret. Vehicle markings and division patches were removed. All troops received instruction in secrecy discipline.

The Regt, with Co B, 308th Med Bn attached and the 323rd FA Bn attached for movement, crossed IP at BOMAL (428999) at 1745 from assembly area via of MHEER, HOLLAND (631439).

All units of the Regt had closed into assembly areas by 070200.

Units in assembly areas as follows:

1st Bn - FURON LE COMPTE, BELGIUM (610715).  
2nd Bn - LIBEEK, HOLLAND (615448).  
3rd Bn - MOULAND, BELGIUM (585418).  
Sv Co - MOULAND, BELGIUM (585418).  
Cn Co - HOLLAND (590425).  
Co B, 308th Med Bn - FURON LE COMPTE, BELGIUM (610715).  
Regtl CP located at MHEER, HOLLAND (631438).

7 - 8 February 1945.

Units established themselves in billets and training was resumed.

9 February 1945.

The Regtl Combat Team was alerted to join the 29th Div and become attached to that division for operations across the ROER RIVER in the vic of JULICH. The Regtl Commander, S-2 and S-3 departed for the 29th Div area to contact the 29th Div and establish a forward CP. Quartering parties from all units departed to select assembly areas for their units. A forward Regtl CP was established at SCHLEIDEN, GERMANY (836568).

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10 - 22 February 1945.

The Regtl CT remained in present bivouac area and continued training. Plans which called for the CT to move to forward assembly areas on 11 February were postponed. Regt continued training, emphasizing attack across open ground, night attack, use of screening smoke and tank-infantry training.

23 February 1945.

The attack of the 29th Div jumped off at 0300 to establish a bridgehead across the ROER RIVER vic of JULICH. At 1000, the Regt with Co B, 308th Med Bn, Co B, 643rd TD Bn (T) (- 1 platoon being fitted with M-18 Tank Destroyers) crossed IP at GROSNICH, HOLLAND, to join the 29th Div.

The Regtl CP opened at SCHLEIDEN, GERMANY (950550) at 1230. The 1st and 3rd Bns closed into Assembly Area at HONGEN, GERMANY (928538); the 2nd Bn closed into SCHLEIDEN. The Regtl CT was completely closed into Assembly Area at 1430. Co B, 308th Engr Bn, already in area, became attached to the Regt.

The 330th CT became attached to the 29th Div, on arrival.

Cn Co moved to firing positions near KOSLAR, GERMANY (600598), at 2100, to support the attack of the Regt on the following day. During the night Cn Co had 6 vehicles damaged by heavy caliber mortar fire, casualties were light.

24 February 1945.

The 115th Inf Regt secured that part of the Division bridgehead in their zone during the night of 23-24 February. At 0800, the Bn and Sep Co Commanders crossed the ROER RIVER and contacted Commanders of the elements of the 115th Inf, preparatory to effecting their relief.

At 1300, the Regt was alerted to move across the river and relieve the 115th Inf.

At 1400, the Bns began moving on foot to cross the ROER RIVER. Weapons and extra ammunition were carried on jeeps and trailers. The jeeps were staged to KOSLAR. Each Bn was allotted 16 jeeps, including command and supply vehicles. From KOSLAR, Bn TOs were prepared to join foot columns with vehicles at bridge site or issue weapons and extra ammunition to troops as they passed by; this precaution taken in event enemy succeeded in destroying the ponton bridge, or vehicles not allowed to cross bridge by traffic control officer.

The Bns crossed the river at Bridge Site #2 (027586) and each Bn moved directly to relieve the respective Bn on the Division bridgehead. The 1st Bn, reserve Bn, relieved the 3rd Bn, 115th Inf, in BROICH (014620) at 2147. The 2nd Bn relieved the 1st Bn, 115th Inf, on Obj B (025632)-(029631)-(030627) at 2120. The 3rd Bn relieved the 2nd Bn, 115th Inf, on Obj C (034623)-(038620)-(039618) at 2045.

The 2nd Bn sent patrols to MERSCH (0463) and the 3rd Bn sent patrols to PATTERN (054626). All patrols ran into enemy outposts, drew fire, and were unable to penetrate the towns.

Co A, 736th Tk Bn, consisting of two platoons medium tks, one platoon light tks and one assault gun platoon arrived in Regtl area at 2030 and became attached to the Regt.



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The Tk Co, TD Co, and the Regtl AT Co crossed the ROER RIVER during the hours of darkness and assembled vic of BROICH.

The Regtl GP opened at BROICH (014620) at 1900 and the Regt assumed responsibility for 115th Inf sector at 2220.

Sporadic artillery and mortar fire fell during the time the Regt crossed the river. Enemy aircraft bombed the area throughout the night but no casualties resulted.

Co A, 92nd Cml Bn was attached, and Co B, 812th TD Bn (SP) was put in direct support. Both these units had been attached to the 115th Inf. The 323rd FA Bn, which was in general support of XIX Corps, was put in direct support of the Regt.

25 February 1945.

The 2nd Bn launched an attack in column of companies, E, G and F, at 0515 to take MERSCH (039634). E Co advanced to a point at (039637) where they were held up by fire from bunkers and entrenched infantry. G Co was committed on the right of E and at 0640, G Co was in the southern edge of MERSCH after by-passing enemy to the NW. G Co moved rapidly across the open ground by employing marching fire against enemy s/a and long range MG fire. By 0730, G Co was well into MERSCH and was working up the main road running through the town. At 1100, G Co had reached the northern edge of MERSCH, having cleared the main road, and had begun working SW through the town to clear the enemy resistance that had held up E Co. By 1110, E Co had begun to move forward and shortly after, E and G Cos had made contact at (044636). Mopping up operations continued. A platoon of tanks and TDs moved into MERSCH to assist in this operation. By 1400, all resistance had been eliminated. The Bn consolidated their position in MERSCH.

The 3rd Bn attacked from their positions at 0515 to take PATTERN (053-627).

L Co advanced against s/a fire and at 0715 was in southern edge of PATTERN and by 0810 had occupied all of the town and was engaged in mopping up operations. Three light tks were lost to enemy AT fire moving into PATTERN to support L Co. The enemy hid in holes as infantry passed and returned to fire on tks as they came forward. K Co was held up initially at (044623) by MG fire from the SE. At 0930, the 3rd Bn reported PATTERN secured. At 1300, K Co had moved into the western edge of PATTERN and had linked up with L Co. I Co began moving towards PATTERN with mission of passing through PATTERN and attacking SEVENICH (055643). I Co ran into an anti-personnel mine field at (047628) and was held up; therefore, L Co was ordered to attack SEVENICH. At 1435, L Co launched attack on SEVENICH and by 1500 had progressed 1/3 of the way against heavy s/a and scattered arty fire. At 1520, the objective was smoked by the arty and L Co moved into the town. By 1700, all resistance had ceased and the town was secure. The 1st Bn moved from Assembly Area at BROICH at 1400 to attack MUNTZ (0466). The Bn moved by route BROICH - TETZ - BOSLAR (018647). B Co took up positions on Hill 109 (022630) to secure flank. Platoon of 4 quads and one 40mm gun of the 453rd AAA Bn attached to Regt and took up positions on Hill 109 to support the attack of 1st Bn.

At 1600, the 1st Bn crossed LD (041681) in column of companies, C Co leading, accompanied by 1 platoon medium tks, followed by A Co. At 1615, C Co was in the SW edge of the town and had encountered no resistance.



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By 1630, C Co held positions at (039659) and were still advancing against light s/a fire. Road blocks were encountered at (041659) and (039659) and the resistance stiffened. These blocks were blasted out by the mine squad with TNT after the tanks had tried unsuccessfully to blast them out. The resistance continued to be stubborn. The 1st Bn continued the attack during the night and at 260130, A and C Cos had cleared and secured the town. On Co displaced from KOSLAR to BROICH (021619) to continue close support of the Regt.

26 February 1945.

The 1st Bn at 0130 sent a combat patrol consisting of one platoon from Co A to HASSELSWEILER (0566), the next objective of the 1st Bn. At 0430, the patrol occupied houses on the outskirts of the town without opposition. At 0555, A Co launched attack from the NE edge of MUNTZ to take HASSELSWEILER. A Co's advance was met by MI and high-velocity fire from the NE. By 0930, A Co had secured the W half of the town from (057667) to (057663). One platoon of tanks joined A Co to assist them in cleaning the town and, shortly after, B Co moved into the town in rear of A Co.

A Co built up strong base of fire and rushed across the open ground in the middle of the town and by 1005 had secured the town except the most eastern row of houses. At 1115, the town was secured.

Elements of the 115th Inf passed through the 2nd and 3rd Bns at 0500 to attack SPIEL (069652). The 3rd Bn assembled at MERSCH.

The 2nd Bn moved from MERSCH to BROICH at 0600. The 2nd Bn was given mission of taking GEVELSDORF (054686). To avoid open ground and enemy arty, the 2nd Bn planned to move by foot from BROICH through TETZ - BOSLAR - RALSHOVEN (039681) and to launch the attack from RALSHOVEN which had been taken by the 102nd Inf Div.

The 2nd Bn moved from BROICH at 0800 for RALSHOVEN.

At 1115, in order to speed the operation to take GEVELSDORF, the 1st Bn was ordered to attack the town from the S and assist the 2nd Bn in taking it. At 1245, B Co, mounted on platoon of tks and supported by TD fire from N edge of HASSELSWEILER, launched attack on GEVELSDORF, along the main road from HASSELSWEILER (056668). At 1303, tk traps at (055679) were encountered but a crossing was found and B Co continued on into the town without meeting opposition and were ordered to clear the eastern half.

The 2nd Bn in column of companies, F leading, followed by E, launched attack on GEVELSDORF from RALSHOVEN at 1310. One platoon of the 29th Div Recon Troop who held positions at (050681) attacked at the same time. At 1330, F Co reached the W edge of the town without opposition; the Recon platoon joined F Co and moved in at the same time. E Co followed F Co in at 1400. At 1336, C Co accompanied by a platoon of tks moved into GEVELSDORF, B and F Cos made contact and the town was secured.

At 1550, B Co with 1 platoon of tks attacked to seize high ground at (063693). At 2000, 1 platoon of B Co had seized the high ground after the tks had broken paths through tactical wire for the infantry. B Co sent a strong patrol to GUT ISENKROIDT (068692) and by 2100 had occupied houses at (067692). These positions were occupied throughout the night.

The 3rd Bn, Regt Reserve, moved from MERSCH to MUNTZ and from MUNTZ to HASSELSWEILER, closing at 1730.

Co A, 92nd Cml Bn was relieved from attachment at 2200.

On Co displaced from BROICH to MERSCH (045626) to continue close support of the Regt.

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27 February 1945.

At 0500, the 175th Inf passed through the positions of the 330th Inf to attack to the N. The 330th Inf reverted to control of the 83rd Inf Div. The Regt remained in position until 1400 and then assembled as follows:

1st Bn - GEVELSDORF and vic (054685) and HASSELSWEILER (055675).  
2nd Bn - GEVELSDORF with GP at RALSHOVEN (039681).  
3rd Bn and Plat of 453rd AAA Bn - HASSELSWEILER (055675).  
Co B, 643rd TD Bn and Co A, 736th Tk Bn - MUNTZ (040660).

28 February 1945.

Reorganization and maintenance of vehicles begun. Shower baths set up and Regt readied itself for future operations.

SUBJECT: Report After Action Against the Enemy.

TO : The Adjutant General, Washington, D. C. (thru channels).

In accordance with paragraph 10 (c-3), AR 345-105, and Adm Memo #3 Hq VII Corps, 30 July 1944, the following report after action for the month of March 1945 is submitted:

1 March 1945.

At 282300, Regtl CO and S-3 reported to Div CP to receive orders for movement of the Regtl CT. The Regtl CO returned to the Regtl CP and issued orders at 0200 for the movement of the Regt to vic of BEDBURDYCK, GERMANY (177808). The Comd Gp departed at 0530.

The 1st serial, consisting of the 2nd Bn, 323rd FA Bn, Cn Co, Co B 643rd TD Bn, AT Co, Co A 736th Tk Bn, and Flat Y of the 453rd AA Bn crossed IP at TITZ at 0630 for BEDBURDYCK. The 1st Bn and Hq Co were to follow later in serial #3 and the 3rd Bn and Co B 308th Med Bn were to make up serial #6.

The movement of the 3rd and 6th serials was delayed considerably due to the great number of units moving forward, congested traffic, and were far behind schedule in arriving at new area.

The Comd Gp established Fwd CP at BUSCH (202837) at 0850. They were the first American troops to reach that town. Eight PsW were taken by the Comd Gp and one enemy fighter plane was shot down by the I&R Flat.

The attached units, except Co B 308th Med Bn, had all closed into assembly area vic BUSCH by 1600. The 2nd Bn detrucked at BEDBURDYCK and proceeded on foot to LUTTERGHLEN (212860) closing in at 1130. The trucks that moved the 2nd Bn returned to pick up the 3rd Bn.

At 1300, the 2nd Bn was issued orders to attack. Mission: to attack to the NE with objective of siezing NEUSS and the W bank of the RHINE RIVER in our sector.

The 2nd Bn advanced at 1410 on GREFRATH (230865) in approach march, F Co leading; Tk Co (- 1 plat) atched to 2nd Bn. No resistance was encountered and 15 PsW were taken by the Bn in clearing up the town. The 2nd Bn was ordered to continue the pursuit to deny the enemy the opportunity to reorganize his forces.

F Co encountered high velocity fire from a gun to the NE after moving out of GREFRATH toward LANZERATH (240872). F Co continued the attack and came under considerable high-velocity fire from a gun to the NE. At 1730, F Co was receiving fire from a battery of six 88mm guns located at (244877). F Co had advanced to within 100 yards of the battery at the time they began receiving fire. Arty and 88mm fire was directed on these guns with good effect but F Co was still unable to advance. E Co was committed at 1900 to swing to the left of F Co to outflank the gun battery, relieve F Co, and continue on to objective.

E Co jumped off and at 1945 had advanced 1500 yards to (240877) and by 2130, E Co was at (250889) and had encountered no resistance. The guns that had been holding up F Co's advance had been outflanked and F Co was advancing to the right rear of E Co.

By 2300, E Co was moving up to the NORD CANAL astride the road at (253-890) and F Co was advancing steadily on the right. G Co was following up E Co, completing mopping-up operations. The Bn advanced rapidly against light resistance consisting of light arty and S/A fire.

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The 1st Bn detrucked at BEDBURDYCK and closed into GREFRATH at 1635. The 1st Bn was given mission of attacking on the left of the 2nd Bn, crossing the canal and assisting in the taking of NEUSS. C Co and A Co attacked at 1810; C Co to advance on road at (234888) and A Co to attack to the left of C Co to secure Obj 6 (243906), protect the left of the Regt, and secure a crossing of the canal in that sector. At 2320, C Co had reached (236890) and A Co (228893). Resistance was light; scattered arty and S/A fire. Because resistance was determined to be light, A Co was ordered not to proceed to Obj 6 but to attack that part of Obj 4 at (250895). At 2400, A Co was at (239895); B Co (236883); and C Co (236889).

The 3rd Bn closed into GREFRATH at 2230 and remained there through the period.

2 March 1945.

At 0025, E Co had gotten 1 platoon across the canal (258895) on a bridge that had not been destroyed. This platoon reported the far side clear of enemy and E Co began crossing. F Co was at the canal to the left of E Co, and G Co, who had been following, was swinging to the right of E Co to clear the city area on the Bn's right flank. By 0245, both E and F Cos were across the canal, G Co had run into an enemy strong point at (259888) and were bringing up tanks to blast it out. The 2nd Bn at this point was well into the built-up part of NEUSS and was having trouble controlling civilians and guarding PsW. Large buildings made it difficult to advance rapidly and still comb the area. By 0600, the 2nd Bn had advanced to a line along the docks from (27059010) to (272897) and was continuing the mopping-up process.

A Co crossed the RR and was advancing NE and at 0105, was at (246906). C Co on the right of A Co was within 400 yards of the canal. Both Cos sent patrols to the canal to find crossings, and began closing up to the canal. B Co, mounted on tanks, moved up to rear of A Co. Engineers who had previously been alerted for bridging operations had begun to bring forward bridging equipment. A Co ran into an enemy tank which was destroyed by Bazooka teams. All bridges in the 1st Bn except one had been destroyed. However, A Co found damaged locks and by 0630, the Co had crossed and B Co was following.

At 0735, A Co was at CR (251915), receiving some S/A fire. B Co was in the built-up area clearing buildings and factories. 1st Bn continued slow process of moving forward to the N clearing out buildings throughout the day. By 2100, 1st Bn had cleared all the area across the canal from (240915)-(253897)-(257924), except one bunker at (245913). A Co was using dynamite to clear this bunker. Opposition was mainly by sniper and scattered arty fire.

At 0200, the 3rd Bn was ordered to move up behind the 2nd Bn, preparatory to passing through them and continue mission of clearing the town. By 0300, the 3rd Bn had cleared the enemy 88mm gun battery at (244877) that had been by-passed by F Co. Some PsW were taken and the guns put out of action. By 0430, the 3rd Bn had closed in the area vic of (254893) behind the 2nd Bn. At 1230, the 3rd Bn moved out in column of Cos to pass through the 2nd Bn and at 1330, the Bn crossed the LD at (267903) to clear the area within (270930)-(276923)-(427096)-(262918). K Co on the left, I Co on the right. 3rd Bn was supported by Co B, 736th Tk Bn. By 1700, initial objective had been completely secured against light resistance and the 3rd Bn was ordered to continue the attack and take Obj C, square (2892), Obj D (2993) grid square, and Obj E (3192) and (3193) grid squares.

The 3rd Bn moved steadily throughout the night of 2-3 March and by 0545, I and K Cos were on objective and clearing the area preparatory to sending a patrol to the bridge. K Co remained on Obj D consolidating that area and establishing road blocks.

- 2 -

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Resistance was principally S/A and bazooka fire. One platoon of I Co suffered casualties from panzerfaust fired from buildings as they advanced. I Co caught a column of enemy advancing towards them in close formation and killed 14 with MG and BAR fire.

The 1st Bn 331st Inf was attached to 330th Inf Regt at 1630 in place, HINTERFELD (323918) where they had been maintaining a road block while attached to the 2nd Armd Div. The 1st Bn 331st Inf, with 2 platoons, Co B 774th Tk Bn, passed through A Co at 1950 to sieze OBERKASSEL (293952) and attempt to sieze the bridge to DUSSELDORF intact if possible. Steady progress was made throughout the night. Their attached armor was held up by road block at (260923), the foot troops proceeded on mission, some resistance was met at OBERLORICK but was quickly eliminated. The tanks and TDs joined the Bn at 0330 after road block was removed by Engrs. By 0905, the 1st Bn 331st Inf was on the northern edge of Obj E and had contacted our 3rd Bn and both Bns were on the approaches to the bridge when it was blown by the enemy at 0937.

The 329th Inf received a counterattack by enemy infantry and armor from vic of KAPELLEN (222817) at 0600. A task force consisting of Co B 308th Engr Bn (- 1 platoon), 1 gun platoon AT Co and AT Mine Plat, two platoons TDs (T) and Hq Co personnel were dispatched at 0800 to set up road blocks and defense to protect our right flank and rear vic of VIER-  
CINDEN (214824). At 0930, the attack was broken up by dive bombers and the 329th Inf, all troops except the AT Co, were withdrawn at 1400. The AT Co maintained road blocks until 041000.

Regtl CP displaced to KAMBERG (244881), opened at 1400. Plat Y was relieved from attachment to 2nd Bn and attached to 3rd Bn at 2230.

### 3 March 1945.

The 1st and 2nd Bn continued to search out their areas during early hours of morning and additional P&W were taken. At 0720, the 2nd Bn was ordered to move to (297937) and sweep area along way. The Bn moved at 0930 and closed in at 1130. The 1st Bn was ordered to follow 2nd Bn to assembly area. The Bn moved at 1115 and closed into area vic (285928) at 1250.

The Regt was in the process of regrouping at 1300 in preparation for further attacks when word was received that the Regt would not move but maintain and organize present positions.

Areas of responsibility were assigned as follows:

1st Bn - (282920)-(278933)-(283938)-(293939).

2nd Bn - (289931)-(292958)-(311949)-(3093).

3rd Bn - the peninsula from east of a line (311949)-(3093).

1st Bn 331st Inf - (281939)-(267960)-(279977)-(311950).

The 1st and 2nd Bns began occupying positions, the 1st Bn 331st Inf remained in the area of the 3rd Bn.

Patrols and road blocks were established to prevent civilian movement and the search of the area was continued.

Plat Y 453rd AA Bn was released from attachment and attached to 329th Inf in place.

The Regtl CP displaced to NEUSS (261895), opening at 0915 and later moved to (283927), opening at 1500.

The attack of 1 March through 3 March was pushed rapidly to exploit the confusion of the enemy created by the rapid advance of our forces in this sector. The steady pressure exerted both day and night prevented him from reorganizing. Elements of many enemy units were taken prisoner.

The resistance throughout the period generally would be classified as light, although some strong points resisted stubbornly. These strong points

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were by-passed by the assault troops and mopped-up by elements that followed.

F Co captured 56 POW as they came marching down a street at close interval, right shoulder arms. Later the same night, two men captured a half-track towing an 88mm gun, the crew of 15 were riding in the half track. G Co took about 50 police officers of NEUSS as they were mounting trucks to cross the river. In each of the above instances, the enemy was not aware of the fact that our troops were in the area.

Civilians offered very little resistance although cases of sniping by civilians was reported. Civilians milling around hampered operations during darkness.

855 POW were taken during this period.

#### 4 March 1945.

The 1st Bn 331st reverted to control of the 331st Inf at 0900 and the 1st Bn was ordered to occupy area assigned to 1st Bn 331st, occupation complete at 1130.

Co A 736th Tk Bn and Co B 643rd TD Bn (SF) were released from attachment at 1230.

Bns continued to organize their sectors for defense. OPs were established along the river line.

#### 5 March through 8 March 1945.

Patrols were maintained throughout the period to enforce civilian curfew. On Co and the 323rd FA Bn fired missions on enemy activity across the RHINE.

An enemy concentration of about 150 rds of arty fell on the 3rd Bn area on 051845. The CP received a direct hit, casualties were light. Light harassing fire fell in Regtl area throughout the night.

A patrol of 3 men of Co B crossed the RHINE at (305952) on 070045 and returned on 072100 with information of enemy installations and troop movement on the E side of the river.

Training was conducted on a limited scale with assault boats, squad problems and conditioning marches.

Co B 308th Engr Bn was relieved of attachment on 6 March 1945.

#### 9 March through 19 March 1945.

Considerable harassing fire, arty, mortar and some MG fire fell in the Regtl area throughout the period. Casualties were light.

Training continued, emphasizing assault boat training, Tk, TD and Inf training. Bn and Regtl tests were conducted on attack of village, supported by TDs and tks.

#### 20 March 1945.

The 2nd Bn of the 379th Inf Regt, 95th Inf Div, began relief of the Regt at 1630. Relief was completed at 1915. The Regt remained in same area preparatory to moving on following day to MEUSE RIVER, vic of ECHT, HOLLAND (6960).

#### 21 March 1945.

The Regt crossed IP (276928) at 0950, following the 331st IT. The move out of the assembly area was made under enemy arty fire. The 1st and

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2nd Bns suffered some casualties as a result. Six trucks were temporarily disabled.

The 323rd FA Bn and Co B 308th Med Bn were attached for the move.  
The Regtl CP opened at (761485), vic DIERGAARDE, HOLLAND, at 1220.  
Bns and Sep units closed into assembly area as follows:  
1st Bn - LINNE, HOLLAND (S7485) at 1420.  
2nd Bn - MAASBRACHT, HOLLAND (S7085) at 1345.  
3rd Bn - HINGEN, HOLLAND (S7180) at 1300.  
Cn Co - ST ODILIENBERG, HOLLAND (S7884) at 1235.  
AT Co - MONTFORT, HOLLAND (S7482) at 1210.  
Sv Co - WALDFEUCHT, GERMANY (S7775) at 1530.

Preparations were immediately begun for river crossing training to begin on the following day on MEUSE RIVER.

22 March 1945.- 27 March 1945.

Day and night training on river crossings continued through the period. Bn attack training with tks and TDs was conducted.

Two provisional truck Cos formed from the 228th FA Gp and the 957th FA Gp were attached to the Regt on 27 March, thus making the Regt completely motorized. This was done in anticipation of a fast-moving situation.

28 March 1945.

Regt, with Co B 308th Med Bn, 323rd FA Bn and Btry C 453rd AAA Bn attached, crossed IP (748955) at 1818 for assembly area vic of SCHIEFBAHN, GERMANY (S1694). Btry C 453rd AAA Bn was disbursed throughout the column for AA protection. The move was made without incident. The Regt plus attachments had closed into assembly area vic of SCHIEFBAHN, GERMANY at 2130. Regtl CP opened at SCHIEFBAHN (165945) at 1900.

29 March 1945.

Regtl CT crossed IP vic of NEERSEN, GERMANY (135946) at 1300, to cross the RHINE RIVER and move to assembly area vic of FRIEDSRICHFELD, GERMANY (273377).

Co B 643rd TD Bn (SP) and Co A 736th Tk Bn joined column at ST TONIS, GERMANY (S1303) and became attached to the Regtl

The guns of Btry C 453rd AAA Bn were disbursed throughout the column for AA protection.

The Regtl CP opened at (273377) at 1730. All elements of CT had closed into assembly by 2230.

30 March 1945.

One platoon of Co B 643rd TD Bn (SP) and one platoon Co A 746th Tk Bn were attached to each of Bns at 0800.

CT moved at 1930 to new assembly area between SYTHEN (645530) and SPRENGSTOFF (633550). Regtl CP opened at 1945 (632550). The CT had closed in assembly area at 310030.

Div still in process of staging up behind 2nd Armd Div.

Plat Y, Btry C 453rd AAA Bn attached to Regt at 1500. One quad was in turn attached to each Bn.

31 March 1945.

The 3rd Bn, supported by Cn Co, was given mission of taking over de-



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defense of bridge heads established across the DORTMUND-EMS CANAL by 2nd Arm'd Div W. of LUDINGHAUSEN. 3rd Bn moved out at 0430 behind I&R Flat reconnaissance. By 0800, relief was effected with I Co on both sides of canal between (780575) and (775530), K Co protecting two bridges at (785505) and (783520). L Co established defense around LUDINGHAUSEN (87952) and (88052). No contact with the enemy.

At 1100, the Regtl CT (- 3rd Bn) was alerted to move to new assembly area vic of SEPPENRADE (S-7651) and at 1300 CT crossed IP (645545). The CT closed into new assembly area at 1600 and were ordered to move immediately to vic of ASCHEBERG (920547). The 2nd Bn, lead element, began moving at 1605.

The 3rd Bn was ordered to leave one reinforced rifle Co guarding bridge-head until troops became available to relieve them. The CT (- K Co) closed into ASCHEBERG at 1950. Regtl CP in ASCHEBERG. Co B 643rd TD Bn (SP) and Co A 736th Tk Bn were relieved from attachment at 1350.

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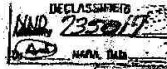

PHASE I - PURSUIT PHASE CONT'D

The fast moving phase continued with the Regt following closely behind the 2d Armd Div. The mission continued to be one of mopping up, establishing rd blocks and assuming responsibility for areas behind the advance of the 2d Armd Div.

There was practically no fighting involved in the operation, the 2d Armd Div having cleared all resistance in the 330th CT zone of advance. The most difficult phase of the operation was the controlling, feeding and administering to the thousands of displaced persons as well as establishing military government in the areas overrun, and guarding installations, warehouses, etc, to prevent looting by German civilians and displaced personnel.

1 April 1945

K Co rejoined 3d Bn at 0830 after having been relieved of mission of defending bridges over DORTMUND - EMS CANAL.

The 2d Bn was ordered to take over defense of AHLEN (1051), relieving elements of the 2d Armd Div. The I & R Platoon made rcn of rds between ASCHEBERG and AHLEN during night of March 31 - April 1 and found rds and area to be clear of enemy. The 2d Bn w/Cn Co atchd moved at 0530 for AHLEN and had completed relief of 2d Armd Div elms at 0715. One plat of 1t tks from Co D, 736 Tk Bn were atchd and joined Regt at 0630 and were in turn atchd to 2d Bn. The 83d Cav Rcn Trp was atchd to Regt at 0300 and was atchd to 2d Bn by Regt.

The Regt was prepared to pass through the 2d Armd Div and atk BECKUM (2150). However, 2d Armd Div succeeded in securing the town. At 0738, 1st Bn was ordered to move to BECKUM and relieve 2d Armd Div elms securing the town. 1st Bn closed into BECKUM at 1015.

The 3d Bn and 323d FA Bn were moved to assembly area in woods (165622) between AHLEN and BECKUM, so as to be readily available to assist either 1st or 2d Bns. Regtl Hq and special units moved to AHLEN, closing in at 1100.

Co B, 643d TD Bn (SP) was again atchd, joining Regt at 1300. One platoon TDs atchd by Regt to ea Bn. The 83d Cav Trp was relieved from atchment.

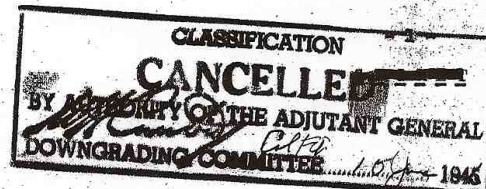
The Regt was again alerted for movement. Mission: To relieve elms of 2d Armd Div along LIPPE R in the vic LIPPSTADT. The 1st and 9th Armies having linked up at that point, it was believed the enemy would attempt to break out in this sector.

The Regtl CT moved at 1745 to assemble at WADERSLOH (353490) preparatory to relieving CG "B" and taking over rd blocks.

The Bns assembled W of WADERSLOH while commanders went forward to contact commanders of 2d Armd Div on river line.

The 3d Bn was given sector on LIPPE R from (293402) E to (410413) with 329th Inf on right and 1st Bn on left. 1st Bn sector from (410413) E along LIPPE R to (480457) where contact with 3d Armd Div (1st Army) was established. The 1st Bn had effected relief at 2400 and the 3d Bn at 020115. The 2d Bn was placed in reserve and assembled vic of LIESEBORN (363463). Because the 1st and 2d Bn front was extended, together with the possibility of a strong enemy counterattack in the Regtl sector, the Regtl Comdr ordered the 2d Bn to be prepared to move on short notice and to rcn routes to sectors of the 1st and 3d Bns to repel counterattacks.

The Regtl CP opened at WADERSLOH (352489) at 1920.



SECRET

2 April 1945

At 0915, Regt was ordered to push to the N bank of the LIPPE R, seize and secure any bridges in the sector still intact. This mission given in order to secure the bridges for a possible offensive to the S by our forces, and to forestall any attempt by the enemy to break out to the N.

Both the 3d and 1st Bns pushed to the river without opposition. The 1st Bn seized three bridges (4845), (466437) and (449430), as well as the bridges in LIPPSTADT, all intact. The 3d Bn secured bridge at (351400) that had been blown but still remained passable to foot troops. Fearing strong counterattack, the Engrs were ordered to prepare the bridges for demolition. This was done.

The 3d Bn made contact with the 329th Inf on the right and the 1st Bn established contact with the 3d Armd Div in LIPPSTADT.

G Co, reinforced, was atchd to a task force under command of Lt Col Ritchie and moved out at 1930 to ren pass at (850533) and secure it for future atks by 83d Inf Bn.

Five enemy tks, previously overrun, were destroyed in area to prevent their being employed by infiltrating enemy personnel.

Bns continued to apprehend enemy PSW attempting to escape the trap by crossing the LIPPE R.

An enemy Capt and Lt were killed when they attempted to escape a 1st Bn outpost during the night, when challenged.

The hundreds of displaced personnel presented difficult problems of feeding and housing. The Mil Govt detachment was ordered to set up Mil Govt in LIPPSTADT, establish order and get the estimated 5,000 DPs under control and safeguard food warehouses.

Co D, 736th Tk Bn, relieved from attachment.

3 April 1945

The mission of the Regt remained essentially the same: protect the right flank of the Div and Corps while the remainder of the Div advanced to the E. The Regt was ordered to relieve elements of the 329th Inf E of the 23-grid line. L Co, reserve Co, of the 3d Bn, was ordered to effect relief. Relief was completed at 1600.

The sector continued quiet with little enemy activity S of the LIPPE R.

Co B, 643d TD Bn (2P), was relieved from attachment.

4 April 1945

L Co was relieved in its sector by the Ren Trp of the 95th Inf Div at 032335, and assembled in its former area at 327430.

The 1st Bn established contact with the elms of 8th Armd Div in LIPPSTADT (4242) at 0030. The 1st Bn at that time was covered by elms of the 8th Armd Div atkg W, S of the LIPPE R. Because G2 rpts indicated that the 116th Pz Gr Div and one enemy inf div intended to atk N across the LIPPE R, the Regtl Comdr ordered the 1st Bn to assemble in rear of the 3d Bn whose sector extended about 15 kms along the N bank of the LIPPE R and was therefore lightly held. This was to deepen our position defensively.

The 1st Bn had completed withdrawal and had assembled vic of GR (358480) at 0555, behind the 3d Bn.

During the morning hours the Regt was engaged in perfecting the defense of the river line and at the same time preparing to move and join the Div in vic of DELBRUCK (5752).

- 2 -

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At 1100, the Regt was notified by Div that it would maintain defense along the LIPPE R until further notice and would not move. One platoon of Regtl AT guns was attached to 3d Bn. More rd blocks were established and rcn was conducted by 1st and 2d Bns to occupy a Regtl Reserve Line in case of enemy c/atk. The sector remained quiet throughout the period.

The I & R Plat maintained motor patrols beginning at 1200 to the S of LIPPSTADT along LIPPE R to the left flank of Regt.

The 3d Bn sent patrols across LIPPE R in sector.

The 1st Bn was ordered to send one Co back into LIPPSTADT to control displaced persons who were getting out of control. LIPPSTADT was made a collecting point for DP's; Regtl Comdr ordered that all DP's in Regtl sector be sent there. Mil Govt was arranging for feeding and housing.

#### 5 April 1945

The sector remained quiet with no contact with enemy forces. The Corps Comdr informed Regtl Comdr that the Regt would remain in this sector from 24 to 48 hours until the situation to the S of the LIPPE R cleared up; still danger of strong enemy c/atk from that sector. The Regt passed to Corps control at 1330.

In order to strengthen our defense along the river line, the 1st Bn was given the left of the sector from 351405 E to CAPPEL (393430). The sector was occupied by A Co, reinforced. B and C Cos remained in Bn reserve. The 3d Bn occupied its sector from 351405 W to HERZFELD (279404), with I Co, reinforced. K and L Cos remained in Bn reserve. D Co remained in LIPPSTADT guarding captured warehouses and factories and maintaining order. Displaced persons barriers were established and a camp established to house them. Regtl Surgeon supervised the medical treatment and inmates of the camp were dusted with DDT Powder. Serv Co engaged in trucking personnel to the camp and hauling food and water to them.

I & R Plat patrolled along W bdry of the Regt.

Plat Y, 453d AAA Bn, released from attachment.

#### 6 April 1945

No change.

#### 7 April 1945

The threat of c/atk by the enemy S of the LIPPE R having been relieved by the advance of the 8th Arm Div to the W and the 95th Inf Div to the S, which covered the Regt, the Regt was relieved of its defensive mission along the N bank of the LIPPE R. At 1200, the Regt reverted to control of the 83d Inf Div. At 1335, Regt crossed IP at CAPPEL (395429) to move to assembly area E of WESER R vic of HEVEN (G2180). GT had closed in at 2030. A temporary CP was established in HALLE (255785) but was later moved to ESCHERSHAUSEN (314714).

G Co reverted to Regtl control at 2300.

C Co, 736 Th Bn, attached to Regt upon Regts arrival in assembly area.

#### 8 April 1945

The Regt was initially given mission of attacking E in right zone of Div and securing bridgehead on E bank of the LEINE R in sector, follow closely behind the 113th Cav, pass through and eliminate resistance the Cav was unable to overcome.

The 331st Inf on the W bank of the WESER R was held up by stubborn resistance from the vic of HOKTER (1455) and HOLZMINDEN (1860) and therefore the Regt was ordered to atk and seize HOLZMINDEN and relieve pressure on the 331st Inf and allow it to advance.

- 3 -

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The Regtl Comdr therefore assigned the mission of securing HOLZMINDEN to the 2d Bn which was in the best position to launch the atk. The 1st Bn, reserve Bn in former plan, was given the left sector and the 3d Bn was given the right Regtl sector, atkg in original direction to E.

All three Bns moved from assembly areas in the early hours of the 8th. The 1st and 2d Bns met stubborn resistance while the 3d Bn moved rapidly in zone against light resistance. The 2d Bn was held up by enemy strong pt at 280680. F Co contained it while E and G Cos advanced and took strong pt of NEGENBORN (263673). The strong pt holding up F Co was reduced by bombing mission in the afternoon. In the meantime, the 1st Bn had taken STADTOLDENDORF (3066) after having knocked out two Mark IV tks, one by bazooka fire and one by 57mm AT gun. The 1st Bn had secured the city by 1120 and the Cav moved to the SE to establish blocks on the right of 1st Bn to protect their flank as they swung to the E. Progress of the Cav was slow and delayed the 1st Bn. The Regtl Comdr ordered one Co of 1st Bn held in STADTOLDENDORF to be committed only on his order. Reason: A force to be used to aid either 1st or 2d Bns should the situation warrant. Request for TD's was made because of enemy tks in zone but initially refused because they were all employed elsewhere.

While the 3d Bn continued to advance rapidly to the E, the 2d Bn was meeting stubborn resistance in a pass between two high wooded hills vic of 250664. Dug-in inf using Panzerfausts and supported by MG's made progress slow. The pocket was finally eliminated by flanking movement with tks and inf. The 331st Inf, in the meantime, had crossed the WESER R at POLLE and started atkg S to reduce resistance in HOLZMINDEN, therefore the 25 N-S grid line was established as a bdry beyond which 330th would not advance. The 2d Bn after taking GOLMBACH (S2468) that a captured enemy order indicated was a strong point, established blocks to the E awaiting contact with 331st Inf.

The advance of the 3d Bn having met only light resistance, the Regtl Comdr ordered I Co to continue in 3d Bn zone and secure bridgehead over LEINE R at GREENE (521645) and L and K Cos were directed to seize pass through hills at 466714 and cross LEINE R on a bridge in the zone of 329th Inf and secure the left part of the Regtl objective. By 1900, I Co had secured the bridge at GREENE intact after overcoming light resistance W of the town that had held up the Cav. L and K Cos secured the pass (466714) and at 1900, L Co had occupied DANKELSHHEIM and was on the Regtl Objective. Twelve 105mm Howitzers and thirty-two 6-inch artillery pieces were captured intact by K and L Cos. A Co occupied WANGELNSTEDT (348653) and B Co LUTHORST (370629). C Co (- 1 plat), 643d TD Bn (SP), atchd and joined at 1900. One platoon immediately atchd to 1st Bn.

9 April 1945

The operation on the 9th consisted mainly of bringing the Regt forward to secure and consolidate Regtl Objective. The 2d Bn made contact with 331st Inf at 0200 and at 1020, the 2d Bn was relieved by the 331st Inf and began moving forward to take up positions at GREENE, guarding bridges over LEINE R, and protecting right flank of Corps.

The 1st Bn advanced against light resistance. In order to speed the movement of the 1st Bn, artillery trucks were used to move the rear troops forward.

At the close of the period the 2d Bn had relieved 3d Bn elms protecting bridges. The Regt held line generally 542720-605655-540628 with 3d Bn on the left and 1st Bn on the right. B Co continued on behind Cav and by 2000 together with one troop of Cav had occupied SEESSEN (6768), rcn to E and SE and established rd blocks.

Regtl CP opened in NAENSEN (486670) at 1550.

Total Pw taken 1 thru 9 April: 1249 (This figure does not include those taken in overrun Army hospitals).



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The mission of all three Bns remained the same. The 1st Bn pushed steadily ahead throughout the day against moderate resistance but was slowed down by wooded terrain and steep hills that favored the defense and made maneuver difficult and time-consuming. The advance was characterized by fighting for, and removing rd blocks. WILDEMAN (87561) was cleared by A and C Cos at 1400 and B Co had secured HOHNENKEL (795655) by 1900.

The 3d Bn established blocks S of LANGELSHEIM and the 801st TD Bn established rd blocks vic of WILDEMAN. Thus the sector of the Regt W of the 78 grid line had been cleared of all organized resistance. Small groups still held out in the mts but the Regt had neither the time nor the troops to hunt down these isolated groups of the enemy.

The 2d Bn began its atk with G Co pushing S from OKER (890700) and E Co atkg S on rd from BAD HARZBURG (945670). The resistance in this sector was considerably stiffer and the progress of both E and G Co was slow. Both E and G Cos advanced along ridges to flank rds, enemy fire from the flanks made rds untenable.

F Co who had been held in reserve in OKER was committed early in the afternoon to follow G Co and mop up along the route taken by G Co and clear rd blocks to enable vehicles to get forward. At 1900, F Co was involved in a s/a fight with elms that had infiltrated behind G Co. G Co was at 885670 receiving fire from front and flanks. E Co was rptd by the Bn Comdr to be in difficulty at 942657 just short of RJ at 937653; they were getting fire from front and flanks and enemy groups were working around to the rear. He had ordered one platoon of F Co mounted on TDs to come to the assistance of E Co. The Regtl Comdr ordered L Co atchd to 2d Bn and to move from WOLFSHAGEN (777713) to OKER to assist 2d Bn if the situation became more critical. L Co was used to block to W and S of OKER but was not otherwise employed.

I Co was moved to GOSLAR where it maintained blocks and patrolled to S. K Co was moved to ILSENBERG (026673) where it relieved TF Biddle and blocked to the S.

Kms of the 116th Pz Div were identified by the 1st Bn, two half-tracks and one Mark IV tk were destroyed in the 1st Bn sector. Hitler Jugend were encountered by all three Bns.

Regtl CP closed in SEESSEN (686685). Opened in GOSLAR at 1300.

Co C, 643d TD Bn (SP) and C trp, 113th Cav Sqdn released from attachment.

#### 12 April 1945

A and C Cos were engaged throughout the night 11-12 April with enemy vic of RJ (803641). B Co who had taken BOCKWEISE (791643) joined A and C Cos vic of (800640). The 1st Bn began atk to clear rd from RJ (805640) to meet I Co who was securing rd blocks on southern outskirts of GOSLAR (840697). B Co led the atk, followed in column by A and C Cos. Progress was slow initially. Dug-in inf was encountered at 804643, and after that strong pt was reduced progress was fairly rapid. At 1610, BCo made contact with I Co outpost at outskirts of GOSLAR (842698). The 1st Bn was ordered to assemble in same vic.

The 2d Bn began mission of clearing the area roughly S along 89 grid line to the 66 grid line then E to the 95 grid line then N to BAD HARZBURG. E Company maintained rd blocks (940657) with two plats and one sec of tks while a combat patrol of one plat cleared the area to the E and N. F and G Cos swept E from present positions clearing woods and mts. At 1900, G Co had linked up with F Co at 910678. G Co remained at this point, establishing blocks and outposts, while F Co continued to clear woods N towards BAD HARZBURG. L Co took over rd blocks established at 885697 when G Co moved to the E.

I Co maintained rd blocks in GOSLAR until 1800, when I Co was relieved by B Co. I Co moved at 1830 to WERNIGERODE (1064) to relieve 113th Cav on rd blocks in that city. K Co maintained rd blocks in ILSENBERG (0267) and ALTENRODE (0655).

A Co / 1 plat of tks was sent to VECKENSTEDT at close of period, on order of Div, to be available to assist TF Biddle in repelling an expected c/atk on the S flank of the Div, E of the Regtl sector.



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PHASE II - OPERATIONS IN HARZ MOUNTAINS

The operation of Regt from 10 April - 20 April 1945 consisted of clearing the enemy from the HARZ MOUNTAINS in the zone of the 83d Inf Div.

The HARZ MOUNTAINS are a heavily wooded range rising out of the N German plain. The rise of the mts is abrupt. In 12 kms, the elevation rises from 200 meters on the plain to 1142 meters on the highest peak. All but highest peaks are covered with a dense growth of trees principally of the evergreen variety. The rd net through the mts is excellent but due to the growth of trees along the rds, and the great number of bridges over small streams the rds were easy to block. Cross country travel by vehicle, either tracked or wheeled was impossible.

The plan set up for this operation was for 1st Bn to move from W to E through the mts while the two remaining Bns following in zone of the 329th Inf on the left (N), which was open and comparatively flat. These Bns would then atk S, block and patrol and thus a small segment at a time would be cleared. The 801st TD Bn (T) (-) was to follow closely the lead elms and establish blocks to the S and E on main rds after being cleared by inf, and prevent enemy from re-entering cleared areas or using rds for vehicles and thus release inf to move E to clear another sector. To assist the Regt in this operation, the 801st TD Bn (T) (- C Co), C Trp 113th Cav Sq, C Co 643d TD Bn (SP), and Co B plus 1 plat Co D and 2d AG Plat 736th Tk Bn were atchd. Co B, 308th Engr Bn, in direct support.

10 April 1945

The plan of atk for 10 April was for the 2d Bn to relieve B Co in SEESSEN. B Co would then atk E towards LAUTENTHAL (7566); A and C Cos to seize MUNCHEHOF (6864), then atk E through mts and take WILDEMANN; the 3d Bn to move in the zone of the 329th Inf to LANGELSHEIM, from there to atk S.

S2 and G2 information indicated strong enemy forces were moving E on our R flank. The 2d Bn was therefore ordered to remain in the vic of GREENE and KREIENSEN (538635), and protect bridge at 535643 and block to the S.

The 3d Bn was moved to SEESSEN to relieve B Co. B Co moved out at 1300 to follow close behind a plat of C Trp, 113th Cav. B Co moved slowly through the woods against Panzerfaust, A/W and S/A fire. At 1700, B Co had taken a rd block at 716672 and foot elms pushed on to 725 674 while Regtl Mine Plat began blowing block to allow Cav vehicles through.

A and C Cos moved up to MUNCHEHOF (6864) behind the Cav but came under MG fire W of the town. A Co atkd town but met hvy resistance from inf supported by four tks. C Co was sent to flank town from N and cut off tks but ran into fire from HERRHAUSEN (652661). C Co cleared the town at 1600, advanced E to woods then S to join A Co.

In the meantime, the 2d Bn (- F Co) had been moved to reserve positions vic HERRHAUSEN (6264) and ILDEHAUSEN (652642). F Co remained behind protecting bridge. Movement of the 2d Bn (- F Co) was screened by I & R Plat who had previously scouted ILDEHAUSEN and engaged in a firefight with a small group of enemy tps. Later elms of the 801st TD Bn relieved F Co and F Co was moved to SEESSEN where it relieved I Co on rd blocks and guard on captured warehouses, trains and hospitals. The 3d Bn moved to LANGELSHEIM (7974) and at 2000 began atk S on the two main rds S of LANGELSHEIM. L Co had occupied WOLFSHAGEN (6971) at 2130. K Co established blocks S of LANGELSHEIM and sent patrol to contact B Co atkg LAUTENTHAL from the E.

B Co continued atk throughout night to take LAUTENTHAL.

Regtl CP opened in GANDERSHEIM (577662) at 1030. Closed at 1830 and opened at SEESSEN at 1830.

11 April 1945

The 2d Bn was ordered to move to assembly area vic of OKER (8870) and from there atk S. G Co was given mission of atkg S from OKER and F Co to atk S from BAD HARZBURG (945670). Regtl Hq Co took over the task of guarding installations in SEESSEN and the 801st TD Bn established blocks to the N, E, NE and SE of the town. F Co joined the 2d Bn in OKER.



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The 801st TD Bn (T) continued to establish and man rd blocks behind the advance of the three Bns on key rds and junctions. PsW were taken and casualties inflicted on enemy by 801st TD Bn as small groups attempted to pass through blocks to the N and W.

The advance of the Bns was opposed by miscellaneous units, principal resistance came from fanatical groups of Hitler Jugend. The enemy employed rd blocks of fallen trees extensively to impede our advance.

At the close of the period the sector W of the 85 grid line had been cleared and blocked, and the sector N of the 67 grid line to the 95 grid line had been swept and blocked.

#### 13 April 1945

All three Bns were engaged in blocking and sweeping areas along Northern edge of mts. The only resistance of any extent was encountered in the sectors of E and I Cos. E Co repulsed three small c/ats at rd blocks vic 937651. Several enemy were killed after which bulk of atkg force surrendered. Arty fire was received, for the first time since RHINE crossing, in E Co sector.

I Co was atkd from flank by small on group armed with machine pistols and panzerfausts. Two jeeps were lost in the engagement.

I Co was released from attachment to 2d Bn and moved to WERNIGERODE (1063), rejoining 3d Bn.

As a result of the days operation, the area N of a line between 825686-957655 was cleared of enemy trps and blocks were established to prevent enemy from reoccupying the ground.

#### 14 April 1945

The Regtl Comdr called Bn Comdrs to meeting at the Regtl GP at 2300 on 13 April to issue order for completion of mission of clearing HARZ MTS from W to E in XIX Corps zone.

The plan: The 2d Bn to advance S from rd blocks vic of OKER then E along E-W rds vic 880626 and take objective along N-S line, 973628-973608, establish blocks on right flank, and act as contact pt with 1st Inf Div. The 1st Bn advance S from blocks S of BAD HARZBURG then E to take objective on line 976647-972628. The 3d Bn to atk S from blocks at ILSENBURG (025670) and secure E-W line (977655-021637) and at the same time maintain blocks to S of ALTENRODE (066657) and WERNIGERODE (1064).

#### Reasons for plan:

- (1) The 2d Bn, by moving E along S bdry of Corps, could establish and maintain contact with 1st Inf Div who was coming up to our right.
- (2) By this plan all of the zone to the S bdry could be cleared and at the same time the enemy would be compressed into a smaller area and thus the task of cleaning them out would be less difficult.
- (3) The E-W rd net in this area was considerably better allowing advance to the E, where before only trails to the S existed.

A Co rejoined the 1st Bn at 0715 and relieved E Co on rd blocks at 038655. E Co joined 2d Bn at OKER (890704). B Co with one plat of tks, remained at SCHMELWECKE (925705) in Regtl Reserve.

All three Bns began process of sweeping to S in zone. 1st and 2d Bns encountered hvy s/a fire and very accurate sniper fire. Rd blocks of fallen trees extending every few feet over a stretch of rd for 200 yds were removed by the engineers supporting the 2d Bn. All advances were made with strong patrols covering each flank, small groups of enemy attempted to circle our leading elms and atk from the flanks. All bridges in zone of advance had been destroyed.

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At the close of the period, K Co was on 3d Bn objective while I and L Cos maintained blocks to the E. The 2d and 1st Bns were on line (879632-921629), however, the area between the 1st and 2d Bns had not been completely cleared.

The 801st TD Bn (T) continued to follow closely behind Bns establishing blocks.

Regtl CP opened in BAD HARZBURG (947683) at 1000.

15 April 1945

Progress during the day was rapid, considering the terrain, the opposition was generally much lighter. At 1100, A and G Cos made contact with E Co, 26th Inf, 1st Inf Div at RJ (924609) and the 2d Bn contacted elms of the 26th Inf at 874640 at 1340.

The 2d Bn swung to the E at RJ (874640) sending a strong patrol to the SW where the 26th Inf was contacted. At 1900, the 2d Bn had reached 951625.

B Co was returned to Bn control at 1330. The 1st Bn established rd blocks at 924610 and sent patrols to contact the 2d Bn coming up from the NW. The 1st Bn then swept N to 938653 then E. At nightfall, the 1st Bn forward elms were at 980624.

The 2d Bn moved rapidly to the SE and at nightfall leading elms were at 950625.

The 3d Bn maintained rd blocks and continued to clear area between strong pts with combat patrols.

With the 1st and 2d Bns generally abreast, the 3d Bn blocking all exits to the NW, and the 1st Inf Div abreast on our right, the pocket was slowly being compressed with little chance of organized trps escaping the trap in our sector.

16 April 1945

The 1st and 2d Bns renewed atk to the E at 0630. Both Bns made good progress during morning against light resistance. Small pockets were effective in slowing down advance at times because of difficulty of maneuver.

Orders were received at 1200 that one reinforced Bn would be atchd to the 329th Inf as soon as it could be made available. The Regtl Comdr had planned his atk so that the 2d Bn would be pinched out by the 1st Bn when the 2d Bn had taken its objective generally along the 98 N-S grid line. He had estimated that the 2d Bn would take this objective on the following day. With the taking of the objective along the 98 N-S grid line the 1st Bn would continue on to the E; the 2d Bn would be assembled vic of ILSENBURG (0267) where it was to be reorganized and rested preparatory to being employed in the final phase of the operation against BLANKENBURG (2159).

The sudden demand for one Bn upset this plan. The 2d could not be withdrawn without leaving a wide open right(S) flank. The 2d Bn was therefore ordered to side slip to the N and assume the sector of the 1st Bn. The 1st Bn was ordered to assemble vic of ILSENBURG. Some delay was caused because B Co was engaged in a fire fight vic 000615 and had to break contact.

The 1st Bn (/ 1 plat Co B, 736 Tk Bn and Co B, 308 Engr(-1 plat) had assembled at 1645 and were awaiting transportation to arrive from Div.

The 2d Bn continued to make good progress but constantly encountered small groups of enemy riflemen who fought stubborn delaying action. At one point the enemy had begun to construct a rd block in rear of ground cleared by the 1st Bn before the 2d Bn was able to put forces in to take over 1st Bn positions. The terrain, plus our limited forces, made it possible for small enemy groups to infiltrate behind our lines and harass our supply lines.

The 3d Bn maintained positions along the left (N) flank and continued to patrol between strong pts.



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The 801st TD Bn (T), while putting in a rd block at RJ (964600), was atkd. Eight enemy were killed and eighteen PSW taken. The Mine Plat of AT Co was sent to reinforce this block.

At close of period, E Cos leading elms were at 000616 with F Co to right rear and G Co to the left rear.

Regtl CP displaced to ILSENBURG (0367).

#### 17 April 1945

Steady progress was made throughout the day by 2d and 3d Bns. Opposition continued to be small groups of enemy inf supported by a/w defending rd blocks and defiles. The enemy continued to infiltrate in small groups to the rear of our lines attempting to escape or ambush small parties on our supply and communication lines.

The 2d Bn swept area for 3500 m clearing the general area included in grid squares 0060-0062 then E to include 0360-030615. At 1140, 15 rds of 105mm arty fell in E Cos zone. The 2d Bn continued to receive arty, over 200 rds falling in their area, throughout the day. The guns were firing from 1st Inf Div zone, on our right. 1st Inf Div arty fired c/btry fire for us. E Co remained at contact pt (013600), waiting for elms of 1st Inf Div to establish contact while F and G Cos pushed to the E. At 2030, E Cos kitchen truck was ambushed on rd 500 yds to NE of their position. The vehicles were recovered.

K Co assembled vic of RJ (023634) after outposts and blocks had been uncovered by the 2d Bn. L Co pushed to the SE followed by K Co. I Co maintained blocks to the E.

K Co maintained contact with the 2d Bn initially by patrol. At 1930, K Co was abreast of F Co at 038614 and L Co was at 045615.

The rd block (965600) of A Co, 801st TD Bn (T), supported by AT Co Mine Plat, continued to be atkd by small enemy groups. This block was contacted by 1st Inf Div elms at 1813.

#### 18 April 1945

The operation on the 18th saw the 3d Bn pushing to the SE and the 2d Bn to the E. The atk followed the same general pattern. Rd blocks and strong pts were established at key pts and the areas between swept with strong combat patrols. As our advance continued to the E the sector became narrower and once more the Regtl Comdr made plans to relieve the 2d Bn to reorganize and rest in preparation for atk on BLANKENBURG (2259), the last remaining key pt in our sector of the HARZ MTS.

The 801st TD Bn (T) was ordered to relieve the 2d Bn on its blocks and one Co of 2d Bn was ordered to relieve the 3d Bn on blocks and contact point with 1st Inf Div (070589) when established and also to establish block at RJ (052586) after which the 2d Bn (-1 Co) would assemble vic of WERNIGERODE while the 3d Bn pushed to the E.

Both Bns atkd to carry out above plan. Resistance appeared to be better organized. An enemy demolition squad supported by inf established rd blocks and blew bridges just ahead of the 2d Bns advance throughout the day.

Elms of the 801st TD Bn (T) relieved E Co at blocks (094616) and (013598). E Co advanced to GR (038604) and established defense for the night. F and G Cos, at nightfall, were on line (046595-046593) and were engaged with two SP guns.

The 3d Bn encountered light resistance. K Co advanced cross country from 047617 to 060609 then S along rds to 050600 and 066604. L Co, at close of period, was at 087601.

#### 19 April 1945

The atk continued according to plan. K Co established blocks at 056596 and 071583 during the afternoon and G Co relieved K Co on blocks at 1830. L Co advanced

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to the SE to N edge of lake (100590) where they became involved in fairly hvy s/a fight with enemy inf and vehicles. A half-track and one truck were destroyed and hvy casualties inflicted on enemy forces; three half-tracks, one truck and four 20mm AA Guns were captured. L Co held positions at that point, maintaining strong combat patrols to S and E throughout the afternoon. K Co was ordered by Bn Comdr to swing S and E and come up along the W side of the lake, cut the only open rd leading away from the lake and thus pin the strong enemy forces in the sector between L on the N, K on the S and the lake to the E.

K Co moved rapidly and by 2050 had made contact with the rear of the enemy forces (089580) that had been engaged by L Co. Finding themselves surrounded, the enemy showed little inclination to fight. The remainder of night, K and L Cos spent round up prisoners. 3d Bn took more than 500 PsW during the day and night and captured about 60 vehicles of all types.

I Co pushed steadily to the E throughout the day and at the close of the period had taken key RJ at 11236110.

The 2d Bn (-G Co) moved to assembly area vic 110633, closing at 1840.

In the afternoon word was received at Regtl Hq indicating the Regt would be relieved on the following day by the 8th Armd Div. At 1930, the order was received for the relief of the Regt by GCA, 8th Armd Div. Bn Comdrs met with Comdrs at 2200 to plan the relief.

During the Regts operations in the HAZ MTS, an area was cleared extending 47 kms in length, 15 kms through two-thirds of the way, then narrowing to 5 kms at the Eastern end. In the ten-day period, 2,516 PsW (not including hospital patients) from many units, were taken. Included in these units were the 26 VG Div, 116th Pz Div, the 1053 and 1054 Regts of Potsdam Div, Hitler Jugend organizations, Volkstrum, training units and Werewolves.

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PHASE III - DEFENSE OF ELBE RIVER BRIDGEHEAD

20 April 1945

The Regt (-1st Bn) was completely relieved by GCA, 8th Armd Div, by 1200. The 801st TD Bn (T), was released from attachment upon its relief by elms of GCA. By 1300, the 2d and 3d Bns were assembled vic WERNIGERODE and trucks for motor move to Div bridgehead had arrived. Regt (-1st Bn) crossed IP at WERNIGERODE at 1400 and had closed into assembly areas in rear of the 320th Inf (35th Inf Div) E of the ELBE R by 1915. Bn and Co Comdrs made con and contacted Comdrs of 320th Inf preparatory to relieving 320th Inf at first light, 21 April 1945.

Regtl CP opened at 886824, vicinity of WALTERNIENBURG, Germany, at 1545.

21 April 1945

Relief of the 320th Inf was begun at first light and the Regt (-1st Bn) assumed responsibility for the sector at 1200. The relief was made without reaction from the enemy and enemy activity remained light throughout the period.

2d Bn sector: MLR extended from ELBE (858860) E to bdry with 3d Bn (882871).

3d Bn sector: MLR extended NE from 882871 to GEHRDEN (899874) then SE to 919857 where contact with the 329th Inf was established.

The 1st Bn remained under Div control.

Remainder of the day was spent in reorganizing and digging in.

Co B, 643d TD Bn, was attached.

22 - 30 April 1945

The sector remained generally quiet throughout this period. Patrols were sent nightly to N and NE. No indication of enemy reinforcements was discovered, in fact, it appeared the enemy was withdrawing forces from their positions to our front. We continued to improve our defenses and additional AT and AP mines and tactical wire was laid.

On the nite of 26 April, K Co was contacted by a Captain of the German Army sent to arrange details for the surrender of a Regiment. The Captain accomplished his mission with the result CT JANUMS (15 Latvian SS Div) commanded by Col Janums, with a strength of 41 officers and 856 EM were marched to our PW cage. This Regt had marched from the vic of BERLIN to surrender to American forces.

The 1st Bn (-B Co) reverted to Regtl control on 28 April at 1200. B Co was atchd to TF Hawkins and remained under Div control. The 1st Bn (-B Co) occupied positions vic of GUTTERGLUCK (924857) at 2000, vacated by the 3d Bn 329th Inf. The 1st Bn (-B Co) was relieved by 3d Bn 329th Inf on 29 April and reverted to Regtl Reserve.

The Regt was assigned to a zone of responsibility in the Div rear area for purpose of collecting, feeding and housing displaced personnel as well as maintaining order.

On 28 April, Col Montague, Regtl S4 and Regtl S1 set up headquarters in STASSFURT (6568) for this purpose. On 30 April, the 1st Bn (-B, C and D Cos) moved to STASSFURT to assist in administration and policing the area.

B Co remained atchd to TF Hawkins; C Co with 1 plat tks atchd, in Regtl Reserve. One MG Plat, D Co, was atchd to 3d Bn and D Co (-1 plat) was atchd to the 2d Bn.

Co B (-1 Plat), 736 Tk Bn, released from attachment to Regt.

1372 PsW were taken during period 20 - 30 April 1945.

## I. BATTLE LESSONS

1. "You cannot expect to find battery positions for a whole battery in the mountains at all times, therefore guns must be strung out along the route of advance thereby avoiding the waste of a lot of valuable time trying to get the battery in one spot." CO, Cn Co, 330th Inf.
2. "At intervals throughout the operation, we found it effective to fire one volley of artillery approximately 500 yards ahead of the point, to flush out small groups of enemy with panzerfausts along the road." CO, 323d FA Bn.
3. "Even though the enemy defended along the road, our best progress was made when we attacked either to the right or left of the road, coming back down to the road periodically." S3, 330th Inf.
4. "We monitor our Artillery Air OP with an SCR 610, through arrangement with our Artillery Battalion Commander. The set at the Air OP is also used at times as a relay. This worked particularly well in the Harz Mountain area where the mountainous and thickly wooded terrain cut the range of our radios considerably. Since our frontage and depth was extended, this enabled us to get radio messages relayed through. Due to the fluid nature of this particular operation, establishing a ground relay station was out of the question." ComO, 330th Inf.

## II. COMMENTS ON MOUNTAIN FIGHTING by Battalion Commanders and Staffs.

"Engineers must be aggressive and follow lead elements of the Infantry closely to take out road blocks so that tanks can be brought forward and not have the column strung out way to the rear."

"We generally attack with one company on the road and a company on each side, lead company puts out only flank security, that way the lead company doesn't have to worry about control of flanks and concentrate on what is straight ahead. This plan makes it easy to switch companies, too, because rotation is necessary as they tire fast in this kind of country. We found most of the fighting was done by the point."

"Columns must be carefully made up before going into attack because roads were narrow and it is impossible to turn around and run up and down the columns."

"There is not much you can do at night, plan ahead so last hour can be used to move into position, check security and let men get familiar with terrain and location of men on right and left."

"Artillery targets must be anticipated far in advance when fighting in mountains and woods because when we did run into Jerry we were too close to call for artillery fire. The 60mm and 81mm mortars pay off though and we used them to good advantage throughout the whole operation, keeping them well forward."

"You cannot wait till night to resupply troops and tanks, too much possibility of ambush. The tanks would bring supply trucks forward and gas them while they were waiting for road blocks to be cleared."

"We used AT platoon of battalion and attached regimental platoon to protect our rear and critical road junctions as we moved ahead. With two platoons they would leap frog forward and our rear was always secure."

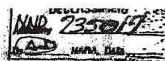

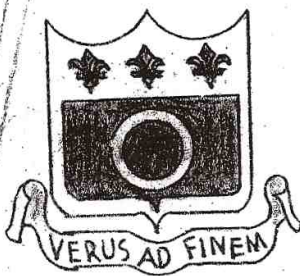

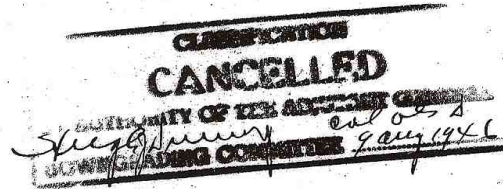

I. NARRATIVE OF ACTION

HEADQUARTERS 330TH INFANTRY  
APO 83 U S ARMY

1 May 1945 thru 4 May 1945

Disposition at beginning of period:

1st Bn (- B, G and D Cos) at STASSFURT (6569), Germany, occupying and governing the Regtl Sector of the Div Rear Area. B Co attached to TF Hawkins in Div Reserve. C Co, with 1 platoon 736th Tk Bn attached, in Regtl Reserve at FLOTZ (8784).

2d Bn, with Co D (- 1 MG Platoon) attached, occupying left sector of Regtl Area. CP at FLOTZ (8784).

3d Bn, with 1 MG Platoon Co D attached, occupying right Regtl Sector. CP at FLOTZ (8784).

Regtl CP at WALTERNLENBURG (8882), Germany.

Co B, 643d TD Bn (SP)  
1 Plat Co B, 736th Tk Bn

The Regt maintained defensive positions on the ELBE River Bridgehead (1 May 1945 thru 5 May 1945). Enemy activity to our front had practically ceased. We continued to patrol vigorously to our front both day and night. POW from many units, whose principal mission seemed to be to surrender to American forces, were taken.

A patrol from the I and R Platoon made contact with Russian forces at HORECK (951651) on 4 May 1945.

D Co was released to Bn control on 1 May 1945 and joined the 1st Bn in STASSFURT.

5 May 1945

The Russian forces began movement toward the ELBE River to assume control of the bridgehead occupied by the Div. The Regt (- F and I Cos) moved from the bridgehead area at 1200 to assemble in vic of STASSFURT. F and I Cos, under command of Major Allen, with orders to be out of Elbe Bridgehead by 060730 May 1945, remained on Regtl Sector E of ELBE as shell awaiting the Russians. Co B, 736th Tk Bn and Co B, 643d TD Bn (SP), were attached for movement. B Co reverted to Regtl control and B and C Cos reverted to 1st Bn control on arrival in assembly area. All elements of the Regt, except F and I Cos, had closed into assembly areas by 1945. Regtl CP at LEOPOLDSHAAL (660679).

6 May 1945

F and I Cos on Div order assembled and moved to rejoin Regt, closing in at 0900. The Regt crossed IP in STASSFURT at 1130 to relieve elements of the 2d Armd Div of Military Government and occupation mission in an area bounded on the E by the 00 grid line; on the N by the 96 grid line; on the S by a line just N of the Harz Mts, excluding the towns of BAD HARZBURG (9468) and LANGELSHEIM (7874) and on the W by (8596), (8689), (775875) and (7477). Fifty trucks from the 2d Armd Div were made available for the move.

By 1800, all elements of the 2d Armd Div in the area had been relieved.

The Regtl CP opened at HORNBERG (968854); Bn and Sep Unit CPs as follows: 1st Bn at GIELDE (893860); 2d Bn at VIENENBURG (9476); 3d Bn at WEDDINGEN (891787); Cn Co at KISSENBRUCK (957940); AT Co at ACHIM (971888) and Sv Co at 931776 (See Sketch No 1).

The mission of the Regt became one of occupation and military government. Each Bn and Sep Unit was assigned areas of responsibility and these areas were in turn broken down to company and platoon areas in order to occupy villages within the area and to guard installations.

7 May 1945

No change.

8 May 1945

The Regt was assigned a new administrative area by Div and the 736th Tk Bn was attached to the Regiment to assist in this mission. This area was occupied by elements of the 2d Armd Div. The area was broken down to Bn and Sep Co areas and each unit moved independently into new area upon completion of reconnaissance. The 2d Armd Div had been relieved by 1800 in all the area except that of the 1st Bn which contained the Herman Goering Works, and the concentration area for shipping Western DP's and PWs Westward.

The Regtl Area included generally the two Landkreises of Goslar and Salzgitter both of which were a part of the province of Braunschweig.

The Regtl CP opened at Salzgitter (8086), Germany. Bn and Sep Cos as follows: 1st Bn at IMMENDORF (8497); 2d Bn at VIENENBURG (9476); 3d Bn at LEINE (8584); Sv Co at GR MAHNER (8387); AT Co at LOBMACHERSEN (8492); Cn Co at HEINENGEN (9389); 736th Tk Bn at LICHTENBERG (7495) and Co B, 308 Med Bn, at GITTER (7985). (See Sketch No 2).

9 May 1945 thru 31 May 1945

Throughout the remainder of the period, minor changes and adjustments in the Regtl Area were made. Because the German system of government operated, and was controlled, within certain provincial boundaries, the tactical boundaries between units was made to conform with the German provincial boundaries.

The 2d Bn assumed responsibility for the SW section of the Landkreis of Goslar on 10 May 1945 and the Bn CP opened at BAD HARZBURG (9468), the center of the area, on 11 May 1945. On 13 May 1945, the 83d Div Special Troops took over the control of BAD HARZBURG and on 16 May 1945, the Special Troops assumed responsibility for all the Stadtkreis containing BAD HARZBURG. The 2d Bn (- F and G Cos) assumed responsibility for the Northern area (see Sketch No 3) while F and G Cos remained in the same sector. The Bn CP opened at SEBHARDSHAGEN (796932) on 19 May 1945.

The 736th Tk Bn was released from attachment on 17 May 1945 and was attached to the 329th Inf because the greater part of its area fell within the provincial boundaries controlled by the 329th Inf.

The 19th AAA Bn occupied the SE corner of the Landkreis of Goslar, which fell within the provincial boundaries controlled by the Regt, and was attached for military government purposes on 16 May 1945 (see Sketch map for dispositions).

The Bns and Sep Units maintained security guards and civilian barrier points. In addition, intelligence targets were guarded and the area screened for additional targets. Key installations, such as food and supply warehouses, were protected. Where possible, intelligence targets were consolidated or eliminated to lessen the burden of maintaining guards.

Civilian government agencies were screened to eliminate undesirable personnel and where possible the administration of local government was turned over to civilian officials. All possible effort was made to get industry and agriculture functioning normally on a peace time scale.

Lt Col Montague was designated as the Regtl MG representative for civilian affairs in the Landkreis of Salzgitter. In the Landkreis of Goslar, Regtl Hq acted as the central agency to handle problems and administration of Bn and Sep Unit areas.

~~SECRET~~

The greatest problem of MG was the feeding, housing, clothing, and medical attention of displaced persons. At the time the Regt assumed responsibility for the area there were approximately 35,000 DP's in the area of which 30,000 were Eastern Europeans. In addition there were approximately 1900 PwW of which 300 were French or Belgian and the remainder were Poles, Russians, Czechoslovakians, Italians, Yugoslavs, and Bulgarians. The DP's were housed in some 110 camps scattered throughout the Regt Area, however, a large percentage was concentrated in the area of 1st Bn. Capt Fritts, Executive Officer of 1st Bn, was placed in charge of all DP's in the Salzgitter Landkreis. Food was obtained from German sources. During period, all French, Belgian and Dutch DP's and PwW were moved, by rail, to France, Belgium and Holland.

The Regt was notified that it would receive approximately 24,000 German PwW and was ordered to make arrangements to house, feed, and guard them. Camps were established in the 1st Bn area near IMMENDORF and on 15 May 1945 the first trainload of German PwW arrived. About 4500 men were received daily until a total of 26,220 PwW were in the camp. Maj Foster, Regt S2, was assigned duty of establishing and operating the Camp. A, B and D Cos were used to guard the PwW. Food was provided from German sources.

The maximum amount of training consistent with occupational duties was carried out and the orientation phase of the I and E Program was begun.

Towards the end of the month, advance parties of the 64th Medium Arty Regt (Br) arrived in Regt Area and began preparations to relieve the Regt in area. The relief was begun on 31 May 1945, the same day our quartering party departed for FREYUNG (Q2639) Germany in preparation for the Regt to move and relieve the 10th Inf of the 5th Inf Div of occupational duties in the Landkreis of Graftenau and Wolfstein.
