HISTORICAL RECORDS SECTION

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During the month of September, training continued as usual covering disciplinary drills, physical training exercises, conduct of raids, manning of road blocks, and traffic control points, military courtesy and the salute, practice parades and interior guard duty. The training program also extended to the training of specialists to alleviate conditions resulting from the extensive personnel turnover. Care of equipment and clothing was stressed as well as conservation of food. Inspections for this purpose were regularly scheduled. (T.D. #12 28 Sept. 45)

The I & E programs scheduled to start on 3 September was again suspended for the 3rd time in anticipation of the loss of approximately 2000 men from the regiment. I & E Unit Schools scheduled to start on 3 September were not started until 24 September. At that time five (5) classes were started as follows: Two (2) Auto Mechanics, Course I. One (1) Managing Small Business. Two (2) Spoken German, Course I. Schools were conducted at Bn. level and Co. level with a total enrollment of approximately 63 men. Original plan called for total enrollment of 1500 by 30 October. However, between 6 Sept. and 27 Sept. the total loss in personnel was approximately 2317 officers and men. Of these about 700 were replaced, Teaving a shortage of trained I and E personnel and instructors. With the reduced strength of the regiment and personnel required to perform MG and security missions, few men were made available for unit schools. During Sept. seventeen (17) men and officers attended I and E School either at Oberammergau or Regensburg, Germany. Three (3) men departed for schools at USFET level. (T.D. #12 28 Sept 1945) (Memo. 20 August 1945)

An apparent let down in the compliance with "Safe-Driving Procedures", resulted in steps being taken by this Headquarters to penalize all violaters. Many accidents involving injury to personnel and vehicles occurred. Violaters were automatically relieved from driving duty, and damage to vehicle required coverage by s/C or R/S. The increase in accidents and violations of traffic rules and speeds in so brief a time was attributed to the turnover of personnel. Many new drivers were not familiar with driving discipline and the local

ground rules. (Memo 19 Sept. 1945)

The campaign to down the VD in this regiment progressed with renewed effort and reluctant but favorable results. Satisfactory cooperation was received from Burgomeisters of area towns.

The outstanding undertaking for the month of September, no doubt was the plan for securing winter clothing and blankets for winter use by DPs in this area. All camps had to be winterized and plans were under way although not yet completed. Some 4500 Hungarian DPs were sent to their homeland by train thus making it possible to house more DPs in the better and larger camps; more adequate for winter quarters. Small camps in many cases were eliminated; others began winterizing. Preparations for the anticipated severe winter were not yet completed by 30 September, but progress was observed throughout. A total of 3,200 DPs were evacuated to their homeland. Also 4500 Hungarians left the centeral collecting point at Pocking Air Strip. The latter were sent home by train exclusively. As of 30 September 29,460 Hungarians remained in the three (3) counties or responsibility.

Units of UNRRA assumed much responsibility in caring for DPs. Red Cross Parcels and food in bulk was made available through this agency.

Fuel supply for winter use presented a major obstacle.

However,

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authority was granted by the 3rd Army to gather wood from local standing supplies. Not all have been adequately supplied, but the plan is manifesting its results in little piles of cut wood near every home. The gathering of wood continues. Much is left to be desired in the winterizing of quarters for DPs as well as clothing of same. (Ltr 15 Sept. 1945) (Memo 25 August 1945)

To further security control, plans were put under way to make unscheduled raids on towns within the area. The effect of these raids were to catch the populace off guard and thereby apprehend arms, illegal possessions such as: military clothing, (American) food, cigarettes, illegal passes, explosives, suppresive groups,

and also to discourage black market activities.

To enhance the above "swoop" impromptu traffic control points were established throughout the area whose functions were to search all traffic for proper personal credentials, registration of vehicles and bicycles, unauthorized possessions, etc. All violators were turned over to the CIC for screening and MG for further action when deemed necessary. (Ltr. 29 August 1945) (Ltr. 30 August 1945)

Few arrests were made during the month of September. These Warrests were violators of curfew, improper identification etc. Some raids have been reported in local areas. The principle violation,

is the cutting of communication lines.

On 10th of September the 102d Inf Division closed from the area. On 18 September Kreis EGGENFELDEN was turned over to 4th Armored Division. Cannon Company moved into Aidenbach, Kreis VILSHOFEN, which kreis was made the responsibility of the 331st Infantry, as of 15th September. Anti-Tank Company closed from EGGENFELDEN into PLEINTING 22 September with one platoon across the DANUBE River at HOFCHKIRCHEN where it performed MG duties.

- Battalion and Separate Unit Commanders, 331st Infantry, Military Government Detachment, PFarrkirchen, Greisbach, Vilshoven and Simbach.
- 1. Hungarians are to be returned to Hungary beginning 18 September. (Information recieved from AC of G-2, 83rd Inf. Div.)
 - a. Transportation; Train
 - b. Place: Lv. Pocking
 - e. Date: 18-20-25 Sept. 45
 - d. Number: 1500 per train
- e. Rations: For 4 days plus travel time to Linz, Austria -- about 11

hours. Rations to be dilivered to Pocking by Div. M or Regt.


f. Water: Limited amount to be car ied in available receptacles other than O'S Army water cans.

g. Destination: HEGXSHALON, Hungary, just East of Vienna.

h. Train Commdr & Guards: Minimum of 1 - officer; 1-NCO 5 - EM who will

take traing to destination and return with same.

- I. Signs: Div. is preparing large signs to be placed on the sides of the trains.
- 2. All Hungarians must return to Hungary whether they want to or not. Only exceptions are the few working for the Inland Waterways.
 - 3. Order of priority of Hungarians is the same as previously announced. except that at least the first two trains are expected to be leaded principally with those now in the Pecking Hungarian Camp.
- 4. Upon Arrival in Linz, Austria, the Train Comdr will contact DP Section, 26th Inf. Div. for coordination and other necessary details reference proceeding from Ling to destination. Previous instructions reference rosters, madicalexaminations for communicable diseases, certificates, DDT dusting, etc., are still in effect. 2nd Bn Med Officer, with necessary assistance, will supervise the medical examination part of the processing.
- 5. The number of hospital cars that will be available at Pocking on 18 Sept is not known at this time. Some 700 ambulatory and litter patients are expected to be available for transportation on first train load-maybe less.
- 6. Second Bn furnishes train comdr. and guards for first train; 1st Bn for the 2nd train and 3rd Bn for the 3rd train with 2nd Bn being responsible for the 4th Train.
- 7. Horse drawn caravans will be permitted to return in convoys of not more than 50 carts or carriages. IP will be Scharding and at least one jeep with an officer and EMs will accompany each convoy. The date has not yet been announced.
- 8. Motor convoys are expected to tollow after the horse-drawn caravans have been cleared out of the area. Details later.

TRAINING DIRECTIVE)

28 September 1945

TRAINING PROGRAM

- 1. Information: Training Directive No 11, this headquarters is hereby rescinded.
- 2. Mission: The 531st Infantry will occupy and govern this portion of Germany; maintain a high state of discipline; and conduct training so as to be able to perform its combat missions in case of emergency.
- 3. Training Hours: Effective Sunday, 30 Sep 45, the training week will be reduced to a total of thirty-three (33) hours covering a five and one-half (5 1/2) day week.

4. Training:

- a. All units will, within the prescribed training week, devote the maximum available time to the athletics and recreation and the orientation and education program, consistent with performance of their current missions.
- b. Specialist schools will be conducted throughout the regiment. Organizations will train understudies to present 1st Sgts. and Co. Clerks. A school for these latter specialists will also be conducted in the near future.
- c. Sufficient unit training will be conducted to insure that all units are able to perform their current operational missions. Stress will be placed upon the proper instruction of interior and security guards.
- d. Ceremoniess Each unit will hold at least one battalion ceremony each week.
- e. Training Schedules: Weekly training schedules will be submitted in Triplicate so as to reach this Hq. by 1000 on Thursday, preceeding the week in which the training is to be conducted. The following breakdown of training hours will be used as a guide only in preparing weekly scheduless

(1) Daily except Saturday, Sunday, and Holidays.

Subject 1/2 hour inspections of personnel, equipment and quarters.

Morning

1 hour disciplinary drills.

1. Calisthentics.

2. Close order drill, including mass command drill.

- f. Retreat formation will include inspection of personnel and arms. A minimum of one (1) officer per company will be present. Motor stables will be held for one (1) hour each training day.
- g. 2 one-hour periods will be scheduled weekly, covering inspection of clothing and equipment by squad, section and platoon leaders. See inclosure #1, weekly conservation check.

h. Officer and NCO Schools: Schools will be held on battalion level for officers and on company level for NCO's. They are to be held during afternoon or in the morning after inspection, disciplinary drill, and mandatory 1-hour military training period. Show exact subject of instruction and instructor.

(1) Officers Schools: 2 hours per week; 1 hour tactics and

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1 hour administration.

(2) NCO Schools: 2 hours per week; small unit tactics, disciplinary drill, administration, and specialist training.

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

1. How to conduct inspections --- Suggested methods, The most successful system of inspection employing the "chain of command" principle is based on detailed inspection by the squad leader. Recommended inspection methods are as follows:

a. Within the squad. Make a check sheet for the squad leader, or any noncommissioned officer responsible for not more than twelve men, such as that shown in figure 1. Each squad leader thoroughly examines one half of his squad's clothing and equipment, which should require no more than on hour, on each of two scheduled hours per week, using the check list to record the number of items inspected and the number of deficiencies found. The reverse side of the check sheet contains a guide as to what to examine during the inspection. Loose clothing should be removed from hangers, barracks bags, and duffel bags prior to the inspection. The following week when inspections commence anew, the check sheet will serve as a follow-up for corrective action to be taken by the individual.

b. Within the company. Turn in check sheets to the company commander at the end of the week succeeding the one in which the inspection was made. The company commander will thus be made aware of deficiencies in the individual clothing and equipment, and any corrective action which has been taken by the individual soldier. A check list could be made for organizational equipment, using information listed in figure 2, TB QM 32 Change #1 thereto dated 20 July 45, and platoon leaders made responsible for inspections in a similar manner; the company commander being responsible for conducting weekly inspections. These, together with the methods described above, should give him a clear-cut picture of the conservation program within his unit and enable him to take necessary action.

c. Within higher headquarters, Use the same type of check list for spot check inspections by higher headquarters, employing the information contained in figure 2. TB QN 32 Change #1 thereto dated 20 July 45. Inspectors need not necessarily check all items listed therein; it is intended only as a complete listing of quartermaster clothing, equipment, and general supplies commonly issued and the points to inspect on each. A spot-check form made up similar to above form can be used to tally those items actually inspected and the number of deficiencies found,


