I--A'.ARD OF SILVER STAR MEDAL--Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and Circular No. 66, Headquarters First Army, dated 18 May 1944, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to the following named officer for gallantry in action in France.

Captain Clifford J. McCarthy, 0-370387, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action against the enemy on 7 July 1944 near trace. France. Captain McCarthy, as Battalion S-3, was given the mission of guiding the tanks in a tank-infm try attack. Other means of communication having failed, Captain McCarthy proceeded forward from objective to objective, constantly exposing himself to the fire of snipers and entrenched enemy infantry. His utter disregard for his own safety, and his initiative and aggressiveness were an inspiration to the officers and men of his battalion. His inspired leadership was in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Connecticut.
