I-AWARD OF SILVER STAR FEDAL-Under the provisions of AR 600-45 and in accordance with authority contained in paragraph 3c, Section I, Circular No. 32, Hq ETOUSA, 20 March 1944, and Circular No. 6, Hq TUSA, 26 April 1944, the Silver Star Medal is awarded to the following:

Technician Fifth Grade Leslie 1. Adams, 37103645, Medical Deparment, \*\*\* Field Artillary Battalion, United States.Army. For gallantry in action on 10 August 1944, at \* \* \*, France. Technician Fifth Grade Adams, while serving as a surgical technician, continued to care for the wounded under intense enemy artillary fire, although he himself was wounded. His courageous and heroic devotion to duty reflects great credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Arkansas.

Second Lieutenant John R. Blackburn, 0-1179616, Field Artillery \*\*\* Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry ir action on 9 August 1944, near \* \* \*, France. Second Lieutenant Blackburn, as forward observer with an infantry battalion, remained at an exposed point although the infantry had been temporarily forced therefrom by extremely heavy enemy artillery fire, and continued the performance of his duty until commanded to leave by his superior officer. His conspicuous devotion to duty and personal bravery reflect great credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Indiana.

Captain George G. Bruzza, 0-439339, Medical Corps, \*\*\* Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 29 July 1944, near \* \* \*, France. Captain Bruzza, although wounded himself, continued to care for the wounded under intense enemy artillery fire, with utter disregard for his own safety. His resolute and courageous devotion to duty reflects great credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Private First Class Jay Grawford, 34433635, Infantry, Company \*\*, \*\*\* Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 15 July 1944, near \* \* \*, France. The advance of his company was being delayed by heavy machine gun fire from a concealed enemy tank. Private First Class Crawford and another man advanced against the tank with a rocket launcher, crippled it and enabled its destruction by mortar fire. Private First Class Crawford's conspicuous bravery and resolute determination reflect great credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from North Carolina.

Staff Sorgeant Samuel A. Porshow, 17047806, Field Artillery, \* Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 29 July 1944, near \* \* \*, France. Staff Sorgeant Dorshow, while acting as artillery forward observer with an infantry battalion, crawled to a house 75 yards in front of the forward lines and

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established an observation post. Despite fierce enemy small arms, mortar and artillery fire, he remained in an exposed position and directed destructive artillery fire upon the enemy. His conspicuous aggressiveness and personal bravery reflect great credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Minnesota.

Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 15 July 1944, in \* \* \*, France. The battalion commanded by Major Speedie was given the mission of taking an enemy strong point that had held out stubbornly against prior attacks. The advance was met by fierce resistance, including severe artillery and machine gun fire. To assure the accomplishment of the mission, Major Speedie personally led his troops forward and successfully took the position. When a counter-attack by enemy tanks was launched he personally destroyed one with a rocket launcher and led successful rocket launcher attacks against three more. Major Speedie's conspicuous bravery and leader-ship were an inspiration to the entire command. His action reflects great credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the military service. Entered filitary service from Texas.

First Lieutenant Glen J. Sundberg, 0-1166626, Field Artillery, \*\*\* Field Artillery Lattalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action during the period 7 August 1944 to 11 August 1944, in \* \* \*, Franco. During this period, First Lieutenant Sundberg served continuously with an infantry company as a forward observer. In an attack against a strongly fortified enemy position composed of steel and concrete pill boxes, First Lieutenant Sundberg, from a position approximately 20 yards from the enemy, directed artillery fire on the strong point and accomplished its reduction. Throughout this action his observation point was exposed to direct fire from enomy high velocity weapons and was hit several times. After the strong point had been reduced he secured four direct hits on enemy anti-aircraft guns being used against the friendly infantry, and then destroyed an enemy bunker. When his battalion was withdrawn to another sector, he voluntarily remained with the infantry company and continued to furnish observation for other units. His resolute aggressiveness and devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

First Sergeant Stanley Waite, 35516837, Infantry, Company \*\*\*, Infantry, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 15 July 1944, near \* \* \*, France. The advance of his company was being delayed by heavy machine gun fire from a concealed enemy tank. First Sergeant Taite and another man advanced against the tank with a rocket launcher, crippled it and enabled its destruction by mortar fire. First Sergeant Waite's conspicuous bravery and resolute determination reflect great credit upon himself and the finest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Ohio.
